Chapter Speaker Notes

January 14, 2008

Speaker: Paul Esser: VP of the Red Wing Soaring Association

They share our goal of keeping aviation alive. He started his training in 2000 at Benson's; landing at Benson's was a challenging, they have since moved to Osceola. While still at Benson's there were a couple of incidents that led them to consider whether or not there were sufficient safety zones around the airport. As a result of an evaluation of the development happening in the Benson area, they decided that Osceola was a great option.

Osceola had received FAA funds to expand and the airport was also very interested in attracting the group to the field. The group moved in 2005, bought 2 used gliders (2-seat trainers, very solid). Gliders are appreciating rapidly and so the club was lad to grab these two planes. Their tow plane is a 180 hp Super Cub.

Paul views his glider license as a "license to learn", a pilot mist always be learning and adding to their knowledge and experience in order to stay current and safe.

The club brought a glider to our pancake breakfast last fall and drew big crowds of people interested in the planes and the practice of gliding. The club is interested in increasing membership to about 50 people; they are part of a national organization that sponsors events and competitions. More experience pilots like to participate in racers and course work. This competition is part of a program that is international; members can compete locally and move up through the competition to the international level.

The club has a youth membership program, encouraging young people to consider soaring. Young people must be 14 to solo, 16 to get their license. Training is rigorous.

There is no medical required for gliding, pilots can do an add-on rating and go into soaring as easily as they can go into sport flying. Getting an ad-on rating will require 3 hours of solo time. The training that precedes this will include multiple flights or varying lengths of time.

The soaring season begins in April and goes through November, the best time to fly is Spring and Fall.

About half the members of the soaring club have their power rating but it is not required. Pilots with a power rating will find that soaring training will improve their flying.

A soaring flight requires assistance, at a minimum a tow-plane pilot is needed to tow the glider into the air. Often another person is there to help stabilize the glider while the tow plane gets hooked up and ready to launch. Planning ahead includes the usual pre-flight planning and the arrangement for helpers.

In Europe gliders are sometimes launched by a truck. Gliding in Europe is very popular – especially in the Alps where ridge soaring is an exciting activity.

Winch launching can be done in areas near mountainous terrain where lift is guaranteed due to the natural air currents around mountains; in flat plains areas pilots prefer to be pulled to at least 1500 feet AGL so that they have time to find some natural lift to go higher.

There are also self-launching motorized gliders that have a small motor on board for launch. Glider pilots learn to look for lift and to understand the weather conditions that will create lift.

Tailwinds Flying Club Safety Session

Tailwinds Flying Club, based at Lake Elmo Airport has requested the use of the chapter's club house to hold their Winter safety session and to invite any of the Chapter 54 members to attend.

Joe Morgan will be the guest speaker at this year's Winter safety session. Joe is the operations manager for Lockheed Martin – Princeton Flight Service Station (FSS). Joe will speak about the services provided and how to obtain those services. This safety session will be held on Saturday, February 16, at 8 AM and conclude before the chapter's Saturday social meeting. Joe will take questions from the attendees after his short presentation.

AWOS UPDATE:

Approximately four months ago the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDot) completed the construction of an AWOS station at Lake Elmo Airport (21D). Presently weather data from that system is displayed on two terminals at Valter's Aviation, one at the main desk and one in the flight planning area.

According to Robert Milton, Manager of MnDot's Navigation Systems Section, there are plans for a telephone line and VHF transmitter. The AWOS was purchased and installed with a VHF transmitter. MnDot has applied to the FCC for a license to broadcast. Once this is granted, they will begin transmitting the computer generated, up to the minute, voiced weather message directly to pilots. Robert expects that the license will be issued in approximately 90 days. Once they have a frequency and the facility has been commissioned, they will be uploading METAR reports to the FAA national network every twenty minutes.

A phone line has been installed, but the ring voltage is too low. The phone company is working to correct this. This should be completed by the first week of February. The phone number is 651-779-5949.
