We still have work sessions on the second and fourth Saturdays of the month at the SAC to work on various improvement and maintenance projects. Everyone is invited. This is a tremendous accomplishment for the Chapter, and one we can all be proud of. We now have a great home, and a facility that we can use to help accomplish our mission of working together, having fun doing it, and reaching out to the aviation community and the community at large.

Also, since we are doing a lot of planning for the day camp, we are going to be holding workshops to show the kids different construction techniques. We can do the same for our adult members if there is enough interest. This might involve building a wing rib, getting some instruction on welding, doing fabric covering, or building an electrical system. The list is endless, and we need some feedback from all of you, before we can start to plan what might be appropriate. I think anyone who is interested in aviation would enjoy something like these potential workshops. The cost would be very modest in order to cover the cost of materials. We will also be having sessions at various homebuilder's shops as in the past.

We are still discussing ways to energize our homebuilder's community and to get new people engaged. Among the options that we have talked about is the prospect of establishing a Chapter Project. This could involve one of a number of possible projects. We could build an aircraft from scratch, acquire an aircraft that needs restoration, or find a project that is partially complete to finish. We will be establishing a planning group to evaluate these different options and to me up with a recommended approach. Finally, if we were to have a Chapter Project of building an airplane, what would we do with it? Well, we could sell it to raise funds for the Chapter. Or... we could establish a flying club, and members of that club could then utilize the aircraft. This is one of the things we are discussing, and if anyone is interested, get involved in the group planning a project.

Remember that **homebuilding** is perhaps the least expensive way of all to get into the air, and is a lot of fun. Any type of aircraft from ultralights to turbine powered can be homebuilt. Not only is it a great way to have your own aircraft, building it is fun and provides a great sense of accomplishment. EAA was founded by homebuilders and offers unparalleled support, training and help for those who want to do this. With the options available today, and support from EAA, almost anyone can successfully complete a project.

We are again supporting the Spencerport Rotary Club Fly-in/Drive-in Breakfast on August 23rd at Ledgedale Airport (our home base). This is the same event we worked on with them last year. Again, we would like to have an open house and display of aircraft for visitors. If anyone would like to help out with planning, or offer up ideas for the open house, it would be very much appreciated. Our primary role will be to manage ramp traffic, and to encourage attendees to view the aircraft and attend the open house.

I think it will be fun to watch this new segment of aviation develop. It is important that we push forward on new areas of technology. At this point, we are behind quite a few other countries on the commercial use of drones. Let's move forward!

What about a **hybrid aircraft propulsion system** using a micro turbine/battery combo to provide power? The are existing technologies applied in other areas of power generation and transportation. Why not in aviation?


