Pilots who in the past obtained a III Class Medical will need to complete an on line aeromedical course every two years in addition to seeing their personal physician every four years. A copy of the course completion with a passing score must be kept in the pilot's logbook. The final rule is expected to be published in January and will have the date by which pilots can begin the online process.

At 4:00 am on Friday morning, December 2nd, Dave Groh, Rick Anderson and I headed for Oshkosh, WI to retrieve a T-6 that had ground looped in Jackson and been totaled by the insurance company this past summer. Dave had placed a bid for the salvage and got it, so we we're on our way to pick it up. Two pickup trucks, a 22' trailer and a 24' trailer with a lot of tie down straps and old tires to seat the plane on. At about 11:00 am we arrived at Oshkosh WI airport, north end were some T-hangars are. Setting on a trailer, it was ready for us to pick up. They had two small lift trucks on each side. Dave put the lifting I's in and chains on. In just a short time, we had it off their trailer and on to Dave's. We discovered that we



had to tie the tail down first in order to keep the cowling off the trailer and keep the center section on the old tires. Then the rest of the tie downs went on and we tied it down tight. Rick's trailer carried the two wings with some tires in between each wing and lots of tie down straps. We were ready to roll.



Stopped at a restaurant just down the road from the airport to fill our bellies with food. Now we were ready to get underway. It had taken about three hours in all to get everything loaded and tied down for the journey, so it was about 2:00 pm. Dave's over-sized load permits where only good for daylight hours, so we planned to get to the WI/IL border before dark and stay at Kenosha WI, which is about five miles from Illinois. IL. We left the restaurant and headed south and soon found out that we were not alone. People like airplanes on trailers APPARENTLY. People were slowing down and taking pictures, they waved and we also got a lot of "thumbs-up" signs. We where !!POPULAR !! So Dave was very glad he had spent time on making certain the trucks and trailers were legal with all the permits in each state.

LCC - MASON JEWETT CAMPUS

January marks the beginning of LCC's 16 week Spring semester. The Aviation Technology program's first year students are starting their second semester, and our second year students are in their fifth of six semesters. To refresh your memory, we start a new class every August and it takes two years to complete the program.

Our first year students will be studying aircraft electrical systems in great detail, with heavy emphasis on AC current. Additionally, they will begin work on various aircraft structures, including wood, fabric, fiberglass and sheet metal to include riveting and forming. They also have classes on fuel systems, hydraulics, landing gear and brakes. One of the highlights of the program, and a real student favorite, is aircraft welding, which is taught at our state-of-the-art welding laboratory at the West Campus facility. In 16 weeks students become proficient in performing various welds on all the metals typically encountered in aviation maintenance. The second year students will continue reciprocating engine teardown and rebuild which includes cooling and exhaust systems, ignition and magneto systems and fuel systems. Additionally, they will spend extensive time on propeller maintenance, balancing and installation of both fixed and variable pitch props. The culmination of the reciprocating engine courses occurs when the students take the engines they have rebuilt and run them out on the ramp. If you see a group of white hulls minus wings and tails out on the ramp in front of our hangar, you'll know its engine run time.

One of the hallmarks of any highly accredited education program is continual update of teaching materials and instructor education. To that end, we continue to add a number of training aids to enhance student mastery of various aircraft systems. One of the major vendors of system trainers is AVOTEK, headquartered in Virginia. If you search their web site you will see varied training devices designed to not only teach system operation, but allow trouble shooting as well. This school year we have added new devices covering air cycle machines, avionics (FMC and glass panel), a turbine engine cutaway, crew and passenger oxygen, an additional magneto trainer/tester and a digital engine instrument trainer. We have more on order for delivery later this year. As always, you're welcome to stop by and we'll show you around.
