Not so much for the noise that they make, but because of the fumes that leak, possibly entering the cockpit. He explained that the engine expels fumes from the joints in the exhaust pipes. When you have very high temperatures because of the exhaust leak and gasoline fumes, a fire could possibly start and that is one of the worst scenarios that a pilot/passenger could deal with.

This was a good point he made and needed to be brought up in the minutes. He spoke about other problems he had, but most are now taken care of. The Corvair engine, when properly assembled and maintained, is a very reliable engine for homebuilt aircraft.

Meeting was adjourned at 2:00 pm with a motion from Byron and a second was made by Robert Carter. The decision was made to have lunch at The Texas Road House and 7 participants enjoyed a good meal and interesting conversation.
