

Here is the 2016 Chapter 43 Scholarship Awardee, John Kellogg

Interview by Edward Gibson; EAA Ray Foundation Scholar 2021



John Kellogg was awarded a Chapter 43 Scholarship in 2016. He obtained his PPL at Vector Air at Erie and is now working on getting his Instrument Rating at McAir at Rocky Mountain Metropolitan Airport. He has future ambitions to get a Restricted-ATP and fly for United Airlines.

How was your flight training experience? What did you like/didn't like?

He trained at Vector Air in Erie, and he said that It was pretty good. He had the same instructor until he soloed. However, after he soloed, his original instructor moved on to work for an airline. He didn't like changing instructors because the new instructor didn't know what kind of knowledge he already had. Also, since each instructor teaches things differently, there was some difficulty readjusting to the new instructor. He said he felt a little stressed during his check ride because he was not very confident in his ground knowledge.

How did training at a non-towered airport affect you? What did you like/didn't like?

He liked the non-towered airport experience. When he flew, it was all his own responsibility. However, he wasn't very confident flying into towered airports. It made the transition to IFR training a little harder, but the training has made him more comfortable talking with ATC.

What advice do you have for people just starting their flight training?

First, find an instructor who will be there for your whole training because they know exactly what you know, so there won't be any confusion. He said, "Don't be afraid to ask questions." He was worried people would judge him for asking questions he should have known. Don't worry what the instructor might think; it's their job to teach you. Be confident; when he flew into towered airports, he was pretty scared of messing up. However, people are very understanding that you're a student pilot.

Is there anything you wish you did differently with your flight training?

Try to stick with the same instructor, because then you avoid some problems. He wished that he asked more questions. This affected his confidence because he thought there were some things he didn't know.

How did receiving the scholarship affect you?

The scholarship allowed him to do flight training at an earlier age. He got the scholarship when he was 15. He couldn't have a job nor drive a car to a job at that point so he had no other way of funding. This helped him get his foot in the door with his training.

What advice would you give to someone who is thinking of applying?

He said to put out as much information as possible, sell yourself. Why should they pick you? They want to know that you're really passionate and that you're going to work hard. A common question on the application is, "If you didn't have a scholarship, what would you do?" They ask how much you want it and what you're willing to do. They want to give the scholarship to someone who will get it done, put in the work, and be successful.

Why did you want to fly?

He's been super passionate about aviation since he can remember. He went to Oshkosh in 2009 and was blown away. He's always wanted to be in the sky. Every time he went on a flight, he was fascinated. When he took his first Young Eagles flight when he was 8, he knew that this is where he wanted to be.

What's your most favorite part about flying?


He loves making good landings. When you make a good landing, and someone compliments you about it, it makes you feel really good. He likes it when passengers praise his landings.

What was something that surprised you the most with flying?

It surprised him that the wind affects an airplane so much when flying. Even a small crosswind can change the characteristics of an airplane, and the crosswind correction makes takeoff and landings feel different. Another thing that surprised him was how a Cessna 172 could share the same airport as a large airplane like an A321. One time he was on final into Colorado Springs Airport (COS), and a Frontier Airlines A321 was holding short for him. That was something he thought was super cool.

What are your future goals?

He is halfway through his instrument rating. He is training at Rocky Mountain Metropolitan Airport at McAir. He is working on getting his restricted airline transport pilot license through MSU. He plans to continue to earn his commercial rating. He will then work for Skywest Airlines, which has a path up to United.





Minutes for EAA Chapter 43 Meeting March 12, 2022

TONIGHT'S PROGRAM started at 6:01pm

Paul Anslow will present what is and will be happening at RMMA and will also share some of his experiences piloting Marine One for Presidents Clinton and Bush. In the second half of the hour, we'll watch video from the AirVenture 2021 Memorial Wall Ceremony, which honored our own Lifetime Member, Chuck Graf. Several members of the Graf family, including Mark, Chuck's son, will add comments on the presentation.

Stan Specht: Paul came to us 3 years ago. He was a Marine helicopter pilot in Somalia and on Marine One, and he came to RMMA from Marine Corps Base Hawaii on Oahu. He's part of the airport advisory board working on development planning, noise complaints, and dodging fire! His son will be 1 year old on Thursday. Stan noted that planning is NOT unique to RMMA; General Aviation is moving on.

Paul noted that he comes from a classified background, but could talk some things. Like landing a Super Stallion on an aircraft carrier and piloting for fast roping. He was selected to fly the H60 Marine One and got to travel to



some of the worst places in the world; also some of the best. An H3 is usually used for DC flights, but the H60 is more capable so practice landings at the White House were carried out, just in case. Paul spent 2 years as a Marine Corp pilot,

mechanic, mission support, etc. Good training for an airport job; there was something new every day.

Paul showed a chart with RMMA flight operation numbers; there were 176K in 2018 with annual 10% increases since, resulting in 201.4K in 2021. It is the 3rd busiest field in Colorado and 49th in the US (74th in 2018). He's proud of the airport's growth. A member

asked about the spike in the chart in 1977 - due to an general aviation boom. Growth is dependent on economy, expensive fuel will cut operations. Fuel sales were 3.4M gallons in 2017, now almost 5.5M gallons. \$.13/per gallon goes to the airport and fuel sales are 70% jet fuel. The airport has also experienced staff growth - in the past there was one person on duty from Friday 6PM to Monday 6AM. 19 staff members in 2018, now 26 with a minimum of 2 people on duty 24/7. The airport added Sweepster brooms 12 years ago then Sweepster went out of business 2 years later. Two new Overhausen brooms were purchased this year for \$400K each. The airport's ARFF (Airport Rescue and Firefighting) truck is 25 years old; past directors wanted a Class B but the FAA required a Class A. Paul negotiated a Class A with the FAA funding 90% and the DOT funding 5%. The airport's newest FBO, Sheltair, is from Florida and asked about snow removal; the other FBO, Signature, does their own, but RMMA gets paid to clear Sheltair. There are extra staff for snow removal. "New" plows have been purchased from DIA with money from CDOT and Signature got in on the deal too, so 2 more staff will be added next year (bringing total to 4).

Airport Construction Projects

2021 - Taxiway A (Previously made with a cool substrate that failed)

2023 - New Taxiway O - reroute Simms St. and open the west side for more development by Pilatus. Other Projects

Slope failure reconstruction, got \$3.5M from lawsuit for work.

Ramp pavement rehab, used to fix whoever complained loudest; inspected all asphalt and rated red, orange, yellow. Red problems are fixed but more is needed; \$2M budgeted over next 2 years to get everything repaired.

Applying to the Fed for \$270K to replace electrical vault and generators from the 90s.

Pilatus is expanding: 60% more demand than they can currently produce. Their Phase 2 paint building requires repair/expansion of the drainage in Basin 160.

Basin 300 by the Post Office: riprap was sandstone which has eroded, allowing nearby businesses to flood. Strategic Business Plan (map):

Simms reroute around the south side of the field. The airport owns land further south but it's on a slope so will sell ~450 acres.

Sheltair has been awarded the best FBO in the nation, go visit! Hangar B plus three more in the future.

C2 hangars - more for GA! Contact Tim Weems. New hangars will be \$500-600 per month.

Events - June JAA Fly-in, CAF Flying Tour, Rocky Mountain car show and more!

John Reading - Thoughts on ATC coms with new growth? COVID requirements mean <u>one</u> controller in the tower at a time. Limits ops!

Is RMMA trying to be the next Centennial? NO! Need good general aviation, solid manufacturing, and commercial to keep going. Imperative to increase general aviation. Flight schools are the heaviest users, probably won't add more schools, but go for more corporate.

Electric planes, LL to no-lead fuel (mogas)? Paul thinks both are coming; met with Hydrogen Colorado this week! In discussions for grants for electrical charging stations.

Gary Gregory - improvements to existing hangars, especially lighting upgrade to LED? Would like to go to LED (green) but cost? Will look into it.

Lynn Briggs - How about a co-op mogas tank? Sadly no - have to meet FBO standards (20 acres, staffing, etc.)

Stan said if you need something, ask (hangar repairs, upgrades). Reminded us that the Chapter is hosted by RMMA, we should contribute back.

During the upcoming break, sign the signup sheet with your name phone # & if you're already an EAA member, your member number. You'll have a six-month trial chapter membership! (FREE!)

Eric Gibson got his PPL in '87, 2013 Instrument, commercial, etc. He's a partner in a Cirrus and has been to AirVenture a couple of times. He's been an EAA life member for 13 years, and is building.

Mike Litchko got sick in 2001/2002 but recovered. He's got a masters in engineering and is building an RV-8A in his basement (empennage so far). He's been an EAA member for many years.

June Parell is a student pilot at McAir and has an apartment in BJC's traffic pattern!

Lynn Briggs is a looong time/low time pilot since '66. His Dad signed his ticket on the day of his senior prom. Recently bought a Kitfox, swapping the engine (see ad on page 8).

During the break - take a look at Val Gregory's dad's model kits (available for chapter donation) and Cliff Goldstein's Inogen system (inspection).

After the break, Stan showed the Air Venture Memorial Wall video. Chapter 43 has six members on the wall; the rocks that make up the wall came from all over the country, in memorial or from members' home airports. Mark Graff (Chuck's son) and grandson talked about their dad/grandfather. Mark is a past chapter officer and newsletter publisher. Chuck joined Chapter 43 within months of its founding. When he was old enough that many of his friends were gone, Mark reminded him that he still had Stan, John, and the Wednesday Lunch crew. Mark said there's no feeling in the world like flying what you've built. EAA National transferred Chuck's member number to Mark at his request.

John Reading flew with Stephanie to Oshkosh to get her RV-7 back. Whitman was deserted and 0°F.


