One of the terms of the current 25-year lease is the airport will take title to the structures at the end of the current lease on Jan. 2, 2020. Our proposal to the airport authority is based on obtaining favorable rates for the chapter based on the community benefits we provide and the chapters 501(c) (3) classification. We will keep you updated on negotiations with the airport authority as we have more information.

With the lease proposal out of the way, our next priority will be organizing the fund-raising committee. We have several members who have expressed an interest. We'll send out a NOTAM shortly with date and time for the initial meeting.

Our annual chili cook off and trivia contest is scheduled for March 17th. This is your opportunity to show off your favorite chili recipe. Brian will once again be hosting the trivia contest. Judging for the competition will be at 6:30 pm, if you are bringing chili you should plan on having it at the hangar by 6:00 pm. More details to follow.

Marc Sheppard:

A Native Atlantean I have been flying remote control airplanes for the past 7 years. I always wanted to fly RC planes since I was a kid and interest grew even more as I went to school for Electronic Engineering. I currently work as a Manager for an Information Technology team specializing in Microsoft Messaging and Collaboration. I also enjoy working on mechanics such as gas motors. This all fits right in with building, flying and maintaining RC aircraft. I belong to the Stone Mountain RC Flyers club where I have been flying my RC aircraft for the past 7 years. I also enjoy visiting other RC airfields around Georgia and surrounding states. I enjoy scale and 3D acrobatic flying styles.

Alex Kirkland:

I am a junior at Brookwood High School on the Track team Marching Band Captain and a Boy Scout just finishing my Eagle Scout I have been flying for 5 years now starting off with owning a small foam electric J3 Cub. I joined SMRCF (Stone Mountain RC Flyers) to learn to fly with a buddy box and learned my Cub wasn't sufficient so I bought a Cessna trainer type with gyro stabilization technology which I still have today.

Over the years I have moved from flying foamies to giant scale 100-200cc gas planes for both 3D flying and IMAC (International Miniature Aerobatic Competition). In the recent years I have gotten more involved in the 3D flying community with traveling the country going to events, competitions, and gatherings. Last year I competed in my first Youth Master IMAC Competition at Triple Tree and took home 3rd place in Basic Sequence (same place Joe Nall is held). I'm well known in the 3D community now looking for possible sponsors at this point.

I've been a member here at the EAA for about 4 years now and flying RC is the reason why I've gotten into real planes. Currently I have 20 hours logged towards my





private pilots license with the credit I've built up as a founding member of the build program. I soloed in AeroVentures C150M on August 5th, 2017 with just 5 hours logged which I believe is due to the experience flying RC over the years. I hope to continue flight training to get my commercial license and pursue a career with that.

Naomi Parker Fraley, wartime machinist linked to Rosie the Riveter, dies at 96

To one West Coast family, the woman was known simply as Naomi, a onetime machinist at the Naval Air Station in Alameda, Calif., who later became a waitress and homemaker. She had the same upturned nose as the Rosie of the poster and, long ago, wore a similar polka-dot bandanna as shown in the image.

Like millions of other women, Mrs. Fraley said she had joined the war effort out of a sense of duty. An Acme news-service photographer had snapped a picture of her in 1942, leaning over a lathe in Alameda while wearing her signature bandanna. But until she walked into a museum exhibit in 2009, she had no idea the image had been linked to the "We Can Do It!" poster.

Push to give away ATC ends—for now

House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee Chairman Bill Shuster (R-Pa.), the leading proponent of legislation to remove air traffic control from the FAA, announced Feb. 27 that he would no longer pursue the controversial proposal. AOPA, along with hundreds of other aviation groups and organizations across the political spectrum, opposed the legislation, and AOPA members contacted their representatives in Congress more than 200,000 times asking them to oppose the bill. AOPA President and CEO Mark Baker thanked members for their calls and letters to Capitol Hill and said, "In dropping the controversial air traffic control proposal, there's now a chance to do something that all segments of aviation have been asking for, a long-term reauthorization bill."
