It came to me on the recent outing to Hill Air Force Base in Utah. I watched Major Brent "Poker" Choate tunnel his way into a supersonic F-16A Fighting Falcon. One has to stand on the seat of the 32'8" wingspan fighter to get in. It's a small plane for ~\$14.6 million, 3' less wingspan than a Piper Comanche. Your legs go into what are best described as tunnels surrounded by instruments and controls. You strap into a seat angled back at 30°. Scott Serani commented that it looked tighter than my little Pixie. It was, a bunch tighter.

My thought.... What a gift it is that we have. Not the fighter pilots, but us, you and me. How lucky we are that we can get into our own private planes. Our planes are planes that we own, care for and often built ourselves, our planes that we can fly when we wish. Dustin Putnam Chief Pilot Kepler Spacecraft

Dustin received his Bachelor's degree in Aerospace Engineering from Iowa State in 1994 and his Master's degree in Aeronautics and Astronautics from Stanford University in 2000. He has worked at Ball Aerospace for nearly 18 years as a spacecraft control system engineer. His work has primarily focused on spacecraft orientation control, but he has also worked in the mechanism pointing and tracking area. He started work on the Kepler program in 2004 just prior to preliminary design review, and continues to support spacecraft on-orbit operations. He has supported numerous other spacecraft during his time at Ball as well.

Dustin will speak to us about the Kepler Spacecraft, which orbits the sun and observes patches of sky for extended periods of time to find small anomalies in space.

Dustin will talk about the Science of what the telescope is observing, and then the mechanics of building, launching and piloting, the spacecraft to insure a stable craft so that the telescope is as still as possible, to observe distant objects.



APPROVAL OF FEBRUARY MINUTES (and cookie awards) – Val Gregory

Bill Mitchell motioned that the minutes be accepted, Scott McEwen seconded and the minutes were approved. Jeff Cain, John Evens, and Steve Beach received cookies for catching errors in the March newsletter.

Scott shared a note from a scholarship winner's mom.

PROJECT REPORTS

Zach Malone completed gluing up his Pitts S-1 ailerons today (Mar 10).

SAFETY REPORT – (Photo of military crash into hangar)

Bill Mitchell related his recent accident at Longmont. He was flying with a new T-18 owner who needed 2 hours with a CFI. The plane had a recent A&P inspection. Jay, the pilot, was very professional. The wind speed was approximately 3 kts. They took off, performed maneuvers, landed, taxied and took off again. On the final landing, the plane veered to the right even though the left pedal was to the floor, went off the runway and flipped. The pilot is paralyzed from the solar plexus down, maybe permanently. He is 28 years old and very fit. Bill blacked out during the accident and didn't come to until in the hospital. His injuries included 2 broken ribs and a punctured lung, along with facial, arm, and scalp cuts from the canopy. The A&P inspector may not have inspected the control cables thoroughly – it broke at a passthrough, though there was no binding in previous operation. Someone brought flowers to the hospital – for Mary. Cliff Goldstein called Bill while the doctor was stitching Bill's arm and joked that the doc was doing the best he could with the material at hand. Bill thanked Mary publicly for her support. There was a question about the harness – it was good, because Bill was still hanging in it when he was removed from the plane. Zach Malone asked about the roll structure – it was present

and largely undamaged. Glenn Hetchler asked Bill to repeat what would have happened if the cable had broken in the air – it probably would have resulted in a non-survivable crash. There was no crosswind at Longmont. Bill and Jay were sent to separate hospitals to spread the load.

Stan Specht showed us an LED light used for inspection which was accidently left in his engine exhaust on a flight to Greeley. He had wondered the night before if he'd put it away, then forgot to check before taking off. Make notes of stuff like that!

Bill Mitchell told a story of selling a T-18 to a mechanically-challenged Niwot banker. The banker asked Bill to install a brake system, but he declined and the banker got someone else. The plane nosed down under braking and broke the prop, and Bill suggested that the banker plug/cover the carbs while the cowling was off for the prop replacement – the guy called a few days later with engine problems – he'd left the plugs in.

Cliff Goldstein sold his Bonanza (after flying it for 21 years) to a former F-16 pilot (her husband was a C-17 pilot and her parents worked for United). Cliff went up with her to shoot some touch & gos – she started to land sideways in a crosswind, used to the F-16 which can land crooked and straighten. She was unable to land on the runway centerline.

John Evens was filming the departure of his T-18 when he was interrupted by a phone call from Tony Cochran. Then the T-18 returned because the pilot couldn't hear the radio clearly. They troubleshot the headphones and jacks, and finally pulled the radio for bench testing at the shop, where it worked fine. Turns out the pilot had brought his standalone Garmin ADS-B and its lithium ion battery was the source of the RF interference.

YOUNG EAGLES – Cliff Hasenbalg

195 credits from 2017 means \$975 for the Chapter 43 Young Eagles, based on 175 flights in Cliff's records. Robert Ellis in Haviland, KS donated his 34 flights to Chapter 43, resulting in a total of 209 credits! Cliff suggested that Chapter 43 Young Eagles consider a traveling Young Eagles Road Show – holding events at Fort Morgan, Sterling, and other outlying airfields. Advertise in the local newspaper a month before with the Young Eagles website for signup. 32 kids are signed up for the 3/17 event along with 6 pilots and 5 ground crew. Cliff reminded pilots to check their paperwork, currency, and Youth Protection training. Cliff listed the pilots that he still has 2017 awards for. He told us that the credits are used to send kids to camp at Oshkosh and to pay for supplies for the Young Eagle events.

YOUNG AVIATORS - Scott Serani

The Young Aviators kicked off the year at the Longmont Expo Maker Faire, running B25 missions and assembling cell phone stands while in line – 350 cell stands completed in 2 days! Walt Barbo from the Fantasy of Flight Foundation has donated an enclosed trailer to the Young Aviators, who are now looking for four flight simulators they can install in the trailer. Dave Shenk noted that there were 50 to 60 exhibitors at the Maker Faire.

TECH COUNSELORS

Phil Brown inspected Nick Pfannenstiel's Timber Tiger last week. He discussed bushings in through holes and leading-edge protrusions.

Cross-Pollinating – Cliff Hasenbalg

Cliff is a 24-year member of the Colorado Model A Ford Club, which has a membership of 120+ families. He's also a member of the Model A Ford Club of America. He's served on the Board of Directors 4 times (2-year terms) and has been the Parade and Contest Chair and Secretary. He has attended regional meets in Tulsa, Des Moines, Wichita, Kansas City, Omaha, and Dallas, as well as national meets in Cincinnati and Reno. National meets for 2018 will be held in Reno and Branson, though the Colorado Club will be taking Amtrak to Reno rather than driving. Cliff owns a '28 Phaeton and a '29 pickup. He described a recent accident with the pickup on I25. Club members wear period dress for events, which include manifold cooking tours! The Hubley Derby (an event similar to the Boy Scout's Pinewood Derbies) originated with the Colorado Club. Cliff showed photos from a recent Natchez, Tennessee to Missouri tour, including a roadside clutch repair. There's a good availability of OEM parts and tires, including Burt's Early Ford in Denver. TONIGHT'S PROGRAM

Gina Moretto is an FAA Safety Manager. Her career includes time with the DoD, Army, and Air Force Reserve with 21 years of carrier experience and 2 years with helicopters. She advised us to treat old aircraft with care. Starting 7 years ago she started reporting on accident investigations and probably cause – maintenance issues are more visible, especially failure to follow procedures. The manufacturing process of parts is showing more defects, especially in landing gear. Gina commented that in her military career, she has seen lots of round patches in old war birds – signs of battle damage.

Human factors – how does maintenance relate to safety? Air Transport Canada came up with the "Dirty Dozen" factors that contribute to 80% of aircraft failures. Items with an asterisk tend to dominate:

- 1. Lack of Communication
- 2. Complacency
- 3. Lack of Knowledge
- 4. Distractions
- 5. Lack of Team Work
- 6. Fatigue*

- 7. Lack of Resources
- 8. Pressure*
- 9. Lack of Assertiveness
- 10. Stress
- 11. Lack of Awareness
- 12. Norms (We've always done it this way)

Gina showed a YouTube video on the Dirty Dozen. She told a story of finding an antique bucking bar in a C-130 wing flap. FAAsafety.gov has courses; Cliff Hasenbalg asked if the courses can be credited to AMT. The FAA has an awards programs for technicians and pilots.
