Hot Spot Standardized Symbology

The FAA is standardizing hot spot symbology and verbiage. Hot spots are generally a complex or confusing taxiway or taxiway and runway intersection. Hot spots have a history or potential risk of collision or runway incursion, and require heightened attention by pilots and drivers.

Currently, there is no standard shape to designate a hot spot on airport diagrams within chart supplements and the Terminal Procedures Publication; they are charted with a variety of squares, rectangles, circles, ovals, and ellipses with no pattern or consistency. Beginning May 19, 2022, the FAA will standardize these symbols to three shapes with two distinct meanings: a circle or ellipse for ground movement hot spots and a cylinder for wrong surface hot spots.

Ground movement hot spots are defined as airport movement areas with a history or potential risk of collision or runway incursion, and where heightened attention by pilots, drivers and controllers is necessary. A circle or ellipse will depict these hot spots, which include issues such as:

- hold short line infractions
- approach hold issues
- complex taxiway configurations
- movement-non movement boundary area issues
- tower line of sight problems
- marking and signage issues.


Wrong surface hot spots depict locations where an aircraft has inadvertently attempted to or actually departed or landed on the wrong surface. A cylinder will depict these hot spots.

You will begin to see airport diagrams with this new concept of standardized hot spot symbology in the May 19, 2022 charting cycle.





Tickets Now on Sale for EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2022



Weekly and daily admission tickets for the 69th edition of EAA AirVenture Oshkosh, EAA's annual fly-in convention, are now available online for the event at Wittman Regional Airport in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, on July 25-31, 2022. Additional special offers and advance purchase parking passes will be available in the coming weeks.

EAA AirVenture Oshkosh is the world's largest fly-in event, welcoming more than 10,000 aircraft each year, along with an attendance of more than 600,000. The seven-day gathering features the latest innovations and aircraft from around the world, as well as a full spectrum of airplanes from more than a century of aviation history that is on display in the air and on the ground.

Again in 2022, all attendees ages 18 and under are admitted free, supported in part by The Boeing Company. In addition, EAA members who purchase admissions prior to June 15, 2022, are eligible to receive their admission wristbands in advance via the Express Arrival program. Early purchase discounts are also available on both daily and weekly admissions. While admissions are available at the gate, early online purchase gives the best discounts, options for faster entry to the grounds, and additional information and insights prior to the event.

EAA AirVenture Oshkosh annually features nine air shows over seven days, as well as 1,500 forums, workshops, and seminars plus in excess of 800 aviation exhibitors. Pre-purchase options include camping credentials and early-bird merchandise, with additional items to come as they are finalized.

Dreams will take flight for young people between the ages of 8 and 17 during the 29th annual International Young Eagles Day on Saturday, June 11. Each year we set aside one day to encourage all EAA members and chapters to participate in the Young Eagles program and share their passion for aviation with a new generation.

This year's celebration means just a bit more, as we continue to return to pre-pandemic life. EAA is aiming to return to 2019's flight level, and International Young Eagles Day is a great excuse to participate in the program.

AVIATION NEWS

Giant Antonov AN-225 destroyed in Ukraine

The Antonov An-225 six-engine jet transport, the largest regularly flying aircraft in the world, was destroyed on the ground in its open-ended hangar in Ukraine as part of the Russian invasion, according to Ukrainian sources.

News imagery shows the heavily damaged An-225 airframe at Antonov Airport in Hostomel, a suburb of Kyiv.

Ukrainian officials have said the giant transport succumbed to a Russian airstrike. Some early reports coming out of Ukraine included promises that the An-225 would be rebuilt.

The An-225 is called Mriya, which is Ukrainian for Dream or Inspiration.

Originally built in 1988 to transport the Soviet Union's Buran space shuttle lookalike, the An-225 was placed in

storage for eight years beginning in 1994 in the now-independent Ukraine before returning to service as a commercial cargo transport.





The An-225 had a wingspan of 290 feet. Howard Hughes' famed wooden Hercules, known as the Spruce Goose, spans nearly 321 feet. But weight favors the Antonov, and its routine use as a revenue-generating transport versus the Spruce Goose's one-time-only flight established a number of qualified largest-airplane bona fides for Mriya.

Modifications gave the An-225 a maximum gross weight of 710 tons. Mriya made a name for itself carrying outsized cargo like huge 150-ton generators.

Another role was the transport of large amounts of emergency medical supplies in response to disasters. As part of a NATO-contracted strategic airlift, the An-225 carried 10 million COVID-19 masks to Germany on one flight in April 2020.



Ken's Aviation Museum of the Month

Massey Air Museum

Massey, Maryland

Founded in 2001, and of special interest to General Aviation pilots and enthusiasts. Dedicated to "Grassroots Aviation" the museum was built in the middle of farmland and is reminiscent of rural airports of the 1920's to 1950's. The airport features a grass airstrip. Although the museum is small it contains a number of aircraft and displays.



On display is a number of fully restored powerplant engines that include a Wright R-2600 Twin Cyclone, and Lycoming O-145-B2. Aircraft include an ERCO Euroscape, DC-3 (with full access), Antnonov AV-2, 1944 Stearman, 1943 V-77 Stinson, 1939 Piper Cub, and a rare Pietengol Air Camper along with several other biplanes.

The museum has self guided tours and is open for fly-ins. There is also a nice research library.

The hours for the museum are Tues- Sun 11-4. The airport is always open.







Beat Billy

Billy is back from the sunny South. For March you don't get a question you get an answer to Januarys question.

Here is another shot of Januarys plane, which just happens to be the one and only Nemeth Parasol.

Steven P. Nemeth was a flight instructor at McCook field, near Dayton Ohio, till it shut down in 1927.

Nemeth, also an inventor, was carrying out experiments on aircraft with rotating wings. Students from Miami University built a prototype based on Nemeth's design so they could test configurations of circular wings. The resulting aircraft was called the NEMETH PARASOL and it was test flown in 1934. People on the ground, who saw the plane's test flight called it a "flying umbrella". The media covering the flight, seeing its 15 ft circular wing called it "saucer plane".



The plane was powered by a 110 hp. Warner engine and it achieved a speed of 135 mph and had a landing speed of 25 mph. During the planes test flight, Nemeth stalled the plane, shut down the engine and let the planes wing act like a parachute. The demonstration was a success, the wing stabilized the plane and it came down almost vertically to a very gentle landing, according to a test report in a 1934 issue of Popular Science.

The Nemeth Parasol became the first round wing design aircraft to maintain consistent flight.

While the, one and only, Nemeth Parasol faded into aviation obscurity it provided proof that round wings worked and it paved the way for other experimental planes like the Sack AS-6, The Vought XF5U (Flying Flapjack) and the Avro Canada VZ-9 Avrocar pictured below.


