



The Experimental Aircraft Association is bringing back its Sport Pilot Academy in 2023.

The all-inclusive and immersive program aims to help student pilots earn their sport pilot certificate in as little as three weeks, according to EAA officials.

The association will offer three sessions for the Sport Pilot Academy in 2023: June 1-22, Aug. 10-31, and Sept. 7-28.

The academy offers small-group and one-on-one instruction, a dedicated fleet of RV-12iST S-LSA training aircraft, on-site room and board on the EAA Aviation Center grounds, and more, according to EAA officials.

"Flight schools often have a very high dropout rate due to scheduling conflicts, aircraft availability, and other obstacles," said Jeremy Desruisseaux, Director of Flight Proficiency Programs. "EAA Sport Pilot Academy offers student pilots a dedicated space to completely focus on getting the necessary training to earn their sport pilot certificate."

Total training fee is \$9,999, which includes the use of school aircraft and equipment, fuel, flight instruction, lodging, meals, and other associated costs (i.e., examiner fees and museum admission). The only associated costs not included in the training fee is the FAA knowledge test fee, which is approximately \$175.



Line Up and Wait Procedures

INCREASING SUMMER TRAFFIC WILL LEAD TO MORE LINE UP AND WAIT (LUAW) OPERATIONS.

WHEN LUAW IS USED THE AIRCRAFT BEING PUT IN POSITION WILL BE TOLD ABOUT THE NEXT ARRIVAL, IF THAT AIRCRAFT IS WITHIN 6 FLYING MILES. THAT ARRIVAL WILL ALSO BE TOLD ABOUT THE TRAFFIC IN POSITION ON THE RUNWAY.

ARR TOWER CANNOT ISSUE A LANDING
CLEARANCE WHILE TRAFFIC IS IN LUAW. SO YOU
MAY HEAR "RUNWAY XX CONTINUE" OR "TURN
BASE" WITHOUT A LANDING CLEARANCE.

Overflights at 3000ft

ARR TOWER HAS AN AGREEMENT WITH CHICAGO APPROACH SO THEY CAN FLY THROUGH OUR CLASS DELTA AT 3000ft MSL WITHOUT COORDINATING WITH THE TOWER.

WE ARE CONSTANTLY SCANNING FOR CONFLICTS BUT IF YOU PLAN TO CLIMB TO 3000ft WHILE IN THE CLASS DELTA IT CAN BE VERY CONGESTED.

Short Delay on Runway

RECENTLY THE TOWER HAS NOTICED AN INCREASE IN SHORT DELAYS ON THE RUNWAY WITHOUT PRIOR COORDINATION.

A DELAY AS SHORT AS **5 SECONDS** WITHOUT PRIOR COORDINATION CAN CAUSE CONTROLLERS TO HAVE TO SEND AN AIRCRAFT AROUND.

IF YOU NEED TO DELAY ON THE RUNWAY FOR MORE THAN A 2-3 SECONDS, PLEASE ADVISE THE TOWER CONTROLLERS SO WE CAN PLAN AHEAD AND CREATE A SAFER AND MORE EFFICIENT AIRPORT.

Expectation Bias

REMEMBER TO FIGHT EXPECTATION BIAS WHILE FLYING.

ATC MAY INSTRUCT YOU TO TURN OFF AT A RUNWAY OR TAXIWAY THAT ISN'T THE FIRST YOU SEE – IF UNSURE, ASK.

ATC MAY GIVE YOU A TURN IN A DIRECTION YOU WEREN'T EXPECTING TO GO OR GIVE YOU A PATTERN ENTRY THAT DOESN'T GIVE YOU THE MOST DIRECT ROUTE TO THE AIRPORT.

ACTIVE LISTENING ON FREQUENCY IS IMPERATIVE TO FIGHTING EXPECTATION BIAS.

ARR Has A New ASOS Phone Number




On April 18th, Aurora ATC updated their phone lines and changed the ASOS phone number to 630-466-5649

What is ASOS?

Weather is the pilot's great unknown. It's constantly changing, and no two days are the same. Timely and accurate weather reports are critical to making good decisions that keep our flights safe. To help inform those decisions, the United States has a network of weather reporting stations, made up primarily of the automated weather observation system (AWOS) and automated surface observation system (ASOS).

Each system is a collection of sensors that report conditions to the FAA for dissemination, over a dedicated phone line, and to the control tower.



Although many pilots use the terms interchangeably, there are some differences between the two systems. AWOS is the older of the two, and it can be found only on an airport. ASOS is run as a cooperative among several government agencies, and stations can therefore be found off airports, which may help with route planning. Reporting intervals may be different as well, with AWOS reporting every minute, typically at a nontowered airport, and ASOS reporting only once an hour, to coincide with the tower's automated report. ASOS also reports total precipitation accumulation.

Most systems in use today offer temperature, dew point, cloud cover and altitude, visibility, wind speed and direction, any current precipitation, and location of lightning strikes. Some also have the ability to report icing and runway conditions.

Beginning May 15th, expert flight instructors and representatives from various aviation organizations will present free, interactive webinars. These webinars will cover topics from starting flight training, saving time and money in flight training, preparing for the FAA written exam, to passing the checkride, and so much more. Combining the educational forums from the Learn to Fly Center and the connections and inspiration found at Flying Start events, EAA Learn to Fly Week is the latest effort in the ongoing effort to help aspiring pilots achieve their dream of flight.






April Question:


