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






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













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The Chapter Christmas Party

- Lindbergh flew a Sirius from NY to China. Todd is building a Sirius from scratch and wants to reenact the flight to China but stop in Australia.

NEWSLETTER QUIZ

Each month, we will ask a "question" in the newsletter. Answers can only be given if you attend the meeting referenced in the newsletter. At the end of the year, there will be a prize to the person who has the most correct answers. Some will be easy and some difficult.

November Question:

Assume a gallon of aircraft paint sprayed onto an airplane weighs ten pounds. What amount of the weight is volatile liquid and what amount is pigment that adds to the weight of the aircraft? For simplicity, assume no pigment is lost to overspray.

November Answer:

Paint is typically composed of pigment, binder, and solvent. After application the solvent evaporates and the pigment and binder form the coating that adds weight to the surface. Pigment and binder percent weight can range from about 40% to 60% of the total liquid weight depending on the quality and type of paint. Aircraft paint is expensive and according to the suppliers, it's because of the greater amount of pigment which is the most expensive component in the paint. Assuming a gallon of aircraft paint weighs ten pounds, the added weight to the airframe after application can be as high as 6 pounds.

December Question:

The replica of Lindbergh's Sirius is being made out of Sitka Spruce and the estimated wood cost will approach \$200,000. What properties make Sitka Spruce ideal for use in wooden airplane construction? Second question: What WW2 airplane was made out of balsa wood sandwiched between plywood skins?

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Saratoga, Wyoming – Visit to the Hot Springs:

Enjoyed a great trip to Saratoga, Wyoming before the cold weather hit us. For those involved in hunting and fishing, Saratoga provides game, fish, and outfitters who can arrange just about any accommodations equipment and guide service desired. We went for the hot springs. The town has a fancy resort that caters to the high end classes but it also provides access to a free 24/7 facility that makes the trip worthwhile.

The local airport was a busy place as you can see. That's our plane, parked where the two sets of tie-down ropes were located. Weather was just about perfect with a slight breeze






