Latest on the runway extension project: It looks like we won't see dirt moving until about April next year. The government fiscal year starts in October and funding was not in the 2024 budget.

Steve introduced me to a company called Elbit Systems (who?). They have a major presence on the military side with night vision and other electro-optical sighting and targeting systems. On the civil aviation side, they are big in enhanced vision fog penetration sensors. Now you understand why we caught their attention? They are an east coast company and use three airports on that side of the country as test sites, but only one out west. That's us. It's the climate, don't you know. Seems they were out here several years ago calibrating their sensors to incandescent runway lights and they need to do some additional testing against LED lighting. At least that's my understanding. The AirCam that was completed last summer by Drew Meltebeke was sold to a man who lives in the Dominican Republic, but it's still here. Ryan told me a set of floats for it should arrive this week and the new owner wants more horsepower. It will be getting a pair of Rotax 916is engines to replace those originally installed. They're turbocharged and equipped with electronic fuel injection and dual electronic ignition systems. Rated at 160 shp for takeoff, and 137 max. continuous. This will be the first installation of the 916is engines on an AirCam.

And Finally


