
Young Eagles this Saturday

Youth Group Flight

A big thank you to those pilots who volunteered their time, aircraft, and fuel to fly the kids on Sunday July 25, 2021: Bob Clark, John Bobcik, and Pat Salow. It was a beautiful day to take the kids for a flight.

Flight Simulator

You may have noticed a new addition to our library section of the EAA 55 meeting room at the hangar. Through a generous donation, the youth group has acquired a flight simulator package. The package includes a yoke, rudder pedals, a throttle quadrant, and Microsoft Flight Simulator 10 software. The system is not up and running just yet. A small repair is being made to the yoke assembly. A big thanks goes out to Mr. David Alexander for working to get this package set up for the kids to enjoy and take their flight learning to the next step.

I.C. Engine Project

The Young Aviators youth group was able to start their internal combustion (I.C.) engine project on Sunday August 8, 2021. Our first lesson included learning the four-strokes of an I.C. engine: intake, compression, power (or ignition), and exhaust. The children also learned what it takes to sustain a running I.C. engine: fuel, air, and ignition. After our classroom learning we gathered in the EAA 55 Builders hangar to begin our practical experience with two Predator 6.5 HP 212cc four-cycle engines.

Our first task was to uncrate the engines and inspect them for shipping damage. Next, the kids learned the major parts of these engines: the fuel tank, starter recoil, air cleaner, carburetor, spark plug, exhaust manifold, flywheel/fan shroud, and the crankshaft output shaft. Since our objective is to completely disassemble, inspect, and reassemble these engines, it was important that we demonstrate that these engines do, indeed, run! The kids learned how to fill and check the level of the crankcase oil. The engines were then mounted, with the appropriate fasteners, to a test stand fabricated by Mr. Jim Spry. We then add a small amount of gasoline (non-avgas!) to the fuel tanks. The test stand, with the mounted engines, was then moved to the outdoors where each of the kids had the experience of starting and running the engines.



After running the engines and exercising the throttles generously, they were shut-down, allowed to cool, and the fluids were then drained back out of the fuel tanks and crankcases. The kids were amazed at how contaminated the fresh engine oil had become in just the short amount of time they were operated. They learned that engine break-in is one of the most critical aspect of long engine longevity and frequent oil changes can significantly extend the life of an engine. Next, we began our tear-down by removing the engines from the test stand and placed them on the tear-down bench generously donated to the youth group by Mr. Bill Perosky and Mr. Doug Koons. By



the end of our meeting session, the kids had the air cleaner housings and fuel tanks removed and stored on the shelving unit. This is about all we had time to accomplish during our meeting on August 8th. We will take a short break and not meet on our regularly scheduled meeting of August 22nd because of Mason Aviation Day on Saturday August 21.

The youth group is still in need of two more Harbor Freight Predator 6.5 HP 212cc horizontal shaft engines. Ideally, it would be nice to have an engine for every 2-3 youth group members to work on. This would allow each youth group member to have hands-on experience with all aspects of the engine operation and overhaul. If you are interested in making a donation of one of these engines to the youth group, it would be greatly appreciated. These engines can be obtained from Harbor Freight (local stores in Lansing & Jackson) for approximately \$140.00. Your donation is tax deductible. We are also looking for new and/or used tools: small tool boxes, 1/4" & 3/8" drive metric & SAE socket sets and ratchets, metric & SAE combination wrenches, screwdrivers, pliers, ball-peen hammers, plastic deadblow hammers, shop rags & blue paper towels.

A Plea For Help!

I am asking for help in the form of mentorship in the youth group program. As you may be well aware, the EAA national program for child protection requires I have at least one other child protection trained adult in attendance while meeting with youth during chapter activities. If there is no other adult mentor

present, I am forced to cancel our youth group meeting. LCC - MASON JEWETT CAMPUS

As the aviation industry emerges from the devastating effects of COVID-19, the demand for aviation technicians is once again on the rise. It's starting to feel more like it did before COVID. Prior to COVID, our students were seeing opportunities from employers in record numbers. That is again the sense

as we talk to companies interested in hiring our graduates.

Our graduation is August 2, and 40 students will receive their certification that enables them to test for their FAA Airframe and Powerplant license. That's the highest number of graduates in recent years, and given that our capacity is 50 students per year, students have persevered in spite of the COVID-related restrictions.

In its most recent pilot and technician outlook report, issued in 2020, Boeing estimated that 739,000 new technicians would be needed worldwide during the next 20 years, much of it due to the large number of recent and upcoming retirements in the field. That includes 192,000 new technicians needed in North America, assuming that air traffic will recover to 2019 levels within the next few years, according to the report.

Companies are now beginning to ramp up their recruitment and address the technician shortage. Students at LCC spend 24 months getting their certificates of completion for FAA licensure, and can also attain two associate's degree in aviation maintenance technology with five additional core courses. Graduates have a wide array of options, from working in line maintenance on a commercial aircraft, working for a manufacturer to help build an aircraft or working in repair facilities, both large and small.

Even before the pandemic, aviation maintenance technicians were much in demand. Airframe and powerplant [A&P] certifications issued in 2019-20 rose by 10 percent over the previous year to 7,363, according to the Aviation Technician Education Council's latest Pipeline Report. Certifications dropped by 10 percent in the last academic year, likely due to COVID impacts, according to Crystal Maguire, executive director.

Enrollments at A&P schools also dropped by 2 percent last year nationwide, following a record increase of 13 percent in enrollments in 2019. Retirements in the field still outweigh the growth. "Right before COVID we knew we needed to increase our annual output of new mechanics by 37 percent to meet 20-year demand," Maguire said. "If the long-term demand isn't impacted by COVID, as suggested by last year's Boeing outlook, we will need

to increase our output while also making up for the 2020 'supply' impacts," she said, noting that she has yet to run the numbers for needed output this year.

We have a number of students who, prior to graduation, have received several job offers that they're considering. They're able to study things like company benefits and location and what they really want to see happen with their career, instead of just taking the first job that comes along to them because that might be all that they get. It's great to see our career field returning to normal.
