Around the Chapter

Lots of getting ready for the new season. Dick Smith recently completed the Condition Inspection on his CH701 and is back in the air. Dennis Mitchell was close behind. He had an issue with fuel flow indication (something not right reading zero with the engine running). After considerable troubleshooting did not resolve problem, he replaced the flowmeter and re-plumbed the fuel lines to take it out of the engine compartment. Success! But he also had to address a fuel seep at a hose connection on a fuel pump fitting. Tightened clamp, no seep. No squawks after a 15 min. flight.

Ryan completed the annual on Stan and John's Cherokee. Back together just in time for the rainstorms that rolled in last weekend. But a post-maintenance test flight over the airport was successfully completed before this last round of rain. Airplane's fine, pilot needs practice. Joe's annual was completed by Pacific Aviation. He had to replace a cracked spinner, so his first post-annual flight has been delayed to this week. But we're all getting ready for those \$100 hamburger flights. And that's not accounting for inflation.

Phil reports he was able to fly both airplanes during the mid-month stretch of good weather, about 3 hours total. Felt good to get airborne again after a long hibernation. He's using the current down time (3rd week) to get them cleaned up and ready for the next sunny period.

By the time you read this, Brad Baum may have his Jodel in its new home in Brookings. He just had the brakes rebuilt and hoped the weather would cooperate for the flight down from Everett. If all goes as tentatively planned, maybe he can fly over to the next meeting?

It's BFR time for Dennis Crawford. He's waiting for the sun to shine so he can get recurrent.

Allan Runia has his hangar all organized, so he's ready to get airborne again. The first order of business is to get checked out in the Lancair. He's arranged to get that done with Bear when weather and schedules align.

Allan is also spearheading the plan to organize a youth project. This is in development and specifics are yet to be nailed down. To introduce the idea and judge the level of interest, area youth have been invited to an introductory meeting to be held Saturday, April 6, at the EAA hangar at noon. Around the Airport

County

Pretty quiet this month. Repair to the deer fence on the northeast side is almost complete and Trenton continues to clear and burn brush on that side to open areas for future development. One individual is still working through the approval process for building in the Triangle. Steve has responded to a couple of inquiries regarding further opportunities there, but no further activity at this time.

Pacific Aviation

In mid-March, Pacific Aviation Northwest announced the receipt of a \$500,000 Aircraft Pilots Aviation Workforce Development Grant from the FAA. Quoting an article in the Grants Pass Daily Courier, this will allow PANW to "expand its airplane and commercial drone pilot programs to focus specifically on high school students." Co-founder Dave Traeger stated that Pacific Aviation NW was "the only grant recipient of this kind west of Ohio and Texas."

In further discussion with Dave, he stated that 2 additional instructors have been hired, both previous students of Pacific Aviation. Also part of ramping up the program will be the addition of new flight simulators, both at Grants Pass and Medford. Given there are details still to be worked out related to the distribution of the funding, he is not prepared to discuss that aspect at this time. He hopes to have a more complete picture by mid-month. In the meantime, a special email account has been set up: pilottraining@pacificaviationnw.com to provide a focal point for receiving and responding to requests for information. He feels very confident this program will be a valuable contributor beyond just the local aviation community.

Baker Avionics

Progress! The Harmon Rocket project now has wings. Looking at that substantial engine mount, it's obvious some major horsepower will be installed on the front end of this airplane. An RV10 project that has been in the works for awhile will soon be ready for its engine installation. Sometime in the TBD future, a Murphy "Moose" kit will arrive from the factory in BC for a builder from Sun River. The "Moose" is a large high-wing homebuilt taildragger about the size of a Cesssna 185. Many of the ones built to date have some version of the Russian M14P radial engine on the nose. Makes them look a bit like a DH "Beaver". There is an "Americanized" version rated at over 600 hp, and that's what is planned for this one.
