There are over 50 aircraft on display including a replica of the first Wright Flyer, World War II era fighters and bombers, modern jets including the F-14 and the SR-71B Blackbird. There are special exhibits on the Michigan Aviation Hall of Fame, National Guadalcanal Memorial Museum, Women in Aviation and Space, and Space: Dare to Dream. They also have full motion flight simulators, a 26' indoor Ferris Wheel, numerous children's activities and a 3D theater. We also plan to visit their restoration building where they are beginning the restoration of a Wildcat retrieved from Lake Michigan! Tickets for the museum are between \$10 and \$15 – I am waiting to

hear back on group rates. I hope to see all of you for this exciting event!

NOTES FROM CAPE JUBY

On a recent trip to the left coast, I had the opportunity to greet some old friends and make some new ones. As always, some interesting airplanes were involved. During Air Venture 2015 I happened meet Ellis and Noelle Clark. Some of you may remember them from when they lived at Skyway Estates, and when Ellis was restoring J-3 Cubs in Pellston. They introduced me to Lloyd Sorensen, President of EAA Chapter 491. Lloyd had flown his Cessna 195 to Air Venture from California, for a total of about 30 hours round trip. He asked if I would visit Santa Ynez and speak to their EAA chapter. So my first stop in California was Solvang, a Dutch community where Ellis and Noelle have a beautiful home.

Ellis moved his Cub restoring shop to the Santa Ynez airport, and has an amazing amount of tools to do the difficult things like rolling the wire for the openings in the cowl, and a paint booth next to the hangar. He improves the airplane with wings from Cub Crafters, heavier struts and landing gear, and an 85hp engine. The Cub on the cover of the January Sport Aviation was restored by Ellis and is this year's EAA raffle airplane.



I spoke to about 50 people in Chapter 491's hangar. It was a beautiful day, and I would have enjoyed staying and just hanging around, but I needed to be in Burbank that afternoon. The problem was how to get there. The pilots I would be working with in Burbank own a Cessna Citation Mustang, but the runway at Santa Ynez is only 2800' long. After looking at the wind and talking to some Citation owners that fly from there, we decided the numbers would work.

They arrived about noon and I briefed them on the runway, and the departure procedure. One of the pilots, Jeff Moss, is a CFI in the Mustang, so he put me in the left seat and walked me through the start procedure and the checklist. I was still a bit apprehensive about taking off on such a short runway, and did a static run-up in position. As soon as I released brakes, the airplane accelerated so briskly that I remarked to Jeff "This will work out just fine." and off we went to Burbank.

In the days following the A340 training I provided to the Citation Mustang owners, I had the opportunity to do a lot of air work maneuvers and instrument approaches in their airplane. I had already studied the manuals on the Mustang, and was able to do enough inflight training to take a type rating check ride. The interesting thing about a type rating in a very light jet is that most of them are single pilot type ratings. So my license now shows a CE 510S type rating (the S for single pilot). My flights in the Mustang also convinced me that the trainer of today should be equipped with the latest avionics. So equipped, they become the stepping-stones that new pilots can use to transition to airplanes like the Cirrus and the Citation Mustang.

I took the time to visit some interesting places in the LA basin, beginning with a visit to Alan Nimo in San Bernardino. Alan has a small company called "Anti-Splat Aero". It's actually a sideline business for him, since his main company is the largest supplier and rebuilder of turbo chargers and super chargers in the country. Alan also owns a 150 hp RV-9A, which he claims will blow the canopies off RVs with 180 hp engines. Alan has developed a lot of neat accessories for RV aircraft, and is passionate about making the airplane safer and of course faster. San Bernardino is very close to Riverside, which is home to an airport that should be well known to all EAAers - Flabob. It is the airport where Ray Stits developed the Stits fabric process, and is also home to EAA Chapter 1. I spent some time kicking tires around Flabob, and ran across the usual characters sitting in lawn chairs and trying to keep concrete from floating into the air. We talked a bit about Bill Turner and Repeat Aircraft, the company Bill owned that created replicas of some famous racing airplanes. Finally they asked if I'd like to take a peek at the museum airplanes, which are kept in Bill Turner's old Once inside, I found replicas of the hangar. DeHavilland Comet, French Caudron racer, Roscoe Turner's Gilroy Special, and the Schoenfeldt Firecracker.

The next day, my long time friend Slow-talking Roger and I flew his Debonair from Fullerton to Santa Paula, another airport full of history and unique airplanes. We had lunch at the airport café, and then spotted an open hangar door with the tail of a Howard So we walked down there and started talking to the owner. While the airplane looked like a good old Howard DGA-15P, it was in fact a homebuilt Howard. The owner/builder is Bruce Dickenson, an avocado rancher from the local area. Bruce estimates that the airplane took 19,000 man-It is patterned more after Mr. hours to build. Mulligan, the 1930s race airplane, than it is the DGA-The wings are 3 feet longer than Mr. 15P. Mulligan's, and the tail is significantly larger. With an R-1340 of 600 hp, Bruce says his airplane is just as fast as Mr. Mulligan.



The return flight with Slow-talking Roger took us directly over LAX at 3500°. I was sure we would be violated and end up on the evening news. But this was via the VFR corridor and perfectly legal. Slow-talking Roger had it planned so that we could cross LAX and turn East abeam Zamperini Field in Redondo Beach, which would put us directly in line with the runway at Fullerton. I was relieved that nearest airplanes we saw were the runs on the tarmac at LAX. Slow-talking Roger thought it was normal.



On Thursday evening, while attending the annual Symposium and Banquet of the Society of Experimental Test Pilots, I was humbled to be Bob Hoover's host during the screening of his movie, "Flying The Feathered Edge". Kim Furst, the film's producer was also there. Bob arrived by limousine and was wearing a tuxedo without his signature straw hat. I wheeled him into the ballroom where the movie would be shown. Although he is a bit frail, his mind is sharp as a tack. When I was at Santa Ynez, I met the son of Vance Breese. It was a name I was not familiar with, but Vance Breese was the test pilot who made the first flight of the P-51 and B-25. I mentioned that to Bob and he told me his recollections of meeting Vance Breese.

Elliot Seguin was in Anaheim along with his wife Jen. He was just one weekend removed from race weekend at Reno, where he finished 3rd in the Gold Race. Along with a lot of really great papers, Elliot gave a presentation on his testing of race propellers. The award for best paper was given to a team from the Navy who have developed a way for the F-18 to come aboard ship and snag the 3-wire almost every time. They do it by maintaining angle of attack with

the existing auto throttles, and maintaining flight path by rapidly increasing and decreasing lift with the flaps and ailerons. They had a high quality simulation that everyone could fly, and proved that even a dumb old Air Force guy can snag the 3-wire with their system!



The days are getting shorter and so are the opportunities for some really outstanding flying weather. Take the time to enjoy the fall colors, and think about what interesting aviation activity you can have when the white stuff arrives. And while you're at the airport, don't forget to lend a hand to your fellow pilot when it's needed.
