Guests: Jim Spry, Margie Clark, Pat Salow → Secretary's Report December 11, 2019; Mark Bathurst made a motion to accept; John Bobcik supported; the motion carried. → Treasurer's

Report December 31, 2019: read by Doug Koons; Mark Bathurst made a motion to accept; John Kuchar supported; the motion carried. → Youth Group report from Jeff Schaud: There was no meeting on December 22nd. Work was proceeding on the tail section, horizontal and vertical sections are done and work on the servos was next. Aircraft building skills can be learned in a variety of places and situations. Take for instance an invite EAA Chapter 55 Young Aviators youth group

received to tour fellow EAA members Steve Houghton, Bill Purosky, Terry Lutz, and Doug Koons hangar at KTEW. The first half of our regularly scheduled Sunday January 26, 2020 meeting was spent learning about the wide variety and unique features of the aircraft housed in the hangar. The group was surprised to learn the wings on the Glastar actually folded or, the wings on the Luscombe are covered in fabric! With the engine cowl removed from the Van's RV-7A, the youth learned what an intake air plenum does and the difference between carbureted and fuel injected engines. And, of course, the Van's RV-8 is always a crowd pleaser. After our tour, the group was presented with a challenge task of seal taping the newly installed bifold hangar door insulation. The kids eagerly took on the challenge completing the task in the allotted time. This task presented the youth with learning a valuable skill which may prove beneficial for a future aircraft build. The same skill set needed to apply the insulation tape could be used to fabric tape the wing covering or apply wing walk grip tape. The youth group sure appreciates the opportunity to learn valuable skills such as this. In exchange for assisting with this task, the youth group received a very generous cash donation. Thank you Mr. Lutz, Mr. Koons, Mr. Purosky, and Mr. Houghton. If you, or anyone you may know, have a challenge task for the Young Aviators youth group; please see Jeff Shaud to schedule. As the weather gets warmer the youth group would be interested in taking on tasks around the airport (cleaning hangars, washing aircraft or cars, vacuuming & detailing interiors, grounds beautification & maintenance, etc.)

significant progress on the four Flite Test Explorer RC aircraft we are assembling. The "core" or cabin portion has been completed. The tail boom and "feathers" are very close with the rudder and elevator servos installed and rigging completed. During our next meeting, we will be closing the tail boom and begin construction of the wing assemblies. We have been receiving extensive assistance from Capital Area Radio Drone Squadron members Mike Pollock, Dave Marks, and Fred Warn. These gentlemen have offered their knowledge, tools, and equipment so that we may proceed with this project in an efficient and timely manner. I cannot thank them enough for their assistance.

LCC - MASON JEWETT CAMPUS By Mark Bathurst (bathursm@star.lcc.edu)

Recent articles have focused on our aviation technology program and the requirements our students must meet to become successful, highly skilled and technically competent aircraft maintenance technicians. Since our students are well into their spring semester studies, I thought for this edition I'd explain how our program fits in the larger LCC picture, and also offer a few facts about LCC itself.

The aviation technology program is part of the LCC's Technical Career's Division. The division offices and other division programs are in LCC's facility on Mt. Hope Road, just east of Crytes Road. Technical Careers is led by Mark Cosgrove, who is my predecessor in the position I now hold. LCC was recently ranked as the second best trade school in the country by Real Work Matters (RWM). Since 1998, RWM.org has been a resource hub for students who are interested in vocational, trade or technical training. LCC was cited for having one of the largest course catalogs among all community colleges and vocational schools in the country. The link to the web site is:

If you are interested in seeing the Technical Careers facility let me know and we can arrange a tour.

Lansing Community College is one of the largest community colleges in Michigan, with the community colleges larger than LCC located in the Detroit area. Students attend in statuses including full time, part time, on-line and continuing education. Funds for LCC come primarily from state allocations, student tuition and property taxes from the 15 communities contiguous to LCC. Tuition for students who live in the school districts surrounding LCC (Bath, Dansville, DeWitt, East Lansing, Grand Ledge, Haslett, Holt/Dimondale, Lansing, Leslie, Mason, Okemos, Stockbridge, Waverly, Webberville, and Williamston) is \$108 per credit hour. Compare that to MSU, WMU, EMU, etc. and the value proposition is clearly in LCC's favor. LCC has five campuses to conveniently serve students. The main campus is downtown, just northeast of the Capitol building. There are also satellite campuses in East Lansing and Howell. As I

indicated, the Technical Careers campus is in West Lansing, and Aviation is at the Mason airport. Making classes convenient in location allows more students to attend and is in keeping with the mission of community colleges.

A large number of programs offered by LCC transfer to four-year universities. Completing the first two years at LCC represents a significant financial savings, and LCC works with most four year universities in Michigan to ensure LCC graduates' courses of study are accepted in full. As an example, aviation students who complete all FAA-required courses and five additional general core courses are awarded two Associates' degrees by LCC, and can complete their Bachelor's degree at either Western Michigan or Sienna Heights University in two years or less.

When one thinks about community colleges, the concepts of value, location, transferability, individualized instruction and an education that leads to immediate employment in jobs currently in demand should be apparent. If someone you know is thinking about where to start their post-secondary education, have them look at LCC. The education opportunities are significant, the value is compelling and employment prospects are significant.
