

## Board of Directors Meeting, January 7, 2009

BOD members present: President Bill Bezdek, V Pres Bill Purosky, Vickie Vandenbelt, Doug Koons, Rick Dallas, Al Spalding. Members in absentia: David James and Sharron Hacker (represented by proxy), Pres Bill Bezdek called the meeting to order at 7:02 PM.

Secretary's report: Vickie Vandenbelt moved that the minutes of the December 2008 meeting be accepted as written, seconded by Bill Purosky, carried unanimously.

Treasurer's report. Doug Koons presented Sharron's report for consideration. Doug Koons moved that the December Treasurer's report be accepted as written, seconded by Rick Dallas, carried unanimously.

Membership report. One new member, Cliff Hale. Dues must be paid by February 15 to continue as a member. Unpaid members will be deleted from our membership list on March 1. As of this date approximately 62 members have renewed.


# **Young Eagles**

# **Notes from Cape Juby**

Many incredible events have been recorded in the 106 years since the airplane turned our collective imagination toward the sky. The first transatlantic flight by Charles Lindberg to capture the Orteig Prize, the first landing on the moon by Neil Armstrong, the man-powered Gossamer Albatross designed by Paul Macready and flown by Brian Allen to capture the Kremer Prize, the first non-stop around the world flight by Dick Rutan and Jeana Yeager, the first landing of the space shuttle Columbia by John Young and Bob Crippen, and the Burt Rutan designed SpaceShip One flown into space by Mike Melville to capture the Ansari X-prize. When you see these things happen, you want to stand up on a park bench and cheer!

On January 15, 2009 a new flight was written into the record of aviation history. The flawless ditching in the Hudson River by Captain Chesley Sullenberger III will now be forever etched in aviation history. Some will say that Captain Sullenberger wasn't really a hero, he was just doing his job. But on that day, for those 150 passengers and his

crew of 5, he was in fact a hero. And, it is far more important to say that he rekindled our national spirit at a time when our spirits are pretty low. I think we all stood up and cheered!

Captain Sullenberger showed us that leadership brings people through the storm of impossibility. He showed us that patience and skill are the virtues that matter most in time of crisis. And he showed us that the airline Captain, whose job demands the highest of standards, and in the past decade has been given the minimum of respect, does in fact assume the mantle of those four stripes and embrace responsibility for the lives of the people on board his or her airplane.

Last month, I mentioned that airline pilots had flown carefully through some of the worst weather the US has seen in a winter flying season. And that was just for December! January weather was just as bad, and it was colder by a large margin. But for Captain Sullenberger, the double bird strike and double engine failure came on a nearly perfect day on the east coast. Winds were light from the north, the sky was clear, and wave action on the Hudson River was at a minimum.

Climbing through 3000' the A320 he was flying passed through a flock of birds, and some were ingested in both engines. Having just retracted the flaps from the takeoff configuration, they were just above 200 knots when both engines lost power. Taking control and easing the nose over to maintain a constant glide speed, Captain Sullenberger maintained aircraft control, calmly assessed the situation, then took the course of action that had the highest probability of a successful outcome.

When you think about it, if power is lost in both engines on a twin-engine commercial aircraft, the probability of catastrophe is almost 100%. If an airport is nearby, it will require flawless execution to make the runway, and even then the electrical and hydraulic systems may be only partially powered. If no runway is available, or if the weather is poor, the airplane will land off airport, on a piece land that isn't flat and isn't long.

In the situation that faced Captain Sullenberger, no airport was in gliding distance, and his electrical and hydraulic systems were likely degraded. The island of Manhattan and the surrounding countryside is heavily populated, which left the Hudson River as the only flat, obstacle-free touchdown zone available. His touchdown in the water was flawlessly wings level, at the right speed, and at the right pitch attitude. So when everything finally came together, the glide speed, the checklist accomplishment, selection of the ditching site, and finally the perfect water entry, the best possibility of survival was assured.

Working with a very experienced cabin crew, the forward and over-wing slides were deployed as ferries and tugboats quickly arrived to take the passengers on board. I will say this about the marine professionals working the water around New York: when things get tough, they get going and make things happen! Having never worked an emergency with an airplane before, they put that heavy equipment right up to the fuselage, kept it in position with the current on the Hudson and made the rescue look almost easy.

OK, now hold on a minute. What are the probabilities here? What is the probability that birds would fail both engines? And what is the probability it would happen on a day when the weather was ideal? Now, what is the probability that all of this occurred in winter when the river was free of pleasure boats that would have been obstacles? Then, what is the probability that the airplane would enter the water and

be immediately surrounded by rescue boats? And finally, what is the probability that this would happen with perhaps the most experienced cockpit and cabin crew at US Airways? To answer that question, I have one picture of the airplane in the water that some of you may not have seen. This truly was a Miracle on the Hudson.



On another subject, we recently learned that our friend and fellow chapter member Dick Wilkie, in Florida for the winter, is suffering from lung cancer. He is undergoing chemotherapy, and has a tough battle ahead to recover. We sincerely hope he we will back in Michigan for the nice Spring weather, and once again have the opportunity to fly the beautiful Rans S-6S he completed nearly 3 years ago. On a final note, January marked the passing of Nancy Bird-Walton. No, she wasn't the great grandmother of Luke Walton, from the TV show "The Waltons". Nancy Bird-Walton was a pioneer aviatrix in Australia. Born Nancy Bird in October 1915, she developed a keen interest in aviation, and took her first flying lesson at age 13 in a Gypsy Moth.

Saving money for flying lessons, at age 19 she began flying as a student with Sir Charles Kingsford Smith (the first person to fly across the Pacific). She found a fourth hand Gypsy Moth that had been wrecked, rebuilt it, then barnstormed and flew air races with the airplane. In 1936, she came in second in a race from Adelaide to Brisbane. The winner was Reg Ansett, who used the 500 AuD to start Ansett Airlines.

At the time, she was living in the outback and flying air ambulance missions for the Far West Children's Health Scheme. It was beyond the reach of the now famous Royal Flying Doctor Service. Nancy Bird always flew wearing a skirt, because wearing pants would have been considered "un lady-like". Aeronautical charts were non-existent, and navigation was frequently with road maps and a description of the location explained over the phone. In all her years as an active pilot, she never had an accident, an amazing accomplishment in the early days of aviation, and the harsh environment of the Australian outback.

In 1939, she married an Englishman, Charles Walton, and became Nancy Bird-Walton. She was Australian Commandant of the Women's Air Training Corps during WW II, and in 1950 founded the Australian Women Pilots' Association. She was so much loved in Australia, that when the first Airbus A380 was delivered to Qantas in November 2008, the airplane was named "Nancy Bird-Walton" in her honor. She was 93 when she passed away in January.

I know it has been cold, and I know there has been a lot of snow. But I also know it will melt, and everyone will be itching to get out and fly. But, be careful. It is easy to be raring to go and overlook some tiny but important detail. Work slowly. Take care with everything you do, and when things don't seem exactly right – they aren't! And please look after you fellow pilot and lend a hand when you can. This time of year, someone will need a small, but important helping hand.

## From the Flight Surgeon

This time of year we frequently need to "self-treat" symptoms with over the counter (OTC) medications due to colds, flu or allergies. Most of us know that these medications can cause drowsiness. But it is often forgotten that the effects of the drugs can last 12-24 hours depending on type. It is always best to wait till all the symptoms are gone and you have been off the OTC's for at least 24 hours before flying. Fly safe!

# Sebring Expo

Being in Florida for the winter and with nothing else to do on a perfectly sunny day, I pulled on my shorts and a plane tee shirt, jumped on my Harley and headed down south US 27 about 40 miles to Sebring Airport where the Light Sport Aircraft Expo was underway which ran on Jan 24<sup>th</sup> and 25. There were approximately 100 vendors displaying their avionics, equipment and many planes. Most of the plane vendors were providing demo rides to prospective buyers. Some companies were demonstrating short field take offs and landings and how powerful and quite their planes were. I photographed several makes as follows.

This is the Legend Cub LSA. It can be fitted with the 100 hp Continental or the 120 hp Jabiru. Top speed is 115 mph. Price is \$90,000





This is one is the Hilander, built by JUST Aircraft. A very nice tail dragger with tundra tires. It has a Stratomaster panel and the engine is a 912 Rotax. Price as seen is \$92,000.



The EUROFOX is another nice tail dragger. It is fitted with the 100 hp 912 Rotax and costs \$63,000





The REMOS GX was the premiere LSA on display with its folding wings. Its equipped with a glass cockpit in addition to a very nice standard panel. Everyone would like to own this one. Check it out at <a href="https://www.REMOS.com">www.REMOS.com</a>



The Titan T-51, a 3/4 scale plane with a V-6 Suzuki engine was a big crowd pleaser. A new Honda engine rated at 245 hp will be installed sometime this year.



The next day I hear there was a plane crash at the Expo which was the Remos GX and later learned that my neighbors here in Frost proof were the pilots uncle and aunt.

I spoke to them about the incident. They said their nephew Michael, took off early Sunday morning with a photographer aboard to rendezvous with another Remos for a photo shoot and apparently the door had been removed from the plane for this purpose. While climbing out, the pilot noticed that the photographer, made a sideways move and apparently put his foot and part of his body outside of the plane, then there was a huge gust of wind in the cabin and the plane went into a right turn which the pilot could not correct. Michael was a military pilot and had hundreds of hours and has worked for Remos flying for about a year, but everything he did, he couldn't keep the plane flying.

Upon impact, the photographer was killed. Michael suffered 2 broken legs, 5 broken ribs, his arms are incapacitated from some other damage, he has severe head and farcical injuries and he has received 5 surgeries to date with more to come and of course will be hospitalized for some time to come.
