# Some Thoughts on Midwinter Workshops

Te dodged a bullet—or more accurately, we were lucky. All went well, extremely well, this time. Two weeks earlier, we had had to postpone our January chapter meeting due to a sudden blizzard. Fortunately, our speaker for that evening could adjust his schedule till next month. Now we were watching the "Polar Vortex", hoping it wouldn't again dip south and disrupt the RV Sheet Metal Workshop that EAA had invited us to do January 18-19. By the 15th, everything was ready to go: kits from Van's had arrived, catalogues from Aircraft Spruce were on hand, and EAA said 16 students were enrolled. To our relief, the tool kits arrived on a sunny Thursday, the 16th (thanks to Jerry Blake and the Frederick Flight Center for taking delivery). The same day, Instructor Jack Dueck flew in from Calgary, Alberta



via Chicago with no delay (unusual for ORD). On Friday afternoon, with the help of several of you, we set up.

The next morning—clear, cold, and quite breezy—14 of the 16 students arrived on time and ready to go (the last two, 1 hour later). It was clear from the roster that this group came from a wider geographic distribution (e.g., Michigan, Massachusetts, and New York) than the usual, more locally-derived classes. Vice-president Mark Pankratz made sure we were all well fed with coffee and donuts, and the course got underway.



Long story made short, this was probably the most unified and efficient group we have hosted. Jack had modified the course slightly to clarify the initial project, and the tools had been significantly upgraded since last year. Hence, the students came to the "airfoil" part of the course on day 2 more confident and working more quickly than Jack or I had seen before. It also helped, I'm sure, that Debbie (of the the Airways Inn) provided fresh,



homemade cookies and her usual humor with lunch.

Comments from the students were uniformly positive. They liked Jack's style and pace and were thankful for the many chapter members who turned out at one time or another to give a hand with "over-the-shoulder" assistance. The one comment I heard that I thought was unique and valuable was in appreciation for "timely advice without micro-management". Many thanks to Jack Fromm, Mark Pankratz, Jack Savage, Jerry Blake, Joe Halleman, Ernie O'Roark and Tom Kocher for pitching in.

But Monday was a different story. The weather got steadily colder and greyer, to record the low-point of this winter (so far). Jack caught his flight back to Calgary (through Denver) with no delay, but I'm sure it must have been the last to beat the shut-down from BWI. I haven't heard differently, and I hope our 16 students made it to their more distant locations safely and without delay.



Perhaps this winter is a bit unusual in its severity. But as I write this a week later, at home with my heat-pump on the fritz, I find it a bit remarkable that this workshop fell into that sliver of time this month when the weather was good enough to permit an event like this. Hirschman said Adam flew so smoothly that it was initially surprising when Dave would look over at him and see what a blur of motion he was operating the controls with one arm. Dean Stickell, Adam's other instructor, related how calmly Adam handled his first minor emergency during one of his early solo flights. All in all, it was a very humbling experience to hear about the sacrifices Adam made in Iraq, his determination to not let them interfere with his dream of flight and the success he had fulfilling that dream. All of us who were able to attend were very appreciative.

And speaking of calmly handling emergencies, we also got to hear from now-nationally-known Dean about an emergency he experienced while test flying an F-16. We knew about that because of an article that appeared in the most recent edition of Smithsonian Air & Space magazine and Doug had brought a copy to pass around. For those



who haven't seen the article, you can <u>read it online</u>. I enjoy that magazine so I was glad to get to talk to Dean about the article and learn that not only did they make the interview process very enjoyable, he also said they pretty much got everything right.


