This item (edited for brevity) comes from the Maple Lake Flyer of Chapter 878. Jeff Brunkam chapter president in his "From The Left Seat" column writes:

"Recently our chapter had a unique opportunity to visit with John Ysker, an AI and gifted mechanical innovator. The focus of our visit was John's unique and ambitious Air-Car project. Those that have seen it have been impressed by both the concept and its execution. But most impressive is how John has been able to find the time, information and financing for this demanding project while running a successful one-man aircraft shop. John enjoys a reputation as an honest and capable mechanic. In a tough and competitive business John has a lot going for him."

"And soon he'll be out of business."

"In their infinite wisdom, the Metropolitan Airports Commission has determined that, "... in the interest of safety..." they will require all commercial operators on MAC controlled airports to meet minimum standards for physical facility size. Specifications have been established for minimum square feet of hangar space, minimum square feet of ramp space, minimum square feet of auto parking and so on, and so on ... Operators who fail to meet these requirements by the expiration of their current lease will not have their lease renewed. To put these requirements in perspective; John told me that of the 7 or 8 current operators on Anoka Co., only 2 will meet the specifications.

"In a phone conversation with Tim Anderson, MAC Director of Airports, I learned that the basis for developing the hangar space requirement for "full-service operators" was based upon using the Beecheraft Duchess as a "standard Aircraft". It was presumed that such an operator should have spacefor simultaneous work upon 4 such aircraft in a maintenance hangar - resulting in a minimum standard of 10000 sq. ft. In Johns case, the requirement is a minimum of


5000 sq. ft. of hangar space - more than twice the size of his current hangar which holds 2 - 3 aircraft. Remember that John runs a 1-man operation."

"I asked Mr. Anderson to provide examples of past incidents which would indicate that physical specifications for commercial operators are required to maintain safe airport operations. He provided none, but assured me that, "...there must have been some..." When I pressed him further, he replied that, as a pilot I should already be aware that, "...hangar rash is always a problem..."

"I urge each of you to make an individual effort to stop this unreasonable process. Contact your state legislators and use your democratic right to oppose these unelected commissioners. Call Tim Anderson directly at 726-5555 and ask him to explain the need for this arbitrary and unreasonable policy. Politely, but firmly tell him what you think."

"This is not the last you will hear of the MAC. In our conversation, Mr. Anderson informed me that MAC will soon be vigorously pursuing existing statutes which prevent you from using the A&P of YOUR choice, in YOUR hangar to work on YOUR airplane. I was also told that MAC intends to, "...look at all these flying clubs..." in the Metro area. MAC feels that maintenance and flight instruction may be performed by people not employed by operators located on the field. This is perceived to take business away from the operators causing them to - and this is a direct quote - "...start cutting corners..." Therefore - its a safety issue."

"Please consider the implications of this policy. Take matters into your own hands and act now!"
