The Airport Commission and the Tree

By Joe Messinger: I attended the last Roseburg Airport Commission meeting and during the audience participation part of the meeting I addressed the issue of the tree that is in the flight-path of runway 34. As you know, each year the tree grows a bit and gets a little closer to landing aircraft. In fact, I understand it has been struck on two occasions. Needless to say, these pilots were a bit low. As you know, everybody has a different landing technique and student pilots are still developing theirs.

City Manager, C. Lance Colley and Public Works Director, Nikki Messenger were in attendance, representing the city of Roseburg. They defended the city's inaction to this point by saying that the tree was covered by a NOTAM, which is true as noted here and taken from the FAA website: (KRBG ROSEBURG RGNL

PRBG **05/003** RBG OBST TREES (ASN UNKNOWN) 431345N1232122W (576FT S APCH END RWY 34) 620FT (86FT AGL) NOT LGTD 1805182107-1812312359)

I responded that even though this information is available and all pilots are supposed to be fully informed about the airport at which they are landing, not all pilots are so judicious about reading NO-TAMS. Also discussed was the precision approach path indicator, or PAPI, which is in place but waiting FAA approval and electrical hookup before it is turned on. Nikki Messenger stated that if the PAPI is flown properly the tree is not an issue. The other pilots in the room, Airport Commissioners, Dave Morrison, Frank Inman, Clint Newell, Dan Sprague and Rob Levin, ex-officio member of the commission, all chimed in and agreed the tree is a hazard and pointed out the obvious, that an inoperative PAPI does no good.

As Clint Newell pointed out, most pilots will fly the PAPI until they have the runway "made" and then begin their flare. This is about the time one passes over the tree, which appears to be in close alignment with the runway. Most pilots switch their concentration from their landing target to the end of the runway as they set up their flare for landing, further compounding the problem by switching their attention away from the tree. During the flare many pilots increase their rate of decent until they are in ground effect.

The city representatives responded with a comment that the situation is being studied. At the end of the meeting I was approached by Commission Chair, Linda Fisher-Fowler, Councilor, Ward One, who thanked me for attending and bringing this issue to the attention of the commission.

<u>Airport Master Plan: Chapter 4 Improvement Alternatives Draft</u>. By scrolling down to page 8, labeled Alternative 1 - Maintain 4 Degree PAPI, you will see the plan the city prefers.

Alternative 2 - 3.77 Degree PAPI, seen on page 11 of the report addresses the removal of 70,000 cubic yards of soil from Mt Nebo and should allow for a safer approach to runway 34 for larger aircraft. Alternatives 3, 4 and 5 are both prohibitively expensive and/or illogical.

Smaller aircraft that turn base between the end of runway 34 and Mt. Nebo are not affected by the hill. It's only when flying a longer approach from the south that Mt. Nebo becomes an issue. Until the situation is resolved, aircraft arriving KRBG at night under VFR conditions may legally land. It's only night IFR operations that are restricted. I realize this is an abbreviated discussion of a complicated issue and the reader is encouraged to look at the Roseburg City website for the full picture.

Since the same City representatives were in attendance at the open house, I again brought up the matter of the tree since it was not addressed in any of the plans on display. We discussed the issue and I received the same, "we are studying it," answer. I had driven up to the home on NW Meloy Ave. and got a look at the property for myself. I found Meloy is a dead end dirt road leading up to a few modest homes with several vehicles parked here and there. The tree appears to be a focal point to the home at that address and removal of it would, no doubt, devalue the property considerably. I asked Mr. Colley what if any was the property owner's response about the hazard to aviation this tree is causing. He told me that nobody from the city had spoken with the owners. It seems to me that would be a good place to start.
