

## Lil' Butch... Just in case

I suppose all Chapter 55 members are familiar with Lil' Butch, my Clarkat Tug.



Given I'll let pretty much anyone who's interested use it, I thought it may be useful to also provide a copy of the "official" instructions from Clark Equipment Company in case we ever have the need to destroy it to keep it from enemy use here is how to do it.

#### Section II. DEMOLITION

#### 119. General Instructions

The tractor must be demolished only to prevent its capture and use by the enemy. Care must be taken to destroy the same parts on all tractors to prevent enemy use through cannibalization.

#### 120. Specific Instructions

a. Engine. Place a heavy pointed steel bar against cylinder block and beside distributor. Using heavy hammer, drive bar through block and into crankcase and camshaft.

- b. Driving Axle. Place a heavy pointed steel bar against differential case and drive bar through case and into differential gears.
- c. Transmission and Clutch. Smash transmission case, using a heavy hammer or sledge.
- d. Carburetor and Manifold. Smash these assemblies.
   e. Generator, Ignition Coil, Distributor, and
- Spark Plugs. Smash these assemblies.

  f. Battery. Break case and plates.
- g. Radiator. Drive large holes through core and tubes.

h. Fuel Tank. Drive holes through fuel tank.

### Limits on attendance at non-residential gatherings.

# DOUBLE CREDITS FOR YOUNG EAGLES FLIGHTS THIS SUMMER

**April 2021** – Pilots who fly Young Eagles during June, July, and August 2021 will earn double the usual amount of Young Eagles credits for flights during those months! For each Young Eagle flown during those months, a credit of \$10 will be awarded to the chapter affiliated with the pilot, or to the pilot if they are unaffiliated.

These extra credits can be used for any normal purposes to enhance your Young Eagles activities, or for sending a young person to the EAA Air Academy, which will return in 2022. Chapters can also use these credits to purchase a Young Eagles Workshops kit or a Young Eagles Build and Fly kit.

To qualify for double credits, make sure that all the paperwork for your June/June/August flights has been mailed and received by the EAA Young Eagles office no later than September 30, 2021. Make sure you mail the paperwork to EAA as soon as you can after the flights, so your Young Eagles can reap the benefits of an EAA student membership, including free access to Sporty's Learn to Fly course. (NOTE: Paperwork for EAA Chapter 55 flights is compiled and submitted by our Young Eagles Coordinator, Margie Clark.)

LCC - MASON JEWETT CAMPUS

The end of LCC's 16 week spring semester is rapidly approaching. Our students finish the spring semester May 10 and resume classes on June 7. Their summer semester is only 8 weeks, and some classes run longer during the day to make up for the reduced number of weeks. Our second year students will graduate at the end of the summer semester on August 2, and are actively focused on employment opportunities. The summer semester focuses on turbine engines for our second year students. We use the Allison 250 turbine engine found on the Bell Jet Ranger and other helicopters. The military designation of the Allison is

T-63 and T-703, and we have an Army surplus Kiowa OH-58 our students will use for the required engine run at the end of the semester. In addition to the Kiowa, the students also work on the Hawker 125-400's Garrett TFE-731 engines to gain further experience in the types of engines/aircraft they will encounter in the workplace. Employers in all areas of the aviation maintenance industry commend our program for offering multiple engine/aircraft types for expanded exposure to what our graduates will encounter in the career field.

As previously discussed, industry surveys are forecasting increased demand for both pilot and maintenance technicians in the next 10-20 years. Aircraft maintenance employers are once again calling with increased frequency asking three questions: When do your students graduate? How many are graduating? When can we talk to your students? This is great news given where we have been in the last year, and the early signs of recovery are encouraging.

Our graduates have opportunities to work in any part of the world. The FAA Airframe and Powerplant (A&P) license is recognized and accepted throughout the world since employers know what subject material our students study, the level of proficiency our students must demonstrate on all of their required course outcomes and the hours spent on various subjects covered during the two years they are in school. The FAA A&P license truly is the international gold standard for maintenance technicians.

In addition to the program leading to the A&P license, our students can also be awarded two LCC Associates' degrees with the completion of five general education core courses. The core course subject areas include mathematics, science, writing, communication and global perspectives and diversity, and students take one course from each area. The importance of the Associates' degrees relates to management opportunities with employers as well as transferability to Western Michigan University or Sienna Heights University, where our students start as college juniors for completion of a bachelor's degree.

#### **Command Potential**

I am learning to be a pilot and new member of EAA55; I am also the new Civil Air Patrol (CAP) Commander for Scott M. Burgess Memorial Squadron 257. We meet in the Jewitt Mason Airport Monday nights. You're welcome to join us. I was reminded the other day why we do what we do—because not everyone does it. I read once that pilots are in command of their aircraft and have responsibility for it. It is called being the "pilot in command" (Gleim 33).

I wonder how many children looking up at the sky, pretending to be that pilot overhead, become pilots. What is it about planes that captivates children and idolize pilots? We all want to be important when we grow up. But the mystery of being a *pilot in command* is more than its novelty. Researchers call it the "command potential" (Shouksmith). This study believed when selecting pilots for promotion to captain, they must possess "qualities of leadership relevant to this field (commercial piloting)."

I submit that these pilot qualities are different than leader qualities on ground level. A chapter entitled, "Aeronautical Decision-Making," automatically sets the horizon for something esoteric to this command potential (US). There is, for example in that chapter: crew resource management, specific flight risks, decision-making in a Dynamic Environment just to name a few.

There is something unique about the theory of being a pilot in command. The fascinations of pilots in the sky are the same on the ground. That pilots do things not normally pursued. The command potential consists of traits. not the least of which, is rising when others remain down. To rise above mediocrity and do what is not normally done.
