

## **Passing of Evelyn Amsler**

Evelyn Alice Amsler, long time Chapter 44 member, passed away September 27, 2023 at the Buffalo, NY VA hospital.

She was born on a farm in Malone NY, 93 years ago on September 14, 1930. After high school, Evelyn entered the Air Force, worked her way into officer candidate school, and earned the rank of Lieutenant. She had 12 years active duty in Korea and the early days of Vietnam. She then spent 12 more years in the Air Force Reserves, earning the rank of Captain.

After a few years sailing the Caribbean in an old 32 ft. gaff rigged yawl, she started work as a clerk for the Dept. of Agriculture in Tampa, FL. Ten years later she was a management analyst in Washington DC. During the Ford administration, Evelyn was singled out as one of 50 in the entire US government doing the most to eliminate excess paperwork and duplication of efforts.

In 1979, Evelyn married David Amsler, and they lived in the Chicago, IL area until after David retired. They then moved to western New York State.

In 1983, Evelyn obtained her pilot license. She flew a Luscombe 8A, Cessna 150 and Grumman Cheetah airplanes. In 2013, Evelyn joined the Ninety-Nines becoming a Lifetime member. She also served as a Director on the NY-NJ Section BOD.

David, with some help of Evelyn, built their Sonex, and they flew all over together. Here's a picture of Evelyn and David arriving in their Sonex for the Ford Tri-Motor event in 2016.

#### Former BART Member gets his Private Pilot License (Certificate)

Dhruva Singh Rana VI, a fomer BART member, recently passed his check ride for his Private Pilot License (or Certificate). Below is what he wrote to EAA 44 member Frances Englund.

Good Afternoon, Frances,

Since you had asked about the PPL check ride, here are the details:

It was held on 9/28/23, the actual flight was around 0750. There weren't many clouds until the end and the weather was good and smooth.

Location was Arlington Municipal Airport [KGKY] with the Golf Aero flight School in Texas around the Dallas-Fort Worth Area. My Nav Logs were planned for Waco Regional Airport [KACT] and [can't remember the third destination]

My DPE, Dustin, didn't really make me do an oral. I just showed up with all the calculated weight and balance as well as filled out Nav Logs. The only things we ever talked about were looking up the additional requirements for endorsements in Part 61 and FSS frequencies and how to find them on sectional charts.

Dustin had been a flight instructor for ~40 years and started as a balloon pilot at a young age. He perfectly understood that I was a Glider pilot for five years and hence he kind of just flew through all the oral stuff and didn't really force me to recite anything while I was in the airplane. The only thing he said before we got on the plane was "Don't scare the examiner and keep flying the plane."

The flying portion felt more like a strict flying lesson than a check ride. He would always give me stern warnings to stay in the ACS and kept saying things like "Don't do x", "Please avoid doing x", Make sure you do y so you can proceed with x." Basically, I was unlearning 30% of the content and maneuvers that my single-engine instructors had taught me. It gave me so much anxiety that I thought I was failing the check ride. Around every 10-15 minutes I would ask "Did I fail??" and Dustin would reply "No! Did I say you did?"

When I landed, and secured the plane, I went back to the Terminal and Dustin congratulated me on a

Temporary certificate of my Single Engine PPL and then we had a debrief. He explained to me that apparently I was flying really well and he was just holding me to a higher standard.


So as of right now, I'm taking the ground school for Instrument and Flight Engineer ratings. and I am currently looking to build hours and get additional endorsements.

Glider flying has been rather okay more or less but it's a separate discussion.

Overall I'm very excited to move forward and to see what comes next.


