EAA 690 RANKED 10 OUT OF 10 BY EAA NATIONAL



Dear Randy,

EAA chapters are one of the most vital components in making general aviation fun, affordable and accessible at the local level. To recognize chapters that have demonstrated outstanding commitment to general aviation, EAA is introducing a Chapter Recognition Program in 2019.

This recognition, developed in partnership with your fellow chapter leaders on EAA's Chapter Advisory Council, is based on 10 criteria that are consistent in active and engaged chapters. In addition, EAA will provide continued guidance to help chapters reach each recognition threshold.

Your chapter receives one point for meeting each of the following criteria:

Attended a chapter leadership training session

Growing or steady membership

Offers IMC or VMC Club programs

Participates in Young Eagles or Flying Start programs

Has an EAA-approved Flight Advisor or Technical Counselor

Participates in EAA's Annual Chapter Member survey

Reads EAA ChapterGram regularly

Requested EAA promotional materials or ChapterBlast email

Hosts at least two public events each year

Owns/leases a facility

SCORING

Each of these criteria that your chapter has met will be worth one point, and every chapter will have the ability to earn up to 10 points. In December of 2019, chapters scoring at least seven out of 10 will be publicly recognized by EAA. There will be three levels of recognition. Bronze (7 out of 10), Silver (8 out of 10), and Gold (at least 9 out of 10).

It's important to note that chapters are rated against the established criteria – NOT against one another. We also realize some EAA chapters are limited by resources, geography, and other factors. But we encourage all EAA chapters to do what they can the best that they can, and seek ways to aim even higher.

RECOGNITION

Chapters scoring within one of these high recognition levels will be recognized via the EAA Find a Chapter webpage, news stories, a personalized icon for your chapter's webpage/newsletter, and a banner and/or plaque for your chapter to proudly display in your meeting location.





2019 Membership Update

We're off to a good start for 2019. As of this writing we have 188 folks in the chapter comprised of sixty-five individual, forty-six family and 13 free student memberships. People sometimes ask how membership works. For new members, dues are prorated through October of each year. Once we reach October a new member pays the full yearly amount and will be paid up through the next fifteen months. All member renewals are due the first of the year. Family dues are forty dollars, individuals are thirty dollars and student dues are ten dollars.

If you have not yet renewed, I will be at the March breakfast to take renewals or you can renew online at http://www.mkt/com/eaa690 and scroll down to the renewals. I have been working on our mailing lists deleting those folks that are no longer subscribed or are not opening any of the mailings we send to them. Once we reach April, I will move any unpaid members to the non-members list and you will become subject to being deleted from our lists.

Chapter membership is \$30 a year for individual, \$40 for family and \$10 for students over the age of 18. Students under 19 are free. New member's membership fee is prorated by month, which is listed on the back side of membership application. We encourage membership in EAA National Organization, dues are \$40 a year for individual memberships and \$50 a year for family memberships.

Silver Wings Report

Robert Lee Jones; A Pilot's Pilot

The Silver Wings Fraternity, and particularly the Atlanta Chapter, is very proud to have Robert Lee Jones as one of their active members. Bob recently celebrated his 95th birthday and still remains very involved in the fraternity and the community where he lives with his wife Becky.

Bob's long aviation career began when he dropped out of Oklahoma State University in September 1942 to join the US Army Air Corp, reporting to active duty in early 1943 in Texas. After basic, academic, and physical training, he soloed a Fairchild PT-19 in September 1943. Aerobatics, formation training, instrument flight, multi-engine training in the Cessna AT-17/UC-78 and finally, graduation with Class 44D on April 14, 1944.

In July, Bob was stationed at Bergstrom AAF, Austin TX for C-47 Troop Carrier training. After an intensive 90 day period, Bob qualified in day and night VFR and IFR long cross-country flights, supply drops, parachute infantry drops and glider towing. He even got four hours of flying at the controls of a CG-4A glider on a night tow. Now fully qualified, Bob arrived at his first duty assignment in Kunming, China after flying eastward for couple weeks in cargo planes.

He flew over 500 combat hours in in all kinds of weather over inhospitable terrain in the Salween River Campaign to open up the eastern terminus of the Burma Road. For these activities, Bob earned the Distinguished Flying Cross and two air medals.

In February 1946, Bob was released from active duty and returned to Oklahoma to finish his college education. He joined the Air Force Reserves at Tinker AAF and flew the AT-6, C-45, C-46 and, eventually, the single pilot Douglas B-26, flying bombing and gunnery training missions.

Bob left school to take a job with Porter & Huelett cattle company as a flying cowboy, with not only a horse, but a Stinson Voyager and Beechcraft Bonanza. He traveled throughout the west and Midwest on both company and personal business. A tornado eventually destroyed both aircraft and when the company suffered some business downturns, Bob returned to Oklahoma City and joined his father and brothers on the family livestock business. He continued to fly with the Reserves and did some contract flying.

At the start of the Korean War, Bob was called back to active duty and assigned to the Strategic Air Command. He transitioned to the B-29, became an aircraft commander and he and his ten man crew flew extensive missions over both the Pacific and Atlantic areas of operation. After gaining 40 hours observer flight time in the B-36, he was offered an opportunity to extend his active duty to fly the B-36 and apply for a Regular Air Force Commission. Unsure that he wanted a full-time career in the military, Bob separated from active service and joined the inactive reserves. He retired in 1972 as a Lieutenant Colonel.

Bob's next job was with Mud Control Laboratories where he spent the next year and a half flying a Beechcraft D-50 Twin Bonanza. In 1955, the cattle business beckoned and he returned to Oklahoma City. He soon found that two businesses needed a part-time pilot, so he flew their Piper Apache and Twin Bonanza on a regular basis. Hearing that the airlines were hiring, he applied for a job with American Airlines. Three months later, he received a call that he been hired and would have to report to LaGuardia Airport in New York in three days to begin training. The airline wouldn't give him another date so he could honor a previous commitment, so Bob turned down the offer. Hired and fired in one phone call.

Robert Lee Jones; A Pilot's Pilot

In 1957, he joined the flight department of The Standard Oil Company of Ohio (Sohio). It had a larger operation and perhaps, better chances for advancement. His first assignment was to go to Spartan Aeronautics in Tulsa to assist in the installation and testing of a Collins flight director and autopilot in a Lockheed L-18 Lodestar. After completing all the flights and the award of the Supplemental Type Certificate. Bob went to Billings, Montana to operate Sohio's D-18 Twin Beech, and later, a new D-50 Twin Bonanza, which he flew all over the western United States, Canada, and Alaska.

In April 1960, he was permanently transferred to company headquarters in Cleveland, Ohio. Bob worked with the other flight crews flying a wide and constantly up-graded, variety of aircraft. These included Lockheed Lodestars, Twin Bonanzas, Beechcraft King Air 90, DH-125-1A, Handley Page Jetstream, Hawker HS-125-400, Lear LR-35. Eventually, the home office fleet included four aircraft; two Lear 35s and two Hawker 700s.

In 1974, bob was promoted to Aviation Department Manager and Chief Pilot. With the company's operations reaching more global destinations, a Dassault Falcon 50 was added in 1980. The company required their pilots to retire at age 60, so on November 1, 1983, Bob was, once again, without a flying job. He took advantage of his many aviation contacts and flew as a contract pilot for Hanna Mining, Sherwin Williams, Eddie Debartalo and others.

Bob's wife decided that the Cleveland weather was too much and wanted to move to Atlanta. Bob started making the rounds of the local airports and soon was flying for Aviation South based at Epps Aviation at PDK. They used both the Piper Navajo Chieftain and Cheyenne III on private and charter flights. The erratic on-demand hours and single pilot operation got very tiring, so Bob went over to Fulton County Airport with his resumes. Soon, he was flying trips with Home Depot and Fuqua Flight on their Hawker 600, 700, and later, 800s. In 1992, Fuqua bought a new Bombardier Challenger 601-3A. They used one of their pilot training slots to send Bob to school. At 69, Bob acquired his last jet type rating with glowing reviews in his training records. So much for being washed up and retired at age 60.

For another six years, Bob flew the Challenger around the world with Fuqua Flight, Whitecloud Charter and a few other operators. He retired a second time at age 75 in 1998 with 55 years and 14865 hours of safe flying.

The FAA recognized this incredible accomplishment by awarding Bob the Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award. This is only awarded to pilots that have over 50 years of accident free flying. All of Silver Wings Fraternity and all of the aviation community that have known Bob over the years are proud to know him and the fine example he has set for all of us.

Progress Report EAA Chapter 690 RV-12 Project

In December of 2015 an idea was proposed to have a chapter build of an RV-12 for members of the chapter. It was to be funded through member donations and certain matching donations. By the end of January of 2016, we had donations totaling more than eight thousand dollars. We ordered the empennage kit and were off and running. By April of 2016 we placed the order for the fuselage kit as many members became involved and the airplane continued to take shape.

Construction continued through the end of 2016 and donations continued to come in and in January of 2017 we were able to order the wing kit. Work continued on and as the wings were nearing completion, we were able to order the finishing kit in August. Work continued on the finishing kit until recently. Unfortunately, the donations have stopped and we have not been in a position to order the remaining kits to complete the airplane.

A couple of months ago the BOD voted on a motion to do one of two things with the RV-12. We set the overall price of the plane at seventy-three thousand and four hundred dollars. One option was to have a club form that would provide the money to the chapter to order the remaining two kits, an amount of approximately fifty thousand dollars. Once the airplane was complete, its ownership would be transferred to the flying club and they would begin to pay the remaining twenty-three thousand and four hundred dollars back to the chapter over a three-year period at zero interest. John Post decided to take the lead on putting the flying club together and began to speak to folks that had indicated an interest in being part of the club. Although interest was expressed, money was not put forward.

The second option was to sell the airframe as is to a third party for the amount of twenty-three thousand and four hundred dollars. This would bring money back to the chapter and we could decide whether to pursue a different project or to do something else with the money from the sale. To that end, we have been advertising in Barnstormers and are hopeful of getting an ad in Trade-A-Plane soon.

Work on the plane has ended at this time. There is still an opportunity to fund the flying club and complete the airplane. That would be dependent on four to eight folks coming forward with capital necessary to order the remaining kits and complete the airplane. I would love to see this happen, if possible, but we will continue the effort to sell to a third party. The last alternative would be for donations to begin coming in again. Currently we would need donations totaling \$15,000 to order the avionics kit and move forward.

Aero Term for the Day

Nonapproach Control Tower

Authorizes aircraft to land or takeoff at the airport controlled by the tower or to transit the Class D airspace. The primary function of a nonapproach control tower is the sequencing of aircraft in the traffic pattern and on the landing area. Nonapproach control towers also separate aircraft operating under instrument flight rules clearances from approach controls and centers. They provide ground control services to aircraft, vehicles, personnel, and equipment on the airport movement area.

Progress Report Youth Build Program

In 2018 there were forty-five sessions held with an average of 9 youth in attendance at each session. For the year the youth totaled 1647.9 hours of participation for an average of 36.6 hours per session. We continue to have a long waiting list of youth that would like to get in the program.

Last year we also held ground school sessions three times a month taught by Chuck Roberts. We appreciate Chuck's giving of his time in leading these sessions. This year Brian Michael will be leading the ground school effort. We have a roster of mentors that help out when they can. These folks are Hugh Colton, Joel Levine, Andrew Robinson, Art Farmer (recently stepped down), Keith Oliver, Frank Lipinski, Alex Kaduck, Nicolas Hammond, Karenga Smith, Ken Lightener and Jack McKnight. As always, we can use additional mentors for the program. You do not need to be an expert to join us, you just need a desire to help our youth stay safe as they work each week and provide them with the wisdom and knowledge you have gained over the years. Please contact one of the people above if you are interested in assisting.

Also, in 2018 we saw our first Private Pilots come out of the program. Out first was Jeremy Welch, who passed his check ride on March 30th, his 17th birthday. Our second pilot was Steven Aqudelo in June. Steven is now at Corpus Christi NAS training in the Texan T6B for the U.S. Navy. The third was Alex Kirkland. Alex is currently awaiting word on an appointment to the Air Force Academy. Maddie Hale, another of our youth, soloed in 2018 and is now a student at Middle Georgia University in the Aviation program and will be continuing her training there. Josh Wood is another of our youth attending Middle Georgia University pursuing an A&P certification.

None of this would have been possible without the help of Aero Ventures. We are able to rent their Cessna 150 and John Post and Fred Huppertz have donated instruction time to bring these young folks along. Make sure you let them know how much they are appreciated.

In closing, I have notified the Board of Directors that I will be leaving as the Youth Program Coordinator at the end of March. I stepped in after Rick Mathisen left the position and have held it for approximately two years now. In that time, we added the Full Size Pietenpol, BD-6, RC Modeling and the Continental A-65 to our list of projects. The chapter is in need of one or more adults to lead the program from here. The position would require sending out notices to the mentors at the beginning of the week to determine who is available for what projects. Sending out the notice to the youth later in the week. Tracking the time for each youth on a weekly basis. Working with the mentors to administer the rules and regulations of the program. Maintaining the wait list for youth that would like to join the program. Coordinating between the youth and Aero Venture as youth want to begin their flight training and with the chapter Treasurer once a youth begins flight training.
