PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE by Drew Seguin (president@eaa55.org)

Baby it's cold out there!

I don't know about the rest of you but it's too cold to be fun flying for me. A friend asked about it and I said "Picture a jeep with a canvas top... And a bad heater" I've been working in Iowa for a couple of weeks and one thing worse than uber cold at home is uber cold staying in a hotel in Iowa. Nothing against Iowa but when there's steam rising off the ice on the Mississippi river there's not much reason to go outside. But heck, it's supposed to warm up for a couple of days this weekend, then in a month or two it will be good flying weather again. It'll be great.

I recently finished reading Mike Busch's book. "Engines" on aircraft engines and maintenance from the owner's perspective. It's a compilation of articles he's written over the years. Mike has some pretty good credentials. His background is in mathematics and computer science. He ran the engines in his Cessna 310 to 230% of TBO without problems. The book covers all aspects of how things work, how to treat them, and what happens when things go wrong. The key takeaways for me were the need for oil analysis, borescope inspections, and managing temperatures. A big issue for those of us who don't get paid to fly is corrosion. In fact, it's the most likely reason for our engines not making it past TBO. Mike is a big proponent of Cam Guard but primarily for corrosion prevention over lubricity. Pre-heating is a must in cold weather and when we're in the air we need to keep the CHT down.


It's a big book but as it's a compilation of articles you can pick it up and read a little here and there. I highly

recommend it for anyone who owns an airplane engine and wants to get as much life out of it as possible.

The prequel, "Manifesto", is also a great read as an introduction to Mike's approach and the topics covered.

Meanwhile, Dave Courey is lining up some interesting programs for upcoming Chapter 55 meetings. For the February meeting Patrick Ryan from The FAA will be speaking on ADS-B. I hope to see you there.

And if you're silly enough to go flying in this cold, don't forget to pre-heat!

LCC - MASON JEWETT CAMPUS

My past articles have focused on our aviation technology program and the requirements our students must satisfy to become successful, highly skilled and technically competent aircraft maintenance technicians. Since our students are well into their spring semester studies, I thought this month I'd explain how our program fits in the larger LCC picture, and also offer a few facts about LCC itself.

The aviation technology program is part of the LCC's Technical Career's Division. The division offices and other division programs are located in LCC's facility on Mt. Hope Road, just east of Crytes Road. Technical Careers is led by Mark Cosgrove, who is my predecessor in the position I now hold. If you are interested in seeing the Technical Careers facility let me know and we can arrange a tour.

Lansing Community College is one of the largest community college in Michigan, and the community colleges larger than LCC are in the Detroit area. Students attend LCC in statuses including full time, part time, on-line and continuing education. Funds for LCC come primarily from state allocations, student tuition and property taxes from the 15 communities contiguous to LCC. Tuition for students who live in the school districts surrounding LCC (Bath, Dansville, DeWitt, East Lansing, Grand Ledge, Haslett, Holt/Dimondale, Lansing, Leslie, Mason, Okemos, Stockbridge, Waverly, Webberville, and Williamston) is \$105 per credit hour. Compare that to MSU, WMU, EMU, etc. and the value proposition is clearly in LCC's favor.

LCC has five campuses to conveniently serve students. The main campus is downtown, just northeast of the Capitol building. There are also satellite campuses in East Lansing and Howell. As I indicated, the Technical Careers campus is in West Lansing, and Aviation is at the Mason airport. Making classes convenient in location allows more students to attend and is in keeping with the mission of community colleges.

A large number of programs offered by LCC transfer to four-year universities. Completing the first two years (or in some programs three years) at LCC represents a significant financial savings, and LCC works with many four year universities in Michigan to ensure LCC graduates' courses of study are accepted in full. As an example, LCC aviation students who complete all FAA-required courses and five additional LCC general education core courses are awarded two Associates' degrees, and can complete their Bachelor's degree at either Western

Michigan or Sienna Heights University in two years or less.

When one thinks about community colleges, the concepts of value, location, transferability, individualized instruction and an education that leads to immediate employment in areas currently in demand should be obvious. If someone you know is thinking about where to start their post-secondary education, have them look at LCC. The education opportunities are significant, the value is real and employment prospects are immediate.






What a difference a year makes !! January 2018 members could barely find places to park autos for all the snow. This January, two members flew their planes to the meeting. What a joy to see !!
