EAA Chapter 55 Membership Meeting April 9, 2022

- → The meeting was called to order at 9:31AM by Acting President Doug Koons with 23 members attending.
- → □Doug thanked the breakfast team of Don and Deanna McAlister, Ken Drewyor, Dave Courey, and Dave Trojan. The breakfast team for May will will be Anna Folger, Tim Martinsen. Pat Salow, Kathy Flanders, and Gilda Tucker.
- → The Secretary's report for February 12th was presented, Bill Purosky made a motion to accept, Gary Nicola seconded; the motion passed.
- The Treasurer's report March 31st was presented; Terry Lutz made a motion to accept, Bill Purosky seconded the motion; the report was approved.
- → There Youth Group report met two weeks ago and will meet again tomorrow. At the last meeting they worked on the Aero Educate program from the EAA and worked on gliders. They built some dinner ware plates and test flew them in the hangar. They scratch built some balsa wood gliders including a biplane. Tomorrow's meeting will include some Young Eagles flights. A couple of pilots have

- volunteered and any other pilot who wants to fly a Young Eagle is welcome to sign on.
- → The Young Eagles report from Margie Clark is she has been working on a special Young Eagles fight in Howell on June 4th to help them out. If any pilot who has their Child Protection Certificate is welcome to help out.
- → We need volunteers to help out with Dawn Patrol, Young Eagles, and Mason Aviation Day. Sign-up sheets are available.
- → Our Ray Scholarship candidate has suspended here formal training for the time being and is pursuing the written part of her private pilot examination. Doug has been working with the Ray Scholarship committee on our next candidate Daniel Thomas for 2022 who has his paperwork in to The Ray Foundation and have received approval for him. We have another \$10,000 for our second scholarship awardee. A lot of work goes into the nomination process and Chapter 55 has qualified a candidate for last year and again this year. Daniel is working to start flight lessons in the first week of May. He is about to take his written exam for the ground portion of his private pilot license and has a good start.
- → CRAA at their Board Meeting last week has voted to take the North-South runway proposal off the master plan and to sell the property. The proposal was placed on their agenda on Friday and was voted on the following Monday. Action from Chapter 55, Lansing Community College, and the tenants of the airport is required to change this back door action by the board. Jeff Stetson made a motion for Chapter 55 to spend up to \$1,000 to hire an attorney to challenge the change by the CRAA board to the master plan with regard to the North-South runway. Drew Seguin seconded the motion; the motion passed unanimously.
- → Karen Merindorf was selling 50/50 raffle tickets for the Relay for Life fundraiser, Terry Lutz won \$37.50 and donated the winnings to the Relay for life fundraiser.

EAA Chapter 55 Board of Directors Meeting April 6, 2022

→ The meeting was called to order by Vice President Scott Basel at 7:04pm. → Present were Scott Basel, Drew Seguin, John Kuchar, Mark Bathurst, Jeff Shaud, Gabe Blosser, Ken Drewyor, Doug Koons, and Rick Laub. Absent were Margie Clark, Joe Madziar, Warren Miller, and Bob Clark. → The Secretary's Report for March 9, 2022, was presented; Mark Bathurst made a motion to accept; Drew Seguin seconded; the report was accepted. >The Treasurer's Report for March 31, 2022 was introduced; Rick Laub made a motion to accept; Gabe Blosser seconded; the motion was approved. >The Ray Scholarship report from Doug Koons is the search committee has selected another candidate, Daniel Thomas, who has been approved by EAA Headquarters as our 2022 candidate. He has chosen Crosswinds for his flight training and is nearly finished with his ground school from Sporty's. He has good support from his family to meet his objective of becoming a private pilot. Our current candidate Anna needs to complete her written exam for the ground school part of her lessons to receive another \$2,000 and then solo to receive the final \$4,000. She is 7 lessons behind from where she should be according to her instructor. >The Youth Group met March 27th and talked about gliders, stability, and the engineering design process and made some foam plate gliders. They also built some balsa wood gliders from scratch. The next meeting will be April 10th and they will begin constructing a wind tunnel. Also 7 or 8 youth will do Young Eagle flights. Approved pilots are still needed to do the flights. >The Tuesday potlucks have been well attended with 14 people coming to the last dinner. Pat Salow gave a presentation on the scheduled replacement of gaskets and hoses with some examples found on his plane after 5 years of operation. Drew Seguin is working on the memorial wall, looking into making space on the wall as well as requirements for the material posted.

May Meeting Schedule

The youth group will take a break from our normal meeting schedule to enjoy and spend time with our families on Mother's Day Sunday May 8, 2022. Our next Young Aviators youth group meeting will take place on Sunday May 22, 2022 from 2:00 PM until 5:00 PM at the chapter hangar at Mason Jewett airport. Please enter through Gate #1. Internal Combustion Engine Update

As a refresher, through the generous donation of a Harbor Freight Predator 212cc OHV engine by member Gary Nicola, and the youth group purchase of two more Predator engines, the youth group was able to take on the project of learning about internal combustion engines (ICE). Our last year's challenge was to unpack the engines, mount them to a test

fixture, add engine oil and gasoline, and start the engines to demonstrate that they DO run! We then completely disassembled the engines using complete tool sets generously donated to the youth group by member Greg Harris. After learning about all the different parts on disassembly, the youth learned about precision measuring equipment and the importance of tolerances in an internal combustion engine. On Sunday April 24, 2022, after a long winter hiatus from working in the builders' hangar, the youth group began the reassembly process, and continued learning, on the internal combustion engines project.



After a few months off, we had to reacquaint ourselves with the parts and components of the engines. A thorough cleaning of the parts was necessary prior to reassembly. We then began by installing the crankshaft, valve lifter tappets, and cam. Next came the tricky part of installing the piston rings onto the piston in the correct orientation. The piston rings are fragile and break very easily if not installed with great care. The youth next installed the piston on the connecting rod assuring the piston pin clips seated into the piston pin bore grooves. The connecting rod/piston assembly were then offered into the cylinder bore, piston rings compressed, and connecting rod bearing journal mated to the crankshaft. The connecting rod cap was assembled to the connecting rod/crankshaft assembly and the connecting rod bolts were torque tightened to 208 lb.ins. The youth learned about torque wrenches and the importance of torque tightening critical functioning hardware. The camshaft was installed by timing it to the crankshaft. After the camshaft installation, the crankcase engine cover with main bearing was installed and torque tightened. At our next ICE build session, the youth will assemble the cylinder heads and install them on the engines.

Most of the youth group members have received aircraft parking training prior to COVID-19 two years ago. We would like to have a refresher class in aircraft marshalling and to teach our new members the process. Are there a couple of EAA 55 members who would like to volunteer to teach a marshalling class at our next youth group meeting on Sunday May 22, 2022? Perhaps, we could combine this activity with a youth group Young Eagles flight to prepare for our upcoming Young Eagles events (huh, three birds with one stone!)? Please let me know if you would be interested in offering/helping with an aircraft marshalling class for the youth group. See you at the hangar!

LCC - MASON JEWETT CAMPUS

The end of LCC's 16 week spring semester is here. Our students finish on May 9 and resume June 6 for the summer semester. The summer semester is a shortened 8 weeks, and classes run longer during the day to make up for the reduced class schedule. Our

second year students will graduate at the end of the summer semester on August 1, and are now actively focused on employment opportunities. There are a significant number of jobs for newly FAA-licensed maintenance technicians today.

As previously discussed, industry surveys are forecasting record number of both pilot and maintenance technician vacancies in the next 10-20 years. Aircraft maintenance employers have been calling with increased frequency asking three questions: When do your students graduate? How many are graduating? When can we talk to your students?


Not only are there vacancies in the United States for maintenance technicians, there are even more in other parts of the world. In the next 20 years, 274,000 new maintenance positions will exist in the Asia/Pacific region. Europe will require 112,000 new technicians, North America will require 132,000, the Middle East will have 51,000 vacancies, Latin America 37,000, and 20,000 positions will be open in Africa. Our graduates have opportunities to work in any part of the world. The FAA A&P license is recognized and accepted throughout the world since employers know what subject material our students study, the level of proficiency our students must demonstrate on all of the required course outcomes, and the hours spent on the various subjects covered during the two years they are in school. The A&P license truly is the international gold standard for maintenance technicians.

One of the byproducts of the pandemic and the commensurate early retirements and buyouts is the significant ratcheting up in starting salaries for newly-graduated A&P mechanics. Whereas starting salaries were in the low \$20/hour range, they are now consistently in the \$25-\$28/hour range. Added to that are provisions for relocation allowance, tools, uniforms, tuition reimbursement and even flight training. The packages employers are offering our graduates have significantly improved over the past few years based on demand for mechanics and the limited numbers of graduates all 187 Part 147 schools in the U.S. can produce.

Given increased employer hiring needs and increasing industry starting salaries, aviation maintenance is a great career to consider.


