The rivets are part of Van's Aircraft skill building practice kit. You build a little aluminum toolbox using some of the same skills and tools used to build one of the company's aircraft kits.

This kit has embodied the typical homebuilding experience in many ways. I purchased the kit more years ago than I can remember. I borrowed some tools from the Chapter, bucked most of the rivets on the sides and then was stumped on the the hinge for the lid. It went on the shelf for a long time as everyday life took over. When I got it out again, I messed up the hinge and bought a new one from Aircraft Spruce on a trip to Airventure. I made a modification to the lid with another Chapter member that did not work, so I bought another kit from Van's just so I could get another lid. I figured out how to use the original lid, but it was lucky I bought the second kit because it allowed me to reproduce some small parts I had lost along the way. After the cat found the rivets, I bucked some more rivets on the toolbox, thanks to Tim showing me how to use a pneumatic tool I had never used before. Just the handle

and latch left to go.

Delays, lost or remade parts, learning from Chapter members, and a little perseverance, all things this simple toolbox kit has in common with any airplane project.

Chapter Meeting Minutes

06 Oct 2022

Meeting called to order at 7:05 p.m. by Mark Pankratz

- Neil presented the new big money 50/50. The prize is \$250, each ticket costs \$25 and a maximum of 20 tickets will be sold. The raffle will be held until 20 tickets are sold; winner need not be present to win.
- A lot of new faces this evening.
- Hans Hoffmeyer, a student at Bravo, stopped by this evening.
- Roger Huggins, PPL/IR/Rusty Pilot who's done most of his flying on the West coast.
- Chuck Nicholas, PPL/IR/CAP, helped with RV10.
- Dean presented Mia Anderson (our latest Ray Scholar) with an Ray Scholar hat, shirt, and pin. She has 10 hours and is nearly ready to solo.
- Fly-In at Smoketown, Easton, Shoestring (0P2), and Cheat River this Saturday.
- Next weekend, Chapter 240 at New Garden is having a breakfast 8:30-11:30 am.
- Veterans Build working on landing gear (2 brackets took 6 hours), going through plans to be sure nothing was missed. November 9 is confirmed ship date for finish kit from Zenith.
- RV12 build is going well. Rudder, vertical stabilizer, and stabilator are finished. Working on tail cone now and may outrun their kit orders at this point. Currently waiting for fuselage kit to show up. If anyone is thinking of building an RV, please come by Thursday and Saturday mornings.
- If anyone is interested in a t-shirt or polo (with or without pocket), see Tim and let him know what you'd like. Final cost will be between \$25 and \$35 (final price TBD). There will be a slight markup to help the Chapter cover costs and go back into the Chapter funds.
- Steve Gross reported that the RV10 has gone through the 40 hours. Have worked through the last of the avionics glitches, but noticed blue staining under the left wing (fuel sender was the suspect and replaced, but issue continued) and some rivet weeping. They flew to Leesburg to get avionics work done and noticed on the top side of one of the tanks, 4 rivets in a row were spilling gas. They flew it back to FDK and found 40 leaks in the quick-build tank that came from Vans. The leaks were likely due to high vapor pressures in July and August. Now has the tank down to one leak. Steve called Vans about the issue and said it would be 6 months; their next response was to send a kit to build one in-hangar. Finally, Vans found wings that were recalled for corrosion that had good tanks and is sending a tank from one of those wings and sent it in.
- Paul Chang is building an RV10 elevator and folded one of the edges improperly but showed Steve and he said it would be fine. Priming tomorrow, and riveting vertical stabilizer, rudder, horizontal stabilizer, and then starting on trim tabs. Tailcone by the end of the month.
- Michael Bishop has a Quicksilver and a couple other parts and pieces of 2 others. If anyone is interested in helping, he's at MD20 in Taneytown, MD.
- Jerry Blake presented "Charles & Anne Morrow Lindbergh: Their Lives & Times, The Formative Years"
- \bullet 50/50 was \$110; \$55 to and \$55 to the scholarship fund.










Charles & Morrow Lindbergh Presentation



Charles Lindbergh 1906-1919

- During these years Charles lives with his Mother and, except for periodic visits, separate from his father.
- He attended schools in Washington, D. C., Redondo Beach, CA and Little Falls, MN.
- In his high school senior year he is back in Little Falls and successfully running the family farm.
- World War 1 gives him the opportunity to leave school early to provide food for the war effort and still obtain his diploma without any examinations.

Charles Lindbergh 1922

- On April 8, 1922 Charles takes his first airplane flight in a Lincoln Standard Tourabout. He shares the front passenger cockpit with 16 year old Harland "Bud" Gurney, who will become a life long friend.
- By the end of May 1922 he had received about eight hours of flight instruction.
- The only airplane the NAC has for flight instruction is sold to Lincoln pilot Erold G. Bahl who plans to barnstorm the airplane throughout the mid west.

Charles Lindbergh 1922

- C. A. Lindbergh pays for tuition at the Nebraska Aircraft Corporation (N A C).
- On April 3, 1922 Charles begins his training at NAC by helping to recondition some of their airplanes. He replaces aircraft fabric covering, replaces engines and helps in aircraft reassembly.

Jerry began the presentation introducing two books that are referenced down below. I have included a few samples of his presentation slides but can't begin to give it justice. Suffice it to say that the career path and successes of the "Lindbergh" family were colorful and not without some difficulties. Jerry terminated the presentation with the completion of the Spirit of St Louis and its preparation for the trip to Paris


A. Scott Berg's Pulitzer Prize-winning biography of Charles Lindberg remains "the definitive account" of one of the 20th century's most extraordinary figures. Lindbergh's is "a dramatic and disturbing American story," says the "Los Angeles Times Book Review, and this biography—the first to be written with unrestricted access to the Lindbergh archives and extensive interviews of his friends, colleagues, and close family members—is "a thorough, level-headed evaluation of the glories, tragedies, and often infuriating complexities of this extraordinary life" (Newsday).

"The Wright Brothers 1904 & 1905. Developing and Flight Testing The Wright Flyer II and The Wright Flyer III "

The book, written by Gerard Blake, covers the trials and tribulations of developing the Kitty Hawk 1903 engineering proof of concept airplane into a practical flying machine using the Wright's notebooks as the primary reference. The five dollar cost is for the benefit of the chapter hangar rent fund and not Frederick Sport Flyers.

Thank you This Day in Aviation

9 October 1912: In October, Lieutenants Henry H. Arnold and Thomas DeWitt Milling, both assigned to the Aeronautical Division, Signal Corps, United States Army, were ordered to enter the competition for the first Mackay Trophy for "the most outstanding military flight of the year." Milling withdrew because of illness shortly after the competition started.

"Hap" Arnold won when he flew a 40-horsepower Wright Model B biplane over a triangular course from College Park to Washington Barracks at Washington D.C., on to Fort Myers, Virginia, and back to College Park . . .

The Model B was powered by a single water-cooled, fuel-injected, 240.528 cubic-inch-displacement (3.942 liter) Wright vertical overhead-valve inline four-cylinder gasoline engine with 2 valves per cylinder and a compression ratio of 4.165:1. It produced 32 horsepower at 1,310 r.p.m. During three years of production (1908–1911) Wright "4-40" engines were built that operated from 1,325 to 1,500 r.p.m. Power output ranged from 28 to 40 horsepower. These engines weighed from 160 to 180 pounds (72.6–81.6 kilograms).

Two 8½ foot (2.591 meters) diameter, two-bladed, counter-rotating propellers, driven by a chain drive, are mounted behind the wings in pusher configuration. They turned 445 r.p.m.

The Wright Model B had a maximum speed of approximately 40 miles per hour (64 kilometers per hour) and its range was 110 miles (177 kilometers).

Approximately 100 Model B aeroplanes were built by the Wrights and under license by Burgess from 1910 to 1914. Three are known to exist.

Arnold won the Mackay Trophy again in 1934 when he commanded a flight of ten Martin B-10 bombers from Bolling Field, Washington, D.C., to Fairbanks, Alaska, and back.

Lieutenant Arnold went on to have a successful career in military aviation.
