November Chapter Meeting Minutes

Chapter President Brad Jones call the November meeting to order art 6:35 PM, on Tuesday 6 November at the St. Louis Downtown Airport Fire Station Classroom. Approximately 30 members and guests were in attendance.

The Treasurer's report and minutes from the previous meeting were accepted as published in the last chapter newsletter.

Bob McDaniel gave a Young Eagles report. An O'Fallon, MO Scout group was flown on 20 Oct at Flight Park Airport and two groups on 22 Oct at St. Louis Downtown Airport. Young Eagle flights are finished for the year. Individual flights are still being scheduled when requested.

Bob also reported that his hangar at Flight Park is completed.

It was reported that the Board met and approved the chapter move to Flight Park subject to legalities and negotiations with the land owner. Discussion of how to configure the new chapter facilities at Flight Park centered on whether to build an 8 ft wall or frame to the ceiling, limiting bird intrusion and a wind tunnel affect through the building. Opinions trended toward framing to the ceiling. Paul Visk is donating 2x8s and stated that trucks and help would be needed to move the lumber. It was reported that Wings of Hope will continue their presence at Flight Park. There is the possibility the chapter could extend from Bob McDaniel's Internet to have internet access at the new location.

A December meeting was proposed and accepted to discuss the developments on the Flight Park move.

The FAA using the Chapter building has moved out. The Airport has expressed a desire to ultimately tear the building and old tower down. The current agreement with Downtown Airport requires a 30 day notice to be given for moving out. No Notice has been received.

ATTENTION YOUNG EAGLE VOLUNTEERS


EAA established a Youth Protection Program three years ago to educate our Chapter leaders and volunteers on the best practices when interacting with youth. The program required us to complete on-line Youth Protection Training and submit to a free background check.

The training and background check is required every 3 years. Many of our Chapter leaders and Young Eagle volunteers completed the requirements early in 2016. If you were among them, it's now time to do it again! (If you completed it later, please ensure you repeat it within 3 years of your initial training.)

In order to access the on-line Youth Protection Training course, go to EAA.org and sign in to your account. (NOTE: EAA recently overhauled their website. If you have not logged on recently, you will need to go through the "lost password" process to complete your log-in to their new site.) If you do not have an online account, simply go to the sign in area at the top of page and create a username and password.



Once you are logged in, click on "My Account" at the top of the page to open your account profile.



Next, scroll to the bottom of your Account Profile and click "Go to Training." Then select the Youth Protection Training course link on the right.

The online training and background check review will take about 20 minutes. After you've completed the training and submitted your information, the background check should take no more than 10 business days. Upon successful completion, each volunteer will receive an email confirming completion of training that will include a printable wallet-sized card.

Crosswind Landing Errors Featuring Wally Moran

Subscriber question:

"What are the most common mistakes pilots make with crosswind landings?" - Kate K.

Wally:

"A common problem I see is poor airspeed control, usually too fast. Sure it's good to have a little extra airspeed on turbulent days, but too much is as bad as too little. Extra airspeed means you will be hovering over the runway longer waiting for that airspeed to bleed off and that means a longer fight with the wind close to the ground. Often pilots will try to force the airplane on the ground in this situation and that never works. Use the speed your POH recommends.

Another problem is to stop flying after the airplane touches down. Remember to hold that aileron into the wind after touch down and increase it as the airplane slows down. If you neutralize the ailerons after



touchdown, the upwind wing will come up and the airplane will start to weather vane providing a whole new adventure for you and your passengers.

So watch the speed and fly the airplane all the way to the tie down.

As I was once told by an old pilot, these crosswind landings are easy once you get the drift of them. The only way to get good at crosswind landings is to get out there and practice. Get an instructor who is proficient and go out and challenge yourself. If you only fly on calm days, you won't be ready on that day when the wind exceeds the forecast."

What Makes Good CRM? Featuring Bob Martens

Subscriber question:

"We hear a lot about Cockpit Resource Management these days. There are lots of theories, but I'd like some simple tips in this area. What are the keys to effective CRM?" - Joe W.

Bob:

"First of all, Time Management—recognize that rushing works against us in all circumstances. Give yourself enough time to do the job (each task) right the first time. This involves the planning, preflight and the enroute phases of flight.

Information Management—with good information you'll make good decisions. If you are having trouble making a decision, get more information so you can do it right.

Workload Management—all pilots have a breaking point. Use your quiet time (during the flight) to free up your skills for the critical phases of flight.

Prioritization—recognize the difference between critical actions and routine actions. Manage your cockpit so that the critical



phases of flight (takeoff, approach, and landing) are never interfered with or compromised.

Situational Awareness—ALWAYS be aware of where you are and what is going on around you that could impact your flight. It is the direct opposite of complacency.

Finally, Risk Management—every decision we make, big or little, has consequences. We need to consistently review our decisions for accuracy and appropriateness to ensure desired outcomes are achieved. No flight is perfect. It is only when we link together a series of bad decisions that we impact safety."

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

the south side of the airport) and
go to the 4-way stop sign by the
high school. Turn left into the
subdivision onto St. Patrick Blvd.
and go all the way to the end of the
street. Park inside the fence and
