President's Corner - by Chapter President Cliff Goldstein

Hi everyone, our meeting this month on June the 11th will be our annual picnic, which will occur at Myles Lee's hanger. I'd like to begin by thanking Myles and Nila for hosting this year's picnic in their hangar. Also, a special thanks to Michael Gilbert for organizing the event along with all the folks that are helping Mike to pull this together. Please bring a lawn chair as our source for chairs has moved to Arizona. Also please bring a side dish or dessert of your choosing to go along with our meal. Setup will start at 9:30 am for those who wish to help, and the picnic will start at 11:30 am. I look forward to seeing all our members, family, and guests at this wonderful affair we put on each year.

In preparation for my shoulder surgery this month, I decided to have my flight review and IPC check done prior to my procedure. During my flight review, there was focus on emergency procedures for engine out. This is something we don't practice enough and yet it is a real concern when it happens. What I found personally was that while looking for a place to land I didn't take into consideration some of the many choices that existed. I was so intent on finding a piece of ground that I completely ignored all the many dirt roads that were close to the landing site, so in practicing this procedure keep your scope wide open and when you've made your choice stick with it. I found a tendency to be high during many of these approaches, but for me it was an opportunity to practice my full forward slips. Slips are fun and easy and if you're uncomfortable performing them, find your favorite instructor and go out and practice this very valuable maneuver.

I was reading in Sport Aviation this month about the statistics on go around versus landing on the first try. I was surprised to see the accident statistics so high for a go around, and yet we were taught that if we are not in a stabilized approach a go around is a very acceptable alternative. The forward slip in many cases would certainly not be considered part of a stabilized approach but is of course available if we as pilots are proficient at performing this very valuable maneuver. They're fun and easy, get some altitude and practice. I'm hoping in our July chapter meeting we can discuss the pros and cons to this maneuver.

Of course, one last trip to Salida before surgery; it's just way too much fun flying in that direction. My next venture if I ever get out of this sling is glider pilot training. I was happily surprised to find that many members are glider qualified and hope a few will get in contact with me and share their experiences.

I had the pleasure of speaking with Mitch Lock, former president of Van's Aircraft. The long-awaited RV-15 high wing all-metal back country airplane will be on display at Oshkosh this summer. The aircraft will initially be available in the tailwheel version, and the next variant will be a nose wheel. Jeff Jones, Scott Serani, and I were originally planning to build an RV-12 with Young Aviators over last year and this year. Delivery of the RV-12 has already been delayed by over a year and support for the project has waned to the point that we've decided to scrap the build and move on to something a bit more fun for the three of us. We'll consider the RV-15 along with similar style aircraft like the Zenith 701.

One thing is for sure, the fun in building has so much to do with the camaraderie of working with members of our chapter. Oftentimes it's not the flying but the time we spend together that makes it so enjoyable.

No speaker this month but we will have our Ray Scholarship winner give us an update on their progress in achieving their goal of learning to fly.

The day before surgery, I took the 14 out for a quick ride up north of Longmont. I was about ready to turn home when I felt the need for a spin. I almost made it home before a couple more barrel rolls left and right. Watching the latest Top Gun Maverick movie let me know I didn't miss anything; I had it all.



MILE HIGH EAA Chapter 43 Minutes May 14, 2022

TONIGHT'S PROGRAM started at 6:02

Justin Hendrickson is currently the Director System Locomotive at the West Colton Locomotive Facility in Los Angeles, California for Union Pacific Railroad. He received a BS in Mechanical Engineering from the United States Naval Academy and an EMBA from Naval Postgraduate School. He was an Instructor Pilot at Lemoore, CA for the Strike Fighter Squadron "Flying Eagles". He also served in combat missions on the Theodore Roosevelt aircraft carrier in Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Justin was in the Navy from 1996 to 2006 - with a front row to history. His dad got his PPL in college and had a Bonanza. Justin has attended 4 AirVentures, once as a kid. He earned his PPL at age 16 in Kearney, Nebraska. The best way to Naval aviation is through the Naval Academy; 25% of Academy graduates are aviators. His Preflight training was at NAS Pensacola; Primary training was at NAS Corpus Christi where he scored high enough for jets openings. His Intermediate training was at NAS Meridian MS as was his Advanced training in a T-45 with a glass cockpit. (Current Primary training is in Texan IIs with a glass cockpit and more power.) At the end of Advanced training, he got a tour on "The Boat" doing solo flights until he passed and





received his "winging" in 1999. He went on to fly F-15s (could have gone to F-14s but they were being phased out). He started in the Fleet Replacement Squadron (FRS) aka "The Rag" flying a grey jet and earning a reputation for future placement. He had an opportunity to take the FA-18 military equivalency test for \$125, a good deal! Next was SERE school (Survival-Evasion-Resistance-Escape) for 2 weeks. That got him promoted to the fleet, at the bottom of the totem pole. He served first in VFA-15 Valiens in F-15s at NAS Oceana in Virginia Beach, VA. VFA-15 consisted of ~200 people, ground jobs as well as flight jobs. VFA-15 also flew MacDonald Douglas F/A-18C Hornets from Lot 14 (the heaviest) without the current EPE engines. The planes flew up to Mach 1.3, though they were rated for Mach 1.8. They typically flew with two 2000 lb drop tanks with various standard ordnance loads and an M61A1 Vulcan 20mm cannon firing 250/500 rounds of HEI (High Explosive Incendiary) or Balls (for practice). Also APG-65 radar, Nitehawk FLIR, LST, and expendables. Martin Baker NACES Ejection Seats which adjusted ejection force depending on altitude. Justin showed a picture of his squadron with jersey colors dependent on jobs as well as the ship's complement colors. Justin also showed a typical deployment cycle - Leave, Orange Air Det (experienced pilots) squadron training, workups for carrier qualifications, COMPTUEX (Composite Training Unit Exercise), JTFX (Joint Task Force Exercises), and Air Wing Fallon. Then a 6 month deployment and repeat! Life at sea is not all flying! Justin showed a chart with Cyclic Ops - starting with a Briefing then Tapes/Weapons/Blood Chits (ID if shot down), then Dress, walk to the jets, and Preflight. Startup 30 minutes before launch. Launch, then flight at ~500' until 10 nautical miles, then climb to the tanker stack. Rendezvous with wingman on the tanker. Conduct mission, FPAS computer set for maximum range or maximum endurance, RTB (return to base). Recovery (landing)

with Ball flying (land on the meatball); 2G landings common. He spoke to line-up and angle of attack. Once landed, taxi to assigned parking spot (~3" clearance from adjacent planes!) After deplaning, a Maintenance Debrief, Combat Debrief, Flight Debrief, and LSO (landing score) Debrief. Flying 2 times a day was not uncommon, up to 3 times a day for the tanker pilots. Every landing at full power, in case the tail hook didn't catch! Justin showed a typical case for landing based on vertical stack location for Day/VFR conditions.

Justin joined the squadron in August 2000 and had an epic 2001 summer cruise on the USS Enterprise. 9/11 occurred 5 months into their 6 month deployment while in the Mediterranean (Justin's second child was born just two weeks prior). They waited and planned for 3.5 weeks, then started bombing in Afghanistan on October 7 - Operation Enduring Freedom. They dropped 250K lb of ordnance on Al Queda and the Taliban, then returned to Norfolk November 10. VFA-15 won the Estoch (SP?) Award for 2001. Justin had an abbreviated leave then was told to pack for a year. Originally scheduled to leave in May 2003, he departed 1/9/2003 and was back in the Med by early February. The squadron's first missions flew through Israel; Turkey was slow to authorize air space. From 3/21 - 4/14 dropped 902 pieces of ordnance (246K lb) with 85% accuracy. The pilots took lots of water on missions! In an F-15 you're always thinking about fuel; the Navy and Air Force had opposite (male/female) tanker interfaces, so the Air Force added a heavy drogue fitting to allow fueling of Navy planes. Justin showed ordnance loading, largely by hand, and noted that the cannon required 1-second trigger pulls to avoid overheating. Justin read one of his journal entries about a night mission to Kabul, starting with the mission briefing.

Following this deployment Justin went on to his Instructor Pilot assignment at Lemoore CA. Questions?

Larry Earnshaw - What were night carrier landing like during combat with no lighting? Justin said there was only the meatball and a few lights, hard on depth perception. Takes practice! That's why they flew training landings every 6 days to stay current.

Jeff Holdridge - What were your high and low points in training? High point was when he got his first choice at training, low point was his second launch - grabbed the stick too high, trimming down and dropping after launch but got a call from the carrier Captain "Climb, climb!" He left a wake in the water from his exhaust! Takeoff is the most dangerous part of Navy flying.

Justin left the Navy at the end of his training tour - he got a career's worth of experience in his first tour, had a young family, had lost too many friends and didn't want an aviation career, so he resigned his commission and went to work with Larry Earnshaw at Union Pacific.

Jeff Holdridge - Did you experience any air-to-air combat? No, Saddam's fighters were destroyed in the first couple of hours; many had been buried because Saddam didn't trust his own people!

Cliff Goldstein thanked Justin for his service and presentation.

SAFETY REPORT – Words of Wisdom from our Experts. Anyone see the new HOT SPOTS in the Airport Directory put on by the FAA?

Cliff Goldstein asked about Wednesday's (5/11) crash at RMMA. Stan had been flying that morning and eventually landed on 12 Left after experiencing a severe downdraft just short of the runway. After requesting clearance to land, the controller told him to go west and orbit until after two IFR planes had landed; he experienced severe turbulence in the interim. Let controllers know your condition! The crash has Boulder/ Superior HOAs motivated to sue RMMA over noise violations (see page 3 for the RMMA Community Noise Restriction meeting on Monday, June 13).
