

I recently received a phone call from a very nice and respectful elderly couple that lives in Hygiene - near your aerobatic practice area. Again - unlike some of the noise complainers we encounter - this couple could not have been kinder. They said that they understood the need to practice aerobatics but asked that we please not do low-level maneuvers over their town, outside the practice areas. Certainly not an unreasonable request. What's With This Months Title Pic?

The other day I (the Editor) was driving my granddaughter to dance when we stopped behind a truck with the license plate number DWG B18. In my acronym-infused brain this immediately translated as a drawing of a B-18. I'm familiar with the B-17, B-24, B-26, etc. bombers from WWII, but not that one. I told my granddaughter it might never have made it past the prototype phase, or had limited production and use. Here's what the National Museum of the United States Air Force (that's a mouthful!) has to say about the B-18 Bolo:

"The Douglas Aircraft Co. developed the B-18 to replace the Martin B-10 as the U.S. Army Air Corps' standard bomber. Based on the Douglas DC-2 commercial transport, the prototype B-18 competed with the Martin 146 (an improved B-10) and the four-engine Boeing 299, forerunner of the B-17, at the Air Corps bombing trials at Wright Field in 1935. Although many Air Corps officers judged the Boeing design superior, the Army General Staff preferred the less costly Bolo (along with 13 operational test YB-17s). The Air Corps later ordered 217 more as B-18As with the bombardier's position extended forward over the nose gunner's station."

"Though equipped with inadequate defensive armament and underpowered, the Bolo remained the Air Corps' primary bomber into 1941, and the Japanese destroyed some B-18s during the surprise attacks on Dec. 7. By early 1942, improved bombers like the B-17 replaced the Bolo as first-line bombardment aircraft. Many B-18s were then used as transports, or modified as B-18Bs for anti-submarine duty."

"Stationed at Wright Field from 1939 to 1942, the B-18A on display (and in the title pic) was acquired and restored by the museum in 1971. It is painted as a B-18A serving with the 38th Reconnaissance Squadron in 1939."

When I was filing for insurance for our RV14 I realized I'd flown over 200 hours last year. It doesn't hit you 'til you add it up. Looking back there were many memorable flights in many different aircraft. They all ended up successful (you could still fly the aircraft) but some could have used a bit better judgement prior to launch, like when Aaron Miller and I were leaving the Reno Airport after the races, and the Avionics blinked on and off. Ya the engine kept turning but with a line of aircraft behind us, we took off. That was dumb. I took Jeff, my son and daughter for a quick ride over to BJC. I mishandled a crosswind landing, and while I put it in the middle, I overloaded a tire and pinched the tube. Found that out as we were taxiing out for TO. On my check ride in the glider with Elliot in the back seat, I left the window open on the first TO. That one's not in the check list but it's in my head.

Seems every flight we take is a learning experience. I'm not into T+G's any more. But every time I put the aircraft down, I set a goal for that landing keeping my skills in controlling the aircraft in that critical phase of flight.

Spring hasn't sprung and for some of us, our flying machines have been resting comfortably waiting for a little warm weather or whatever the excuse. When the spirit moves you or you're ready to stretch those flying legs, it's a great time to pull your check list out and actually check off all the items to ensure you've looked at all the points. Take special care to check the air pressure in the tires. If it's been sitting for a while, there going to be a little out of round to begin with. Just make sure there's the correct amount of air. Whatever you did to secure your engine for the cold months, be sure to unsecure including making sure it's not just preservative oil in the crankcase.

I keep a battery minder on my two batteries, but after 7 years even my batteries are getting a little tired. Might be time to put a fresh set in.

Has anyone moved in over the winter? Look in all those places that mice seem to find to build a nest. And of course the birds may have set up shop if spring has arrived.

Check your comfort level on that first flight. We have great instructors in our club and they're always happy to take a ride around the patch. Great time to refresh where the center line of the runway is supposed to be.

I came back from one of those early flights in the spring in my Thorp a few years ago. The wheel pants were packed with some of that early wet spring snow. That would have been a good day to take the wheel pants off for that flight.

One of the best feelings is to feel the air under the wings lifting your bird into the air after a long break. Do it with confidence and safety in mind.

Even though I've been flying all winter, my first glider ride of the season will probably not be 'til March when we begin to have some warmer days with some lift. Our club requires an instructor take a hop with you to ensure you didn't forget all the little pieces, like closing the window.

Those are all opportunities to learn. As Bill Mitchell would say, let's go flying!

Road Trips in the Works - Chuck Kubin

One of the coolest aspects of doing the coolest thing you can do, flying, is going to cool places and doing cool stuff.

Just call me Captain Roadtrip. If flying in is an option, I'll check into it and provide details. Here's some ideas I'm working on:

*Visit to Wings Over the Rockies — I have an "in" as a docent, so I'll try to get us a more detailed and longer tour than usual, plus a "behind the curtain" look at the restorations area. Hoping for some discussion about acquisitions and the actual work to meet museum vs. airworthy standards. Recent highlights: the second stage of a ULA rocket, the "Baby BOOM" 2/3 mockup of the next-generation supersonic transport, and a 1926 Eaglerock. A long shot, but since Harrison Ford is a huge backer, maybe we could do a Facebook interview with him from the museum theater. And Lowry Beer Garden and an ice cream stand in a rocket is right next door.

*Visit BOOM — One of about 158 aerospace companies associated with KAPA, this is the company developing aircraft capable of traveling over land without blowing out your picture windows as we will hear a thump instead of a sonic BOOM. Planes are built in Alabama, so we'll be talking to developers about concepts and production.

*Visit the towers at KAPA and/or KBJC — Over years I did both, and back then they toured small handfuls of visitors or a still relatively small group divided into shifts.

*Flight for Life — All the details are pending what we can get, but the concept is to see the birds up close and talk to the pilots, planners and responders.

*National Museum of WWII Aviation/Westpac Restoration — Smallish, intimate museum has 28 FLYING aircraft on display and 10 more in restoration, including B-25 "In the Mood," the only flying P-47, Dauntless dive bomber, one of six remaining F7-F Tigercats, P-38... Westpac, right next door, gets you right into the thick of the work. Located on the northern tip of KCOS.

*Pueblo Weisbrod Aircraft Museum — WOW! Where to start! Nationally famous, dedicated to the B-24, but it doesn't have a B-24 (12 B-17s and -24s are rumored to be buried near Pueblo). It does have a small museum, two huge hangars and a big outdoors display with the B-29 "Peaches," a B-47, B-17, A-26, C-45, MiG 15 and -17, F-80, T-33, F-80, F-104, F-86, and even the Sikorsky Seabat 'copter that fished Alan Shepherd and Friendship 7 out of the drink in 1961. Located on KPUB.

*Denver Air Route Traffic Control Center (ZDV), Longmont. See what it takes to coordinate a region's worth of air traffic.

*Oshkosh, Neb.— sweet roll/donut humanitarian rescue mission. Repeating a favorite.

*Space Command satellite operations — My aviation merit badge wingman was recently promoted from satellite driver to satellite driver supervisor at a Space Command detachment at Peterson AFB. He briefly mentioned a control room visit once, so I'll look into it. No, you don't get to see the classified stuff...even if you could tell what it is.

*USAF Academy — Visitor center is free and the famous chapel (NOT built from spare airplane parts, as rumored) is open daily. The trip can continue into CS to get either the best barbecue or German food in Colorado. Or maybe one of three distilleries or several breweries.

*Back to FlyteCo — In the wake of our 5-star rated 2023 banquet, several members are interested in going back as a group for some social time.

So that should keep us busy for awhile. Hit me at dreamwoodck@yahoo.com with your ideas, and if you want to register high interest in any of what's here. I'll turn up the heat on what seems the most popular and from here I'll get with Jim and the VPs to target some dates.

volunteered in a number of ways. He passed away of natural causes this past fall.



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


