President's Message

Greetings EAA Chapter 524 Members and Friends,



ith the Girls in Aviation event coming up September 23rd, I thought it would be a good time (with help from Google) to reflect on the contributions of women in this field. Within the first

two decades of powered flight, women on every continent except Antarctica had begun to fly. The following are just a few women that have contributed to aviation.

The first woman known to fly was Jeanne Labrosse who, in 1788, was the first to solo pilot a balloon. Sophie Blanchard was the first to be a professional balloon aeronaut. Jerry Blake gave some wonderful presentations detailing the contributions of Katherine Wright to aviation. Without her, the Wright brothers would most likely not have gained the recognition they received for their airplanes. Georgia "Tiny" Broadwick began working with a barnstormer, was the first woman to jump from an aircraft, and was the first to demonstrate and teach parachute jumping to the US government.

The world's first licensed female pilot was Baroness Raymonde de Laroche of France who received her license in 1910. Another French woman, who was the first to fly in combat, was Marie Marvingt; she was also the first certified flight nurse. Harriet Quimby was the first US-licensed female; she was the first woman to fly across the English Channel. Katherine Stinson was the first woman to fly mail and the first woman to own a flying school. In 1913, Katherine and her mother created Stinson Aviation Company.

Women performed stunts and worked as wingwalkers during the barnstorming heyday. In 1929, a group of women gathered in New York to form The Ninety-Nines. It was, and continues to be, an international organization to provide mutual support of women pilots. In the '30s, Amelia Earhart was the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic. She brought attention to both aviation and the opportunities for women in

aviation. In 1963, Betty Miller was the first female pilot to fly solo across the Pacific Ocean. In the '40s, with WWII, women became involved with combat by teaching instrument flight training to male pilots. The WASPs (Women Airforce Service Pilots) supported the military by flying new planes from factories to USAAF bases, served as test pilots and as air traffic controllers. They also worked with NACA as scientists, engineers and analysts.

It wasn't until the 1970s that women in the US were again permitted to fly in the military. Louise Sacchi was the first female international ferry pilot. She also set a 1971 speed record by flying a single-engine plane from New York to London; this remains the record to date. Women have now become important aviation contributors as commercial pilots and astronauts. We salute the many women and their contributions to aviation.
