EAA AeroEducate Program Update

The Young Aviators youth group continued its discovery and adventure into the EAA AeroEducate program during our meeting on Sunday March 20, 2022, During this meeting the youth learned about the flight characteristics of gliders and sailplanes. We also discussed ground operations of gliders and the different ways in which gliders may be launched. The group then learned how gliders and sailplanes stay aloft.

After our discussion, we assembles "FPG-9" gliders fabricated from 9" diameter foam plates graciously donated to us from the Academy of Model Aeronautics (AMA). After some experimentation

with weight & balance, we took our FPG-9's out to the hangar to engage in "phase 1" test flights. It did not take long for the youth to figure out they could achieve longer time aloft and greater distances by launching their FPG-9's from the hangar mezzanine! We all had a good laugh at some of the displayed antics.

We later regrouped in the hangar meeting room to scratch fabricate model gliders from 1/16" sheets and rectangle 3/16" x 3/8" sticks of balsa wood. This was a fun activity which prompted a lot of discussion of wing design, how many wings (even a biplane design), and where the center of gravity should be for a glider. Several Successful test flights were flown by experimenting with adding counterweights.

The kids had fun with this glider activity and lesson. We will begin working on fabricating a fully functional wind tunnel at our next meeting on Sunday April 10, 2022. I would like to thank member Bruce Boardman for insightful knowledge and assistance at our March 10th meeting.

LCC - MASON JEWETT CAMPUS

Someone asked me at the last chapter meeting how we determine what to teach. The FAA's requirements for conduct of a 14 CFR Part 147 Aviation Maintenance Technology school like LCC's includes a number of required curriculum topics (129 to be exact) that must be taught. In addition, each topic can have a number of sub-topics supporting the overarching curriculum subject that must also be covered. Each of the curriculum areas has an associated Teaching Level we must ensure is met. The Teaching Levels are numbered 1, 2 and 3. The FAA defines the three Teaching Levels as follows:

Level 1

(i) Requires knowledge of general principles, but no practical application
(ii) Requires no development of manipulative skill

(iii) Requires instruction by lecture, demonstration and discussion

Level 2

(i) Requires knowledge of general principles, and limited practical application (ii) Requires development of

sufficient manipulative skill to perform basic operations

(iii) Requires instruction by lecture, demonstration, discussion and limited practical application

Level 3

1

3

(i) Requires knowledge of general principles, and performance of a high degree of practical application

(ii) Requires development of sufficient manipulative skills to simulate return to service

(iii) Requires instruction by lecture, demonstration and a high degree of practical application

Examples of the three topics and associated teaching level are:

Service and repair wood structures. Level

Identify and select aircraft finishing materials. Level 2

Form, lay out and bend sheet metal. Level

As you can imagine, developing classroom lectures and laboratory (hangar) exercises for each of the 129 required Curriculum Topics so as to ensure the correct level proficiency is attained is paramount. Couple that with changing industry practices, continuing acquisition of new teaching assets, providing the required minimum number of instruction hours and ensuring students are fully engaged throughout the program results in quite the task for our instructors and staff.


The ultimate evaluative tool to measure our success is our graduates' performance on their FAA examinations once they complete each section of the program. In order to receive FAA designation as a licensed Airframe and Powerplant (A&P) mechanic, graduates have to complete three written examinations covering General, Airframe and Powerplant topics. Subsequent to the written examinations, a graduate appears before a FAA-Designated Maintenance Examiner (DME) for oral and practical (hands-on) examinations on the same three areas of study. LCC's graduates have performed exceptionally well in all phases of their

post-program FAA examination process which reflects the quality of the program and the quality and experience of our instructors.

Employers are exceptionally interested in students who complete their FAA examinations as soon as they are eligible. Self-motivation and drive are traits universally desired in employees, and our students have been diligent in taking their FAA exams as soon as they can.
