


#### **Etiquette & Manners**

All too often (almost every day) I see and hear pilot's not using the appropriate etiquette on the radio, on the phone with flight service, or in casual conversa-

tion and interactions around the airport. Etiquette is something that will not appear in most training publications or seminars, but maybe it should. Etiquette is a code of polite conduct based on social acceptance and efficiency. Just as there are aviation laws to create smooth transportation flow and prevent incursions, so there are societal rules designed to facilitate positive human exchanges and reduce conflict. One of my biggest issues is with pilots not showing etiquette on the radio while talking with ATC. An instance would be a pilot talking when they shouldn't or stepping on another radio transmission. This is common at Columbus because we often share the same controllers when switching from Ground to Tower. For example, the tower clears an aircraft to land, and before the pilot can respond, another pilot requests to take off. The etiquette here would be to wait for the pilot to respond to the tower and then make your radio call. We should have all learned to *listen* when our CFI taught us about runway incursions. Chapter 4 of the AIM states that brevity is important and contacts should be kept as brief as possible, however not so brief as to sacrifice safety. When in doubt, just ask.

Manners on the other hand are a completely different creature. Manners are polite behaviors that reflect an attitude of consideration, kindness and respect for others. You may not have been




