The Air Classics Museum of Aviation is a volunteer-run aviation museum located just a block west of the Aurora Municipal Airport (ARR) in Sugar Grove, Illinois.


The collection includes aircraft, vehicles, uniforms and other aviation memorabilia from the 1930s to the present time. Volunteer veterans offer guided tours of the aircraft located on-site and visitors are encouraged to sit in an A-7 flown in the Gulf War, as well as climb into the pilot's seat of an UH-1 Huey helicopter.

CHAPTER 579 YOUNG EAGLE RALLY UPDATE

2021 Rally Schedule

Jun 27 / Jul 18 / Aug 15 / Sep 19 / Oct 17

As you all know, due to the health risks associated with COVID-19, in the interest of safety we decided to cancel all of our 2020 Young Eagles Rallies.

We have been closely monitoring the CDC Guidelines as well as those of State and Local authorities and have decided to restart our Young Eagle Rallies on June 27, 2021.

Since we are still living in a COVID-19 world, we will be undertaking a number of changes for our June rally. These changes may be in place for future rallies but this will be determined at a later date.

The changes that will be in place for June include the following:

- No walk up registration All registrations must take place online before the rally. Registration details will be posted on our Facebook Page (EAA Chapter 579) as we get closer to the date of our rally
- . All Young Eagles must wear masks while inside the aircraft
- While our aircraft hold one to three Young Eagles, all Young Eagles in a single aircraft must be from the same family. As a result, we anticipate that many flights will leave with empty seats.

Additional safety precautions will be in place to protect our Young Eagles, volunteers and their families.



Launched in 1992, the Young Eagles program has dedicated more than 25 years to giving youth ages 8–17 their first free ride in an airplane. It's the only program of its kind, with the sole mission to introduce and inspire kids in the world of aviation. Today, more than 2.2 million young people have enjoyed a free introductory flight through the Young Eagles program. On Tuesday, April 27th, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) unveiled updated guidelines detailing activities that vaccinated people can safely resume, including attending small outdoor gatherings without the need to wear a mask.

The new "interim public health recommendations" detail a variety of situations in which individuals who have been fully vaccinated against COVID-19 can forgo wearing a mask, but urged the continued use of face coverings in most indoor settings and in crowded outdoor areas.


This is great news as the Chapter, during our April Virtual Gathering, decided to resume in person Chapter Gatherings at the end of May and Young Eagle rallies in June.

The new recommendations say fully vaccinated individuals can engage in the following activities without wearing masks:

- Walking, running, hiking or biking outdoors alone or with members of their household
- Attending small outdoor gatherings with fully vaccinated family and friends
- Attending small outdoor gatherings with a mixture of fully vaccinated and unvaccinated people
- Dining at outdoor restaurants with friends from multiple households.

Fully vaccinated people can also attend "a crowded, outdoor event, like a live performance, parade, or sports event," as long as they remain masked, according to a CDC infographic of the new guidelines...

From The Flight Deck

A safety incident on a runway involving a commercial jet is always a top news headline. However, smaller general aviation (GA) aircraft involved in a runway mishap or a close call at a runway intersection is just as big of a concern for the Federal Aviation Administration.

For the two-year period of 2019–2020, there were nearly 1,900 runway incursions caused by pilot error. General aviation pilots were involved in about 1,500, or 78 percent, of those runway issues.

"We need to reduce risk in the system by raising the awareness of general aviation pilots and providing them more understanding of local runway and taxiway configurations," explains Glen Martin, FAA Vice President of Safety and Technical Training.

This is the premise behind the expanding <u>From the Flight Deck runway safety video initiative</u>. The FAA has produced a series of 4- to 5-minute videos of actual approach, landing and runway taxi scenarios at small and medium-size airports using Go-Pro cameras in a Cessna to recreate the GA pilot viewpoint. Graphics, animation and runway diagrams accompany the footage, along with a voice-over to fully describe and educate about runway and intersection "hot spots" at specific airports across the United States.

So far, more than three dozen videos have been developed and released free to the public, which highlight runways and intersections at 38 different U.S. airports. General videos also have been created for GA operations that focus on wrong airport landings, wrong surface landings, winter weather, wrong direction departures and hold short procedures. The video series has garnered more than 170,000 views since its inception.

The FAA plans to create and release videos for 30 to 40 more airports during the next two years. Additional goals include linking every video to its corresponding airport web site and for general aviation trade associations to help build awareness and distribution of these safety videos through their own social media sites.

"These are invaluable safety tools for general aviation pilots and for airports with general aviation operations," adds Martin. "Getting the right information to the pilot will help make us safer."

Question:

Where do N-numbers come from?



Answer:

The U.S. received the "N" as its nationality designator under the International Air Navigation Convention, held in 1919.

Only U.S. and four other nations were assigned a unique first letter. In each case, that first letter was the same as a radio call letter that had been previously assigned to that nation by an evolving series of international agreements. Originally W for the Wright Brothers was proposed for the US but the Navy had already been using N as a radio call sign since 1909.



The earliest legal requirement for the N marking is found in 1927.

Prior to 1948 the letter 'N' was usually suffixed by one of the six following: 'C' for Commercial, 'L' for Limited, 'P' for Private, 'R' for Restricted, 'S' for State or 'X' for Experimental.

Starting in 1960 wing surface markings were no longer required.

SUN n FUN Recap

EAA Begins 'Project 21' Museum Expansion



EAA's "Project 21" initiative, including the first expansion of the EAA Aviation Center in Oshkosh in more than 20 years, will bring year-round aviation education and training to current and future aviators. Groundbreaking for the two-story, 30,000-square-foot facility, connected to the EAA Aviation Museum, took place on Monday, April 26, with EAA and community leaders present.

"While the EAA Aviation Museum highlights more than a century of accomplishments in personal flight, a major part of EAA's mission to grow participation in aviation is to offer high-level programming for current and future pilots," said Jack J. Pelton, EAA's CEO and Chairman of the Board. "Project 21 brings that vision to reality, and further strengthens Oshkosh as the home for those who pursue their dreams of flight."

The \$6.2 million project, completely funded via a capital campaign separate from EAA member dues, will feature an innovative Pilot Proficiency Center and a hands-on Youth Education Center. These facilities are adjacent to the museum's current Eagle Hangar and will allow individuals and groups to experience all of EAA's resources on a year-round basis.

The Pilot Proficiency Center features a state-of-the-art skill building and training center for general aviation pilots. It combines relevant safety forums with challenging simulator training sessions that address key flight safety issues. The new facility will focus on improving pilots' overall aeronautical decision-making skills.

The Youth Education Center brings aviation-centric experiences to the EAA Aviation Museum year-round. The 15,000-square-foot Youth Education Center will provide youth, their parents, and their teachers access to interactive and project-based activities that inspire and nurture the next generation of aviators.

Project 21 is Phase One of EAA's long-range plan for its museum, which transforms the facility into one that encompasses history, training, and education. Completion of construction is expected by May 2022, with a grand opening scheduled for EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2022 in July of that year.

March Answers:

This fine aircraft is none other than the Buhl-Verville J-4 Airster.

This aircraft was the first of the civil or so-called "commercial airplanes" to receive the new "Approved Type Certificate", A.T.C #1, on March 29th, 1927 by the newly instituted "Aeronautics Branch" of the U.S. Department of Commerce. This Aeronautical branch of the Department of Commerce was established to regulate the manufacture of the planes being built and designed for the commercial or civilian market.



Under the Air Commerce Act of 1926, fathered by the Hon, William P. McCracken, the "Type Certificate" became a compulsory regulatory measure.

Any aircraft that successfully passed all the requirements set forth by this act would then receive it's badge of honor, the "A.T.C.". Since 29 March, 1927 any aircraft built to sell to the commercial or civilian market has had to have and faithfully conform to the provisions in it's "type certificate number". An aircraft that received an A.T.C. proved that it was completely airworthy and safe.

Although this plane has been pushed from the memory of most us today, we can say that the Buhl-Verville J-4 Airster ushered in a brand new era in the annals of aviation history.


