This month's cover photo was taken during our September Chapter Gathering. About 30 chapter members drove and flew in to hear Jim White share the magic of KidVenture. Located at Pioneer Airport across from the EAA AirVenture Museum and held during AirVenture week, KidVenture allows young people to explore aviation from several different fronts including learning how to fly a radio-controlled airplane, experiencing flight simulators, hands on workshops and learning about aviation history.

Jim described the many hands-on activities from which the kids can learn a number of building tasks.

The Riveting Booth teaches how to buck solid rivets providing the kids an opportunity to make a personalized metal riveted name badge.

The Engine Booth features four-cylinder engines the kids inspect and work on under the guidance of skilled A&P mechanics.

The Electronic Troubleshooting Booth shows kids how to make simple wire circuits and also teaches about working with electricity.

The Prop-Shaping Booth allow kids to take a wooden prop blank and shape it into a finished propeller.

The Wooden Rib Building Booth teaches kids how to make a 20-inch wooden wing rib exactly like a homebuilder does using the same material, jigs, and tools required for a full-size rib.

Jim is the Co-Chaiman of KidVenture and is always looking for volunteers to help man the many booths and work with the kids. If you are able to assist, even for just a few hours during AirVenture, please let me know and I will put you in touch with Jim.

FAA Proposes Changes to Midway Airspace to Increase Safety



The FAA is proposing to modify the existing Class C airspace surrounding Chicago Midway International Airport (MDW) to further separate arriving traffic to Midway Runway 22L and general aviation aircraft flying by Visual Flight Rules north and south, along the Lake Michigan shoreline.

The agency will hold a virtual informal airspace meeting for the proposal on Tuesday, September 28, 2021, beginning at 1 p.m. and Wednesday, September 29, 2021, beginning at 6 p.m. Both events will be held on Zoom. The public can register via the Zoom platform or watch the presentation on FAA's Facebook, Twitter and YouTube social media channels.



The Prairie Aviation Museum and Air Park is located on the grounds of Bloomington Airport.

Established in 1984, the museum has a building of exhibits and an airpark with 9 planes and helicopters.

Highlights of the museum are a number of historical exhibits including a Link trainer.





The airpark includes a UH-1H Huey, T-38 Talon, AH-1J Cobra, F-4 Phantom, A-7 Corsair, A-4 Skyhawk, F-14D Tomcat, Cessna 310-B, and a F-100C Super Sabre (rescued from the late Chanute Air Museum).

Also on display is a T-33A Shooting Star which is currently under restoration.

After a smooth DuPage take-off from 20R under Peter's able piloting, ATC directed us SE where we picked-up Chicago Approach for a direct to Griffith-Merrillville (05C) where we hoped to catch a Mexican dinner at Mi Tierra.


After a short back-taxi, we parked the 172, and headed into the main hanger, where the restaurant is located. It was dark inside, but the owner was there to greet us and inform us that on Monday's the restaurant was closed.

Disappointed, we headed back to the plane and decided to make a short hop to Lansing (IGQ), thinking we'd just lift off of Griffith's runway 26 long enough to land on Lansing's runway 27, on what might be called a long final. Our destination was Lynnie Que's BBQ, on-field at Lansing.

On our departure from Griffith, we waved goodbye to the deer and reached an altitude sufficient for a straight-in landing at Lansing. Then, on Foreflight, John noticed a NOTAM for Lansing indicating that runway 9-27 was closed. Given the layout for Lansing, Peter deftly made a slight right turn, then a sharp left to enter into a short final for Lansing's runway 18, ending the maneuver with a centerline-perfect landing.

We taxied the long way back to Lynnie Que's, hopped out of the plane, and rode the elevator up to the restaurant. It wasn't very busy inside, just a few folks around the bar area, and the bartender informed us that, on Monday's, they stop serving food at 3pm. What?

Wow! We weren't just disappointed, but now we were very hungry. We walked back to the plane, talking over our next option. We decided to simply head back to DuPage and eat at a restaurant close to the airport. Kind of a sad way to end the evening, until Peter had the bright idea to turn the return into a nighttime southside lakeshore-to-downtown flight!

Peter placed the request to the approach traffic controllers who gladly guided us for a fantastic ride, turning us left, just as we approached the Loop. We got back to DuPage, ravenous, but happy that the flight was "rescued" with lighted "jewelry" vistas of nighttime Chicago.

Moral of the story? Don't fly anywhere for dinner without checking Google Maps and consulting restaurant opening hours, first!


