

EAA Chapter 55 Board of Directors Meeting, October 7, 2009

Members in attendance: President Bill Bezdek, Vice President Bill Purosky, Secretary George Moore, Treasurer Sharron Hacker, Young Eagles coordinator and Director Doug Koons, Membership Chairperson and Director Vickie Vandenbelt, and Director David James. Members in absentia: Director Rick Dallas and Director Al Spalding. Guest: Bob Harris, from B H Vending. Mr. Harris was invited by David James to assist us in planning for one or possibly two vending machines to be placed at the Terminal Building. Mr. Harris would supply pop and snack items to be determined and also to provide cost proposals via David James. Decisions pending. The meeting was called to order by President Bezdek at 2318 Z (7:13 p.m., EDT). Secretary's report: Doug Koons moved to accept as written, seconded by Bill Purosky, motion carried. Treasurer's report: Discussion followed re: Newberry scholarship and how much should be donated to EMU. It was moved by Bill Purosky, seconded by David James that the amount should be \$2,500.00, motion carried. Sharron Hacker brought up the question of what constitutes a new member? After some discussion, Doug Koons moved that a new member is one who has never previously

EAA Chapter 55 Gen'l Membership Meeting, October 10, 2009

There were 39 members present. Guests: We are pleased to have as our guests Bryan and Breah Plaunt; also Mr. Bill Long. President Bill Bezdek called the meeting to order at 1334 Z (9:34 a.m., EDT). Secretary's Report: It was noted that on the front page of the September newsletter the date was given as 2008. The correct year is 2009. Secretary's report with this amended date was move by Dick Bacon to accept. Motion seconded and carried. Treasurer's report was approved as presented, moved, seconded and carried. Young Eagles: Doug Koons reported that we have flown 181 youngsters over just two event days and that for the entire year we have flown between 200 and 300 YE. Notes from Cape Juby

We were doing some exploring in France last weekend, and decided to climb to the top of the Puy de Dome near the city of Clermont-Ferrand. The Puy de Dome is the highest in a chain of several extinct volcanoes. As we drove through the city toward the base of the volcano, I noticed a large industrial complex with a long building that had a huge sloped roof at each end. It looked like someone had created a building with an indoor ski jump at each end, but in fact it was a test facility for the Michelin Tire Company, headquartered in Clermont-Ferrand. And therein begins the story for the November "Notes From Cape Juby".

Low clouds blanketed the city, but as we drove uphill toward the base of the of the Puy de Dome, the clouds changed from broken to scattered, but were still pretty low. We would certainly be hiking upwards and through the clouds to emerge in bright sunshine. From the parking area, the altitude gain would be about 2000'. The top of the volcano is about 4800' above sea level, or about the same altitude as Denver, Colorado.

The path up is fairly steep, probably a 10-12% grade. While we trudged up the path, trying to catch our wind and settle into a rhythm for the climb, a guy comes by on a mountain bike, pedaling like crazy, but only going about 1.5 mph. Hard to keep one's balance at that speed! The path is easy to walk, and it has been groomed with finely crushed volcanic rock, which feels great under foot. We reached the top and hiked around what was once an active volcanic cone. The weather was clearing, and revealed a spectacular view of the city, which is dominated by a huge cathedral in the center. Constructed of volcanic rock, the cathedral is the color of charcoal, unlike most of the cathedrals in Europe.

As we were about to head back down again, I stopped in the gift shop to find a book with some nice pictures of the Puy de Dome. While paging through one of the books, I noticed an old picture showing an airplane parked on the summit. "What's the story behind this picture", I thought. The picture was taken on the summit in 1911.



Details of buildings and surrounding terrain were confirmed from what we could see around us. At the information desk, we learned that there was a monument to the aviator who had landed there, and we found a path which led to its location.



In 1908, Andre and Edouard Michelin created the Grand Prix de Michelin, designed to boost the development of the French aircraft industry. The prize was 100,000 French Francs, which today would be worth about \$25,000. To win, the pilot with passenger had to fly the distance from Paris to Clermont-Ferrand (roughly 185 nm) in less than six hours, carrying one passenger, and land on the top of the Puy de Dome. This met the basic requirements of distance, speed, and altitude that the prize required. To further validate the flight, the airplane had to circle the Arc de Triomphe in Paris to begin, and circle the cathedral at the heart of Clermont-Ferrand before landing at the summit.

On March 7, 1911, pilot Eugene Renaux and his mechanic Albert Senouque departed Paris and in hazy conditions and headed towards Clermont-Ferrand. Accounts of the flight do not mention enroute stops for fuel. They were flying a Farman biplane, which likely flew at 40-50 knots with a 50 hp V8 Renault engine. Fuel consumption was likely about 6 gph. Flown non-stop, the flight would have taken 4-5 hours, with a fuel consumption of 30-35 gallons. We know that they departed Paris at 0912, and landed at the summit at 1423, so their time in-flight was 5 hours and 11 minutes. Based on their estimated speed and time enroute, it is unlikely that they could have stopped for fuel.

What makes the flight more remarkable is that cross-country flying techniques were still being developed. Maps were poor, and they probably had a 10 lb compass borrowed from someone's boat. Who knows what the wind was, or whether they had a headwind or tailwind. There were no roads or rivers to follow. Most rivers in that region run east to west, toward the Atlantic, not north-south along the route from Paris to Clermont-Ferrand. It must have been pretty cold sitting on the wing of an open biplane on March 7th in central France, a cold that they endured for more than 5 hours.

After circling the cathedral at Clermont-Ferrand, 34 year old pilot Eugene Renaux, with one year of flying experience, climbed toward the summit of the Puy de Dome and made one key decision to land the airplane on what is at best a bumpy patch of level ground about 250 feet long. At the last moment, he would pull the nose up and use power to slow the descent

rate onto the summit. It worked. Had he misjudged the landing, the airplane would have been broken on the rocks just before and just beyond the landing site. The landing excited the community of Clermont-Ferrand, who watched the event from their rooftops. The area became a manufacturing center for Breguet aircraft, and the first paved runway in the world was constructed there in 1916.

With the beginning of November, flying days and days warm enough to work on airplanes are becoming fewer and fewer. It's a good time to catch up on your reading, and for aviators, there is nothing better than a great book about flying and adventure. Last Spring, I was surfing the website of Van's Air Force as I frequently do, and came across someone's list of the 10 greatest aviation books. Then other people chimed in with their choices, and list began to grow. I decided to have some fun and record all the books that people had listed. The total came to nearly 40 different books.

What I'm going to do is list the top 5 books on my aviation list, and challenge everyone to send me their top 5 list. The idea is not to find what the consensus favorite books actually are, but to challenge everyone to find a book they haven't read, and read it over the winter. Hey, they make great Christmas presents! So here is my list:

From the Flight Surgeon

Winter is just around the corner and with it the cold and flu season, not to mention the current concern with the H1N1 "Swine" flu. Virtually all cough and cold medications used to treat symptoms of colds and flu carry significant side effect potential such as drowsiness and sedation, which could compromise the safety of your next flight!

Some over the counter (OTC) preparations can persist in your system quite some time when taken. If ill with colds or flu it would be prudent to ground yourself till 24-48 hours have elapsed since the end of symptoms and you have discontinued all OTC and/or prescription medications. Fly Safe!
