

## TO PULL OR NOT TO PULL???

This Chapter 25 Newsletter article from December 1994 starts out:

Below is another article concerning the age-old issue of pulling the prop through by hand in cold weather before starting. Although it is not a new article, it gives some food for thought and is still relevant today.

## SHOULD I PULL THE PROP THROUGH BY HAND? IF SO, IN WHAT DIRECTION?

The questions above are often asked by engine owners. In particular, they also want to know if there is any benefit or harm in moving the prop backwards.

Let's consider why these questions seem to come up rather frequently. To begin, those who have flown radial engines were taught to pull the prop through before every start. The purpose was to establish that oil had not drained to the bottom cylinders where it might produce hydraulic locking on start, and thereby cause engine damage. This is not a requirement for flat, opposed cylinder engines.

A second aspect of pulling the prop through by hand is the cold weather start. An article in Flyer No. 6 in February 1967 was entitled "Cold Weather Tips". That article recommended pulling the prop through as a means of preparing the engine for a cold weather start. Based on the experience at the time, it was a reasonable recommendation but today we have more knowledge about cold weather starting.

During a three year period in the late 1970's, Lycoming engineers conducted extensive cold room tests with the flat opposed cylinder engine. Thousands of cold starts were accomplished. A recent review of the data from these tests indicate that pulling the prop through by hand is an unnecessary exercise. It is safer to turn the prop with the starter and the engine must be running to pump enough oil to provide lubrication.

If cold weather starting is more difficult than you think it should be, pulling the prop through by hand is NOT recommended, but you may want to consider these two possibilities. Preheat the engine; it assists with vaporization of the fuel and speeds up lubrication on engine start. Review your procedures for engine prime in cold weather; achieving the correct fuel/air mixture is necessary for easy starting.

Should there ever be an occasion when it is necessary to move the prop by hand, turning it backwards is not recommended. It has been found that this may tend to break the vanes on the vacuum pump. And, any movement of the propeller should be done with caution. Be sure the magneto switch is OFF, and treat the prop blade just as if the engine were going to start.





## Minutes for EAA Chapter 43 Meeting July 10, 2021

### TONIGHT'S PROGRAM started at 6:02

Speaker BIO



Mr. Ron Cole is a senior intelligence leader with 55 years-plus of experience in the Intelligence Community (IC). He has supported federal government agencies and private firms on policy, management, and technical issues, and he has deep knowledge of the IC from his long tenure with the National Security Agency (NSA) as well as decade long support to the National Reconnaissance Office (NRO) and the National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency (NGA).

Ron began his intelligence career as technical analyst with the U.S. Air Force where he served for seven years with assignments in Germany, Korea and Texas.

Mr. Cole then began a 27-year tenure at the NSA, where he rose from a technical analyst to a senior representative to multiple agency customers and as an integrated officer with other IC agencies. He was also a senior manager of a 300-person field operation.

He followed his NSA career with ten years at Scitor Corporation as a systems engineer technical advisor to the NSA and the NRO on systems development and data processing which included managing the corporate software development lab.

Mr. Cole then moved to Riverside Research supporting the NGA as a senior advisor on technology development for mission execution and was instrumental in establishing a new NGA office in Colorado. He also was the Chair of the Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Center of Excellence at Riverside Research, where he served as a senior technical advisor across all business units and on business development opportunities. His last five years were served as the Chief of Staff for the NRO at a major field organization.

Mr. Cole earned his BS from the University of Maryland; his MA from Salve Regina University, RI; and, he is a graduate of the Naval War College. While serving at the NSA, Mr. Cole received the Civilian Defense Meritorious Award and was awarded the NRO Gold Medal.

He has served as a board member of the Colorado Space Business Roundtable, editor for the Rocky Mountain Unmanned Aerial System Association, and technical reviewer of aerospace small business grant requests for the Colorado Office of Economic Development. He served as Vice Chairman and Chairman of the Aurora Chamber of Commerce's Defense Council and is currently Chairman for the Board of Trustees of the Douglas County Libraries.

Mr. Cole established the *Independent IC Consultancy, LLC (I2C2)* to provide professional advice to elements of the Intelligence Community in September 2016.

The following is a summary of the presentation which was distributed to the membership via email.

Defense in CO

Defense accounts for 148,000 jobs (9.5% of jobs in Colorado), \$16.4 billion in labor income; 409,000 retirees; a total of \$36.6 billion in economic impact. All 64 Colorado counties have defense income from

Kiowa with just 11 employees to El Paso with 121,035. Colorado has the #1 private aerospace and #2 space economy with 290 businesses employing 33,110 direct and 231,270 indirect. Defense businesses saw 10% growth in 2020; the US average was 4%. Ron also listed the Aerospace Organizations in the state.

The global space economy has grown by more than 70% since 2010 and continues to grow. There are more than 2200 satellites active in orbit, with more coming (especially Space-X StarLink minisats).

Colorado Spaceport's (was Front Range) Director is Dave Ruppel, former Naval aviator. Ron showed the airport layout; runway 17/35 will be extended to 10,000' and there are two more 8000' runways. A 6500 acre business park is planned. They're also working on Main Ramp rehab and a large hangar project. Companies with a presence at the Spaceport include Reaction Engine—Sabre class engines; PD Aerospace (Japan) - spaceplane design and manufacturing for commercial flights has a Letter of Intent in place for an office at the Spaceport. Cliff mentioned Boom Aviation.

Future Possibilities include space tourism; space pilot training; personnel exchange with the British Spaceport; payload delivery; manufacturing of space and ground vehicles, monitors, sensors, electronics, UAVs and robotics systems. Long term plans include support of point-to-point cargo in 10 years and commercial flights in 15-20 years; Ron showed a Sequence of Operations for such flights.



Space Force has a mission that includes "organize, train, and equip space forces in order to protect U.S. and allied interests in space ..."

Ron showed the top level organization chart and said that Space Force divisions include Deltas, commanded by colonels and trained for specific missions and operations; and Garrisons, also commanded by colonels and responsible for providing support functions to the Deltas assigned to their installations.

Garrisons do not oversee Deltas, they are peer organizations. Ron showed the current U.S. Space Command Base locations and responsibilities, including Space Force Headquarters at Peterson Garrison in Colorado. Headquarters may relocate to Huntsville AL in 2025.

Questions: Kirk Brennan asked what the main driver for the growth of Front Range; Ron said it was support from Adams County Commissioners.

Someone asked about the military's relation to 5G; it causes interference with GPS, Space Comms, and weather satellites. There are also issues between StarLink and astronomy.

Ron noted that Jay Lindell, a retired 2-star general, is working with the State of Colorado to promote aerospace and aviation, with annual outreach to rural schools.

Cliff asked what the requirements were for spaceplanes with regard to satellite size; they need to be able to deliver a 250# satellite to low earth orbit (LEO) or carry a similar amount trans-Pacific.

Stephanie asked about Front Range's relation to other launch sites/spaceports (Boca Chica, New Mexico, etc. They are supposed to coordinate, but are dealing with a COVID hitch.

Quill asked what differentiates an airport from a spaceport. Mostly the effort to promote space businesses. A space plane can use any longish runway airfield.

Connie asked about Front Range's airspace class.

Cliff Goldstein thanked Ron and we went on break.

Meeting opened at 6:53 pm by Cliff Goldstein


Dave Shenk is proud of not talking on a trip to ??? And back. (Oops, meant to catch Dave after the meeting, then forgot... - Secretary)

## **SAFETY REPORT** – Stephanie Wells

When we fly Young Eagles, what is our responsibility as PIC? (Short Answer, FAR 91.3) Stephanie suggested a standardized Young Eagle passenger briefing she referred to as SCET:

- Seats, Seatbelt, HeadSet use
- Controls—when it's okay to touch
- Exits, Emergencies
- Traffic and Talking

John Reading noted that if the kids can't hear themselves, neither can the pilot.

Stephanie spent time in the Air Force Reserves flying C-5s in Desert Storm with mixed crews and unfamiliar planes, but the training is so standardized that wasn't usually a problem. The crews were on 7 day trips and the C-5 has three pilot positions—Commander, First Pilot, and Second Pilot. There were lots of reserve pilots trained as First Pilot, and Stephanie noted that on one occasion, 4-5 days into the trip the two pilots flying one plane realized they were both First Pilots and the crew had no Commander! In response to a question from the group, Stephanie replied that the C-5 was rated for 769,000 lb max gross, with up to 847,000 lb waivered for Desert Storm.

## YOUNG EAGLES - Cliff Hasenbalg

Next Rally: Our next Rally is August 21st with over 30 kids, COVID II. There are 3 pilots so far, more are needed. John Reading is trying to finish a cylinder rebuild in time. Stan Specht shared an anecdote, he and Pete Watkins ran into a helicopter (not the flying kind) dad with 5 kids who HAD to fly with his kids. The hangar owner's son used to race Glasairs at Reno and has everything needed to repair the wing or load it up; Cliff will bring it home and repair the wing in his garage. His friend's Comp Air 7 engine will be back soon.
