



What is a Air Rally. It is a challenge to navigation for the pilot.

The following is from a recent mailing received by the Pres.

How does it work? 15 minutes before take off you are given a sealed package with map, written instructions, photo's of objects on the ground THAT MAY OR MAY NOT BE ALONG YOUR ROUTE. Also with the rules are a set of LETTERS and SYMBOLS that may or may not be used. You have the 15 minutes to plot your courses before you take off. Winds, speed, times with be set by the committee. Also you must fly 500 -- 1,000 feet AGL. All Ck points will be 50 meters wide, and you ust fly over Ck points in the proper heading from the last Ck point. No 90 degree turns allowed. Every Ck point timed. All landings will be spot landings with in a 5 meter strip. They will call up wind, cross or down wind landings for you.

Letters will be used for CK points, and Symbols will be used for enroute markings that will be up to 100 meters L/R of course. By the way none of the above is in order, and if you see any of the symbols while flying your route you must mark it down and note how far from the last CK point, the same goes for the objects in the photo's. They will be up to 300 meters L/R of course. Everything is timed to the second. You lose points if you are early or late. You lose points if you do not fly over the Ck point within the 50 meter area. You lose more points if you miss the landing. Booth main's must be on the ground before the nose wheel.
