HELP WANTED TO RESTORE A PRE-WAR

AERONCA: I received a call from Jerry Ernst of Owosso. He is looking for help on the restoration of his Aeronca. If you or anyone you know would be interested in checking this out... From Jerry: I'm the longtime owner of a pre-war side-by-side 1939 Aeronca N27302 (an earlier version of what the company designated as a Chief after the war). She's been partly disassembled for decades and I have no capacity to repair her by myself. My principal goal is a restoration to get her flying. It is a complete airplane, a 65-hp. Lycoming 0-145B2 engine and a cache of spare engine parts that were accumulated over the years. Current condition: localized damage to one wing from (as I understand it) taxiing into a hangar door. There's some debate about the condition of the wood in one or both wings, which an AI will have to resolve. The fuselage is intact, last recovered in the mid-1980s. The airplane has been stationary indoors for maybe up to 20 years. The Lycoming was disassembled at a shop that was supposed to (but didn't) fix the damaged wing. Currently, the wings are inaccessible and will only be released when I've nailed down a plan and commitment for a renovation. The fuselage is relatively easy to reach. I have enough money to buy needed materials but I have no place to do such work. I'm open to a partnership, or to the start of a flying club, or to an arrangement that changes ownership after a designated number of years, or to any suggested possible resolution. Young Aviators RC Aircraft Take Flight!

On Sunday September 13th and September 27th, 2020, the EAA55 Young Aviators youth group was again graciously hosted by the **Capital Area Radio Drone Squadron (CARDS)** at their airfield located on Otto Rd. in rural Grand Ledge, Mi. Although both days were less than ideal (overcast/broken, winds gusting 8 to 18 knots) for flight, we were able to get a significant amount of work completed on our RC aircraft. On September 27 the Young Aviators youth group labor paid off with the first flights of two of our Flite Test Explorer RC aircraft.







Designated instructors were available to assist the Young Aviators in getting started flying Explorers. Through the use of a "buddy box" system, the youth had the opportunity to fly their RC aircraft. The youth's transmitter is coupled to the instructor's transmitter through a Bluetooth wireless connection. The instructor is able to take control of the RC aircraft with the simple flip of a switch when needed. The simulator practice and the actual flight experience with the CARDS trainer aircraft has provided the experience necessary to fly these model aircraft.

Our next meeting will be Sunday October 11, 2020 again at the CARDS airfield, weather permitting. We will finish our four channel wings (with ailerons) and affix them to the Explorer RC fuselage. This will allow the Young Aviators youth to fly the Explorer with all three aerodynamic axis by having control of the elevator, rudder, and ailerons.

On behalf of the EAA Chapter 55 Young Aviators Youth Group, and from EAA Chapter 55 in general; I would like to thank the members and staff of the Capital Area Radio Drone Squadron (CARD) for their hospitality. Partnerships such as this open a world of opportunity for youth to explore the wonderful world of flight.

"The Capital Area Radio Drone Squadron (CARDS) was founded in 1970 and is the largest radio control club in the Lansing area. The club [#353] is an AMA [Academy of Model Aeronautics] Gold Leader, and boasts the largest model aircraft runway in the state of Michigan, and hosts some of the state's largest model aircraft events. The primary focus of CARDS is to increase participation in model aviation in the greater Lansing area. They offer a safe way for others to learn how they can participate in this hobby. LCC - MASON JEWETT CAMPUS

LCC's Aviation Maintenance Technology program follows the college's semester schedule. As such, we started a new class this August, and our students will graduate two years later, also in August. Our program continues with both a day and evening session, each with about 50 students enrolled. We are at capacity based on classroom size, hangar space and teaching asset utilization.

With the advent of the COVID-19 pandemic, the hiring pipeline has not completely dried up, but fewer employers then previous are asking to come to our facility to talk with students about employment opportunities. The current economic situation has airlines cutting back flying to levels not seen in 20 years. MRO providers are reporting record levels of work, and cargo operators are flying more than ever. Both are hiring our graduates. Manufacturers are a mixed bag, with some producing less and some, especially in the corporate realm, reporting increased production.

The one constant throughout the industry is the stillaging workforce. The premise behind the partnership we have with Delta is that the usual sources of maintenance technicians was drying up and schools like LCC's were and important source of new mechanics. That is still the case today. With early-out incentives, buyouts and the like, once the economy turns around we expect strong demand once again for our graduates.

We continue to see strong interest from prospective students in our program. As we talk to them, they realize the significant opportunities the career field offers once things turnaround, and they want to be in position to take advantage of the opportunities when they do occur. We are seeing an increasing average age in the students enrolling in the program which supports recognition of what the career field offers.
