
I would greatly appreciate anyone coming out to help us with the final push to completion of our chapter house. Work sessions are on the second and fourth Saturday of the month.

PAULISMS

In 1953, Paul Poberezny and about a dozen local aviation enthusiasts met to form a new organization intended to help those interested in building their own aircraft share knowledge and work through the bureaucracy to license and fly their creations. I doubt that anyone at that meeting, and certainly not Paul, knew what would grow out of that evening. By 1984, the first year I traveled to Oshkosh, EAA had already grown into a major, international organization. But some things never changed, especially Paul's dedication to the organization he created, and the people that were the organization.



Over the years, I had the opportunity and the privilege of corresponding, talking and meeting with Paul many times. When I called EAA in Oshkosh, he might not be able to take my call right away, but I always got a prompt return call. (By the way, this trait also passed on to his son Tom.) He was never too busy to stop and talk with any member, or visitor, that wanted to talk. I doubt that he really remembered too many details about who I was, but he remembered EAA 44, and so we were old buddies.

Back in the late 1980s I had a gent by name of Dick Warboys travel to Oshkosh in my group. Dick flew a P47 over the beach at Normandy on D-Day. I made it a point to find Paul in his famous "Red One" VW bug so I could introduce Dick to him. Turns out they went through the same Army Air Forces Flight school, one rotation apart. For the next half hour, I just stood back and listened as the stories flowed.

In many ways, Paul was ahead of his time. A modest man, he simply knew how to deal with people to make them want to do more with him. Over the years, Paul made many observations and comments. Often short and to the point, they said a lot about the man, and the objectives he had for the organization he created. Built largely on a memorial display assembled in his honor at AirVenture 2014, this space will carry a short quote each month for as long as our members keep reading them. (Or until I run out of quotes, whichever comes first.)

Paul H. Poberezny founded the Experimental Aircraft Association in 1953 and spent a significant part of his life promoting aviation and fighting for the freedom to fly. Paul was an aviator and an aircraft designer. But, more than that, he was a leader. I affectionately provide this collection of "Paulisms," actual quotations from Paul that embody his beliefs, his legacy, and his impact on EAA.

January Paulism: Passion – I fell in love with aviation, as well as with people.

^ Fund Raising. The Board will discuss potential fund raisers at the January BOD Meeting. Preliminary ideas include the Air Lift, special dinner or chili cook-off and an opening deer hunting day breakfast at the SAC. Other ways to increase revenue will be explored such as increasing our exposure to the local community (Brockport) and to "rent out" the SAC to local organizations. The SAC could become the meeting place of choice if we increased the word of mouth exposure.

^ Youth Outreach. The chapter needs to develop a more enhanced Youth Outreach program and needs more volunteers to become involved in this effort. Ideas include a program with the Brockport School System, a STEM project with a City of Rochester School (like School 34) and a week-long aviation day camp followed by a Young Eagles flight.

^ Visitor/Member Welcoming & Enrollment Process. Our process of welcoming and processing visitors & members needs to be streamlined and documented. Jeff Peters will coordinate this effort with Phil Hazen.


