





#### Back to the United States

- After celebrations in Paris, Lindbergh fly's the Spirit of St. Louis to Brussels, Belgium and then on to England.
- He lands at Croydon Aerodrome, London on May 29, 1927

#### Lindbergh in London

- After several days of celebration the Spirit of St. Louis is disassembled, crated and placed onboard the USS Memphis.
- On June 3, 1927 Lindbergh sails for home aboard the Memphis.


#### Lindbergh Back in the U.S.A.

- He arrives back in the USA on June 11, 1927 and is greeted by hundreds of thousands of people at celebrations in Washington, D.C., New York City, and St. Louis.
- Within one month of his return he receives offers for speaking engagements, personal appearances, film contracts and business propositions worth five million dollars.
- He turns them all down.


On June 16, 1927 Raymond Orteig awarded Charles Lindbergh the prize for his nonstop New York to Paris flight.







# The Forty Eight State Tour 1927

- The Guggenheim Fund for the Promotion of Aeronautics offers to support Lindbergh on a tour of all forty eight states in the Spirit of St. Louis.
- Lindbergh accepts the offer and will be paid \$50,000.00.
- The tour begins on July 23<sup>rd</sup> and ends on October 23<sup>rd</sup> at Mitchel Field, Long Island.



#### **Route of 48 State Tour**

Lindbergh fly's west across the northern states, south down the western coast, east across the southern states then north up the east coast.


#### Anne Spencer Morrow 1927

- Anne's father is appointed Ambassador to Mexico by President Calvin Coolidge.
- He invites Lindbergh to fly the Spirit of St. Louis south of the border at the end of the year.
- Anne graduates from Smith College and wins two prestigious writing awards.
- She joins her family at the Ambassadors residence in Mexico City.



# Charles Lindbergh December 1927

- He is presented with the Langley Medal from the Smithsonian Institution.
- Congress votes to award him the Congressional Medal of Honor.
- Time magazine names Charles Lindbergh it's first "Man Of The Year."
- On December 13, 1927 he leaves Boling Field, Washington, D.C. in the Spirit of St. Louis for Mexico and a tour of Central & South America.
- After a 27 hour flight he lands in Mexico City.




American Embassy & Ambassador's Residence Mexico City 1927







# Completion of the Central & South American tour

- On December 28<sup>th</sup> the Morrows see Lindbergh off to continue his tour of Central & South America.
- The tour is completed in February with a nonstop flight from Havana, Cuba to St. Louis in less than five hours.
- Lindbergh announces that he is retiring to private life and that the Spirit of St. Louis will be donated to the Smithsonian Institution.

From Washington, D.C. through Central America, Columbia & Venezuela & Caribbean to St. Louis.

#### Transcontinental Airline Service

- Lindbergh's new goal becomes to help establish New York to California passenger airline service.
- He becomes chairman of the Technical Committee of Transcontinental Air transport (TAT) for a yearly salary of \$10,000.00 and a signing bonus of \$250,000.00.
- TAT becomes known as the Lindbergh Line.

#### International Airline service

- Lindbergh also forges a business relationship with Juan Terry Trippe, founder of Pan American Airways.
- He becomes Pan Ams Technical Advisor for a beginning salary of \$10,000.00 per year.
- Lindbergh would remain active with Pan Am for more than forty years.

# Charles Lindbergh & Anne Morrow

- In the Fall of 1928 Charles calls the Morrow house in Englewood, NJ and asks Anne for a date.
- On October 16<sup>th</sup> he drives Anne to the Long Island estate of Harry Guggenheim for lunch.
- After lunch he takes Anne for a ride in a
- De Havilland Gipsy Moth.
- Afterward Anne writes to sister Constance, "I can't describe the flying, it was to glorious."

# Charles Lindbergh & Anne Morrow

- In late October 1928, on their third date
   Lindbergh asks Anne to marry him. She
   consents but they agree not to tell any one
   until Charles personally addresses her parents.
- On November 10 they meet with Anne's parents at the embassy in Mexico City and Charles announces his intentions.

#### Marriage Announcement

- On February 12, 1929 Dwight Morrow calls reporters to the Morrow estate in Englewood, N.J. He hands each reporter a slip of paper that states, "Ambassador and Mrs. Morrow announce the engagement of their daughter, Anne Spencer Morrow, to Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh."
- Anne is in Mexico city and Charles is making the first airmail flight between Belize and Havana, Cuba.
- Soon they both become besieged by the press.



TAT used Ford Tri-motor airplanes and trains in the first coast to coast airline service. Fare \$290.00


#### Pan American Airways

- In September 1929 Charles, Anne and Pan American owner Juan and Betty Trippe use a Sikorsky S-38 twin engine amphibian to survey Caribbean and South American airline routes.
- In ten days they land in Cuba, Haiti, Puerto Rico, Trinidad, Venezuela, Colombia, Panama, and Nicaragua.





Anne Morrow Lindbergh is the first woman in the United States to earn a Glider Rating.

## Charles & Anne Morrow Lindbergh 1930

- Charles takes delivery of a new Lockheed "Sirius" low wing monoplane. Price, \$18,000.00.
- In April 1930 Charles and Anne fly the Sirius from Los Angeles to New York in 14 Hrs. and 45 minutes. They break the transcontinental speed record by 3 Hrs.
- Anne is seven months pregnant with their first child.



**Lindbergh's Lockheed Sirius** 






## Charles & Anne Morrow Lindbergh 1930

- Charles & Anne continue to live at the Morrow estate.
- Charles continues his relationships with TAT and Pan American Airways.
- Charles purchases 425 acres near the town of Hopewell, NJ and engages an architect to draw plans for a house.
- They continue to be hounded by the media

# Charles & Anne Morrow Lindbergh 1930/31

- Concerned about Anne's sister Elisabeth's heart disease, Charles becomes acquainted with Nobel Prize winner and controversial French surgeon Alexis Carrel who is attempting to design an artificial heart at the Rockefeller Institute of Medical Research.
- Charles works in Carrel's laboratory through the winters of 1930/31 but is not successful in designing a mechanical perfusion pump.



### Charles & Anne Morrow Lindbergh 1931

- Charles begins to plan for a flight to Japan to survey possible airline routes for Pan American Airways.
- He has the Lockheed Sirius converted into a seaplane by removing the landing gear and installing pontoons.
- He has a larger Wright 575 BHP engine installed.
- He has he cockpits enclosed and a long range radio installed.

#### 1931

- Charles begins teaching Anne to fly in a Brunner-Winkle "Bird" Biplane at the Long Island Aviation County Club.
- Anne learns Morse Code and navigation skills necessary for the flight to Japan. She will also be the relief pilot on the trip.








**Charles & Anne Before Take-Off to Japan**

The route of the flight would take them across Canada and Alaska, to the Kamchatka Peninsula, to Japan, and ultimately to China.









#### On to China


- The Lindberghs fly first to Nanking where they found the Yangtze river in high flood. Then on to Hinghwa and Hankow.
- They make several flights in support of the flood victims.
- Because the river currents were so dangerous they use the British aircraft carrier Hermes as their base of operations.



### The Siruis is Damaged

- On the day of their last survey flight in China, while being lowered from the deck of the Hermes, a wing contacts the surface of the fast flowing Yangtze river and flips the airplane over.
- Charles and Anne jump out of the airplane and are rescued by a Hermes lifeboat down stream.

# The End of the North to the Orient Flight.

- With the Siruis seriously damaged it is disassembled and shipped back to the United States.
- On October 5<sup>th</sup>, while still onboard the Hermes, Anne receives a cable that informs her of the death of her father. They depart for the United States by commercial passenger ship and arrive back at the Morrow estate on October 23, 1931.
