EAGLES UPDATE - October 2022: We are a little over two months into the year-long celebration of the Young Eagles 30th anniversary. As a reminder, here are the special opportunities that exist for your chapter to take advantage of!

Double Young Eagles Credits: To encourage more flight activity and additional chapter rallies, EAA will be offering double Young Eagles credits (\$10 per flight) from January 1, 2023, to July 31, 2023. This incentive will allow chapters and volunteers from warm and cooler climates to take advantage of the bonus. Learn more about the Young Eagles Credit program at EAA.org/YECredits.

30 Flights for 30 Years: Volunteer Young Eagles pilots who fly 30 youths between August 1, 2022, and July 31, 2023, will be awarded a commemorative polo shirt. Once pilots reach this milestone, EAA will contact pilots to request their shirt size. Milestones will be tracked at **EAA.org/YE30**.

First-Time Young Eagles Pilot Challenge: The Young Eagles program will never run into a shortage of children to fly. However, consistently growing the volunteer pilot force is critical to the future of the program. Through the 30th anniversary celebration period from August 1, 2022, to July 31, 2023, all first-time Young Eagles pilots will be entered into a monthly drawing to win a Lightspeed Zulu 3 headset! Piper Tri-Pacer Wing Donated to YG

The youth group received a very generous donation of a left side Piper Tri-Pacer wing from EAA Chapter 55 member Gabe Blosser. We would like to express our gratitude and thanks to Gabe for his generous donation of this wing for the youth to learn about aircraft construction. <u>Piper Tri-Pacer Wing Deconstruction Project – Part 1</u>

On a beautiful Sunday October 23, 2022, the EAA 55 Young Aviators gathered at the Builder's Hangar to begin the process of deconstructing the donated Piper Tri-Pacer wing. Our first task was to move the wing outside in order to wash many years of dust, dirt, grime, and leachate moss from the exterior surfaces. We began this process by spraying the wing completely with a biodegradable detergent cleaner. Both sides of the wing were then power washed to remove the grime. The results are phenomenal!

With the wing exterior clean, it was time to investigate what was inside. Low and behold, if there was not a cache of walnuts "squirreled" away inside the wing, like 5 pounds! Shake, rattle, and roll, we got most of them out! It is going to take some more disassembly before we can get the interior completely cleaned out.

Next, the youth investigated how the wing was originally assembled and what we will need to do to start taking it apart. We began by removing the fabric covered flap and aileron. Next up was to remove the access panel for the 18 gallon, wing mounted fuel tank. With the access panel removed, the youth were able to remove an angled tubular spar support brace that ran through a welded pass-thru

tube in the fuel tank. With these pieces out of the way, the kids were able to remove the fuel tank.

That is about all we had time to do on Sunday October 23. We will be back at it again on Sunday November 13, 2023 where we will begin the process of drilling out the skin rivets to expose the wing structure. We are looking for volunteers with experience in drilling out driven rivets. If you are interested in furthering the aerospace education of our youth by assisting with this project, please contact Jeff Shaud at the phone number below.

LCC - MASON JEWETT CAMPUS By Mark Bathurst (bathursm@star.lcc.edu)

In 2019, the aviation maintenance industry's primary concern in finding personnel for aviation technician jobs was the noticeably high barriers to entry vs. the number of people who thought overcoming those barriers was worth it. Aviation has radically changed since the start of 2019. While thousands of staff members were laid off or took early retirement at the height of the pandemic, some aircraft maintenance schools ceased operations for a period of time. Some of the schools who remained open saw graduation rates drop by 25 percent. At LCC, however, we maintained our enrollment and graduated full classed throughout the COVID era. The reduced output of Part 147 schools helped contribute to the mechanic shortage.

Are aircraft mechanics in demand? Without question, and the global market for air travel is dramatically increasing. In fact, the projected demand for global travel is expected to return to full pre-pandemic levels by 2023, then continue to grow throughout the next decade. To accommodate this demand, the global fleet is expected to surpass 49,000 commercial aircraft by 2040, with 20 percent of all deliveries going toward emerging markets. These factors mean that aviation maintenance staffing must grow commensurately.

One of the new dynamics is that those who work in aviation technician positions must understand

advanced methods to accommodate technological upgrades. Future aircraft will be considerably different than their legacy predecessors in construction methods and materials, technological connectivity and additive manufacturing. At the same time, aircraft mechanics must remain adept at working on legacy aircraft and the current technologies, which will remain in circulation well past 2037. This presents challenges to both employers and the Part 147 schools.


While the Bureau of Labor Statistics anticipates a 12 percent growth in aviation technician jobs between now and 2030, that growth may not be enough for the expanding aviation maintenance industry. But if the demand for aircraft mechanics is so high, why is there still an aviation mechanic shortage. According to several maintenance, repair and overhaul (MRO) facilities recently surveyed by the Aeronautical Repair Station Association, the most common factors in the aircraft mechanic shortage were "difficulty finding and retaining technical talent" and "regulatory costs/burdens." All students, irrespective of previous experience, must go through the same 24 month program to attain FAA licensure as A&P mechanics.

To meet that demand, LCC (along with many other Part 147 schools in the country) have increased class sizes to capacity. In order for LCC to offer more training opportunities, we will need to expand our facility. To that end, we have begun discussions internally to flesh out what an additional hangar would look like, what additional programs other than the Part 147 program we could offer, and what outside support may be available. Our goal is to meet the increasing demand by continuing to offer a high quality, cost effective course of study to those students interested in joining the aviation maintenance career field.
