



Update from the May Meeting Presentation from Justin Hendrickson, former F-15/F-18 pilot (from Larry Earnshaw):

Larry,


Again, I apologize for going long on time. It's a lot of info to cover. To directly answer the follow up questions:

Do I still fly? Unfortunately no, but I think I will again someday. In this season of my life I don't have the spare time or the money to devote to it. I have three kids to put through college and am trying to keep five cars full of \$6.50/gallon California gasoline, lol. I think I'd like to maybe build a Van's RV or something like that someday once I don't have to devote 12-13 hours a day to work.

- 2. I chose the railroad over the airlines because when I got out in 2006 it was still a very rough time for all the airline industry. They were starting to hire again, but it was not as good of a job as it used to be, back in the heyday. Being a 25 year captain running the New York to Tokyo a couple times a month before you're up against your hours is a good gig but they make you pay your dues to get there. The first few years in the airlines are especially punitive, financially. I was looking to hire on with a big company I could give 30 years to and retire with a pension (those are all gone in the airlines) and I found that at Union Pacific. I also wanted to sleep in my own bed every night, and airline pilots are away from home more than people in the military. Being an airline guy is an honorable profession, but I could tell it just wasn't going to be for me. I loved flying for the cool missions and the excitement, and airline flying is neither of those things (no offense to anyone doing those things). I am not one of those guys who "lives to fly" although there's nothing wrong with that. It was just more about the service to me.
- 3. The new TOPGUN movie... yes, I've seen it. Twice, in fact, and I think it was very well done when you look at it through the lens of what it is, which is entertainment. Every Navy pilot I have talked to or heard proclaim on social media has universally stated that the guys who made this new movie could have screwed it up, but they didn't, and the movie earns all the accolades it's been receiving. Are there some unrealistic things in there and things that are down-right wrong? Sure, but I feel like they were more like artistic choices or purposeful simplifications made to speed the story along, and not malicious or ignorant mistakes. There's a lot to pack into a two hour movie. I especially liked the low-level flying, which was pretty much 100% realistic, and the effort they put into getting real aerial footage of the actors. I could tell in a few scenes by the looks on their faces that the actors were just baggage along for the ride, lol. I also like the "Hard Deck" O-Club scene, which is modeled after the I-Bar at NAS North Island, which I've visited many times. In real life, fighter guys don't really hang at the I-Bar too much because there are no strike fighter squadrons stationed at North Island, but they did a great job of capturing what the O-clubs at NAS Oceana or NAS Fallon during an Airwing exercise feel like. Those are special places and I feel like they did a good job capturing that. One of the grossest errors is that the whole mission would have been a B-2 Bomber mission in real life and not a Super Hornet mission. I heard initially they wanted to use the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter for the movie, but there is simply too much secret stuff there to put on the big screen. Even with the Super Hornet, they had to dumb down the "in cockpit" scenes and whenever they cut to a display, to not give anything away. It was not what it would actually look like on a real mission, but that did not get enough screen time to really annoy me. The only thing that kind of annoyed me is all the flares they dispensed. Flares will not defeat radar guided missiles, but I suppose chaff is not nearly as visually exciting as flares. It wasn't a documentary, so I'll give them a pass. It was a great popcorn movie and I give it 2 big thumbs up.







Good afternoon Chapter 43,

Despite the fact that I am unable to be here in person, I appreciate that it is tradition for scholarship awardees to say a few words about this achievement. First of all, I would like to thank the Biesemeier family for the generous financial support they have provided in order that I can undertake flight training and earn my license. Your donation is very much appreciated.

As some of you may know, I currently live in the United Kingdom, which has very little EAA presence. In fact, there are no chapters at all in this country, and only one in the Republic of Ireland. EAA chapters do incredible work inspiring others, both young and old, to join the aviation community. The limited EAA presence in the UK, however, does provide an excellent opportunity to found a new chapter once I receive my license, one which I intend will eventually lead to an associated non-profit charity. Its work shall be to inspire all generations to take an interest in aviation, particularly for humanitarian missions, and to provide financial aid for many of those who wish to become pilots but cannot afford to do this alone. This charity will provide many less fortunate individuals with the funds and training necessary to become aviators, especially in countries where becoming a pilot is often prohibitively expensive.

Nevertheless, none of this will be possible without a pilot's license. What is the point of starting an EAA chapter if the founder is not even legally allowed to be pilot in command? As such, I would again like to thank the Biesemeiers for their generous support at this time, and the tremendous opportunity they have provided to me. And, to everyone listening, enjoy the rest of the picnic!

Chuck Kubin added that he'd recently attended the annual Denver Area Council Scout Fair; Elizabeth, who had her first YE flight with Chuck, is one of the first class of 17 female Eagle Scouts.
