#### **February Meeting Minutes**

The meeting was opened by President Joe Williams at 11:06 a.m. in Hangar 140 at the Grants Pass Airport

Pledge of Allegiance to our flag: 11:07 a.m.

Guest and new member introductions: none.

Treasurer's Report: Phil Cloutier stated that we had \$3,025 in our EAA 725 bank account.

50/50 Second chance drawing: none today.

EAA/Airport Manager open items as reported by Pres. Joe Williams.

- 1. Airport Manager, Larry Graves had wanted the static Cozy aircraft parked outside the EAA hanger to have a pedestal that allowed it to rotate to show the direction of the wind. Larry has now agreed that the plane can be installed on a simpler non-rotating pedestal. We still need to provide weight and balance data.
- 2. Larry approved the periphery of the newly planned wall map display board in the FBO for use by EAA725. The new map, donated by President Joe, will leave room to post additional chapter bulletin board material. We will get credit for the labor required to install the new board.

Old Business.

- 1. Grants Pass Airport is presently building a new Maintenance Equipment Shop on the northwest side of the airport behind existing hangars in that general area. The building is well along and weather tight at this time.
- 2. Incidental to building a new building for a resident airport security person, the chapter needs to install a new water valve by the northwest side of the EAA hangar. This will continue to supply cold water to the EAA hangar and to the park grounds in the nearby area.

New Business. The new meeting time for EAA Chapter 725 will be on the first Sunday of each month at 1:00 p.m. Conviviality will begin at 12:00 noon prior to the meeting. Feel free to bring a snack to be shared. Fly Outs and other activities-President Joe introduced the following:

- 1. An aircraft spot landing contest this summer and an airport led Chicken Drop contest.
- 2. These possible activities will present no conflict with our annual Pancake Breakfast fund raiser at Airport Days.

Added Note: The spot landing contest and chicken drop will not be under chapter sponsorship as neither activity is covered by our EAA insurance. As in past years, Joe Williams will assume organizational responsibility and other interested parties will volunteer as participants and assistants.




A hangar full of tools, airplanes, parts, and materials. Is this nirvana or what?

#### **Dutch Bros Visit**


On Tuesday afternoon, the 11<sup>th</sup>, a group of us gathered at the Dutch Bros. hangar for a visit that had been arranged by Joe. We got an up-close look at the new CJ-4 and Brett Hopper, Megan MacDonald, Gabriel Johnston, and Ken Jordon gave us a good overview of the flight department and how it contributes to the overall business success and continued growth of the corporation. I'm going from memory, but I think my numbers are right. (Corrections next month). Dutch Bros. is now approaching 400 outlets in 7 states with projected growth to 800 within the next 5 years, focusing primarily on additional western states. The flight department employs 15, including 5 pilots and they're hiring. All corporate travel requirements (including ground vehicles) are handled on site which means they keep a number of schedulers busy. Their aviation fleet consists of 3 Cessna Conquests, the new CJ-4 and the original Piper Comanche they started with, but they'll look at upgrading as expansion into new markets continues. We thank Brett and his crew for being such gracious hosts and generously taking the time to give us a look into what a full-blown corporate flight department looks like and how it provides the transportation flexibility this far-flung business needs to continue its success. 

#### **Second Airport Day Planning Meeting**

The second Airport Day planning meeting was held Feb. 20 at 3:00. At this early date, not a lot new has transpired since the first meeting last month. Concerns about parking congestion, which has been a problem in the past, was one of the major topics. It's still seen as a potential problem this year also. No brilliant solutions, but we're looking at enhanced enforcement of the parking restrictions along Brookside which have been in effect but largely ignored. Also working out ways to more positively identify on entry who is and is not entering the car show and, thus, entitled to park in the car show area.

Dutch Bros. will have a Conquest and their new CJ-4 on display and they both will probably fly sometime during the day.

Efforts to arrange a F-15 fly-by from K Falls have not been totally abandoned even though past attempts have not been successful. Both the Coast Guard and Army National Guard have been contacted to place helicopters on static display.

We're looking for ways to attract airplanes from a wide area. Possibly sell the idea of making Airport Day a part of a weekend spent enjoying the attractions our valley has to offer. Larry is going to see if the Chamber will come on board, perhaps in part citing the economic impact the PSAAC Air Tour had on our community. This was discussed with Larry after the close of the meeting. Open to any and all ideas.

The next meeting will be held March 19 (Thursday) at 3:00. By the time that meeting is concluded, details should be starting to firm up and we should have names associated with specific assignments.

This is reportedly the largest Fly-in/Airshow west of the Mississippi and the 3<sup>rd</sup> largest in the country after Oshkosh and Sun and Fun and was Feb. 6-9 this year. Long since under the auspices of an independent 501C3 corporation, it originated under the sponsorship of the Arizona Council of EAA chapters, the first statewide council of chapters in the country.
