From the Desk of the President



Members of EAA Chapter 75,

There have been many activities that I could talk about from the month of April and continuing into the month of May. I would first like to tell you about how nice it is to see young people becoming involved with our chapter. We need new young people to maintain our identity and continue for the future.

We were fortunate enough to have a young man, Tristan Miller, step up to fill the position of Program Coordinator. As he filled that position, he noticed there was an area that needed to be addressed so the rest of the chapter could complete other activities. Tristan proceeds to address the issue of no space to store donated materials by renting a hangar at the Davenport Municipal Airport (DVN/KDVN field location C-9). The materials that needed to be stored were from a anonymous donor who had donated a Van's RV-6/6A wing kit and tail kit to our chapter. The next weekend, Tristan and I took my large flatbed trailer and went to the donor's home, loaded up the RV6/6A wing kit and brought it back to the Davenport Municipal Airport for storage and assessment.

We then proceeded over to the donor's hangar at the Davenport Municipal Airport and picked up the completed tail. These items are in pristine condition and were shipped in 3/4 inch plywood cases. They're now in our possession waiting for further EAA Chapter 75 board discussion and assessment as to what to do with these donated items.

A second good thing that happened this past month was we received acknowledgement that our chapter has been awarded a 3rd Ray Aviation Scholarship. This scholarship was awarded to

17-year old Jake Miller from Bettendorf, IA. Jake was awarded \$6,000 to complete the second half of his training. We are now in the process of receiving funding from the Ray Aviation Scholarship Fund for Jake's scholarship. Jake is well on his way to completing his private pilot's license, is progressing nicely, and is about to start cross-country flying as he has already passed his written test. This is just one great area in which our chapter has excelled.

Bob Thomas, our Young Eagles Coordinator has scheduled a Young Eagles Flight Rally for Saturday, May 22, 2021, at the Davenport Municipal Airport in Davenport, Iowa, which will be our first Young Eagles event since October 19, 2019. The new information about this program is that EAA is doubling the EAA Young Eagles credit value for flights during the months of June, July, and August. This means instead of our chapter receiving \$5 credit for every EAA Young Eagles Flight, the chapter will receive \$10 credit for every EAA Young Eagles flight. The only requirement is the chapter must return the completed EAA Young Eagles registration forms to EAA headquarters no later than September 30, 2021.

We've also been in communication with our nearby chapter, EAA Chapter 327 in Dubuque. Their president, President Chuck Weber, informs me they have

Following are the guidelines we have for meetings, including the limitations to allow for social distancing:

Fall Color Flight Up the Mississippi

Part 2 of 3 Parts Article by - Kent Johnson

This story is dedicated to Bill Rutherford and Tom Zwica, two of my original Cub partners who have since gone west.

Now some of the FAA's rules are there for a good reason. We had the required half hour of fuel remaining as we approached PDC. This I knew based on time spent aloft and a cork on a coat hangar that was still sticking out of the fuel cap. Ten miles to Monona and we landed with 20 minutes left in the tank. Kyle made a beautiful landing and the engine quit on roll out halfway down the runway! We were on a grass strip with no human activity visible and Kyle says, "What are we going to do now?" I said the first thing we should do is get out and pee (two old men aloft for over two hours)! Then I stuck the tank with our fuel stick and yes we did have twenty minutes of fuel remaining. The engine started right back up and we taxied to the pumps at the north end of the runway. I have no idea why the engine quit except it may have been the Cub saying "Don't run me that low on fuel again!"

There were two old 500 gallon fuel tanks, each with an automotive style Sinclair gas pump. Since we couldn't figure out how to power up the pumps, we walked into a rundown building that said "Pilot Lounge". The Sinclair gas pumps weren't the only things that made us feel like we wandered into the Twilight Zone - there was a chalkboard on the wall where pilots could sign and date their visit and if it was to be believed, no one had arrived in the last seven years! Snooping around we spotted an Iowa Airport Guide open to the Monona airport on a table. I called the number listed for the manager and talked to a nice lady who gave me the name and number of the "new" manager. Tim was a great guy who dropped what he was doing at his dairy farm and drove 20 minutes to the airport with his four-year-old son!

Tim went into a hangar and turned on the power for the pumps. He said there was 35 gallons of avgas in the tank, which was more than we needed, but neither Kyle or I were sure we wanted the bottom 10 gallons out of that tank. Not to worry because someone had previously pumped the tank dry without telling Tim! Fortunately, Tim was nice enough to drive us back to PDC airport and get 10 gallons in a tank in his pickup truck. Of course, it was now clear and a million at PDC. Two and a half hours after landing,

Kyle and I were airborne again. And I was hoping for fuel stops of no more than a half hour at the most! Tim and his son were outstanding folks who were very kind to us and even though it put making Little Falls in serious jeopardy, we had a great time and really appreciated them.

Next stop, Winona, MN. I had talked to the airport manager a couple days prior about fuel availability and he said no problem, and if nobody's here when you come in, just write down how much you got and your address and we'll send you a bill! He was at the airport when we landed so we had a quick fuel stop and on to Red Wing, MN. Now this made for two short legs but the Cub spoke to us at Monona, so I did not want to go Monona to Red Wing non-stop.

We knew by text message that Doug was airborne off Geneseo, IL sometime after we left Monona. We had told him that we would land at Winona and then meet him at Red Wing. As we got closer to Red Wing, Doug texted that he was 19 minutes out. I jokingly texted back that we were 18 and a half minutes out and we would race him to the airport. He had a tablet with Foreflight, moving map, and GPS and all we had was BFR, but sure enough, we landed at Red Wing just ahead of Doug. We fueled the Cub and Doug shared his trail mix with us for "lunch". Our next leg would take us to Buffalo, MN, northwest of Minneapolis. We could have actually stayed low over the river and followed it pretty much all the way through Minneapolis but there is no way I was going to fly over 50 miles of densely populated metropolitan area in a J-3! So, we came off the river going west from Red Wing through airspace that I was very familiar with from back in the days when I had my first airplane, a 1946 Luscombe 8A (over 40 years ago). Doug had not yet installed his ADS-B, so he had to stay outside the 30-mile veil around MSP airport. He went north from Red Wing to stay on the east side of the metro area so he could get fuel at New Richmond, where Foreflight indicated the cheapest fuel. Doug's generator was not charging after departing New Richmond, so he returned to the airport. It was awfully close to quitting time for the local mechanic, but he said he would stick around to help Doug fix his problem and get us back in the air. It was a simple fix, done in only a few minutes, but Doug really appreciated his kindness.

Even with Doug's extra flying miles and his mechanical issue, he still landed at Buffalo very shortly after the Cub. As Kyle and I taxied up to the pumps in Buffalo, I saw someone sitting in his car outside the fence. We got out of the airplane to get fuel and he walked up and said he was the manager, just leaving the airport for the day. I had talked to him by phone

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the day before and he said when he saw the Cub taxiing in he knew it had to be us so he stuck around to help. We still had just enough daylight left to make Little Falls but we had 10 hours in, we were tired and we wouldn't land until almost sunset if we pressed on, and the Cub had spoken to us in Monona. Accidents usually occur after a chain of things happen and to prevent the accident, it's best to break a link in the chain before you get into trouble. Doug had arrived and we made the decision to stay overnight in Buffalo. The airport manager told us where to find the keys for the courtesy car and how to get to the motel.

If you've been paying attention, you will note that in 10 hours of aviating, we encountered four aviation people who went above and beyond to extend kindness to fellow aviators. Tim in Monona took two and a half hours out of his day and didn't even sell us anything. The manager in Winona said "help yourself if nobody's here and write down what you take", the New Richmond mechanic stayed late to help Doug, and the Buffalo manager waited so that he could help us out. Imagine what the world would be like if we all took care of each other like that.

Jamie Rhee, Commissioner, Chicago Department of Aviation, to speak at Geneseo Historical Museum Ribbon Cutting

Ribbon Cutting and Fundraiser Kickoff for Harold Neumann "Aviation Pioneer" Museum Exhibit

Geneseo, IL- May 15, 2021- The Harold Neumann Project along with the Geneseo Historical Society will host an event opening the Harold Neumann "Aviation Pioneer" Museum Exhibit. We will begin at 9:00 and the flyin is at 1:00pm at Gen-Air Airport in Geneseo, IL.

Commissioner Jamie Rhee will speak on how Harold's TWA flight from Paris to Chicago made O'Hare Airport an International Airport in 1958. Karl Engelskirger, Valley City, Ohio, pilot, and owner of both Howard Planes, "Mike and Ike", will speak about owning and restoring these award-winning ships. Elliot Block, San Diego, CA, pilot, Howard Plane Historian, and test pilot will speak on the History of Benny Howard Planes and Benny's relationship to Harold Neumann.

During Harold's flying career of 70 years, he accomplished much more then that farm boy from Geneseo, IL, ever imagined he could. In 1935 Harold Neumann won the Greve Trophy, the Thompson Trophy along with earning the award of America's #1 Pilot by National Aeronautical Association. He is acknowledged in the Smithsonian; he was a barnstormer, skywriter, and a Captain for TWA for 30 years. From Jenny's to Jets, this man was not just a pilot, he was a genius.

Paula Chapa, Chair, Harold Neumann Project shared, "Collecting memorabilia of Harold's from museums & family members across the country has been nothing less than thrilling for us. We have his Greve Trophy and his Thompson Trophies, and they were just the tip of the ice burg. On loan from Special Collections & University Archives, University of Illinois Chicago, we will have the original Eiffel Tower that Harold presented to Mayor Daley after his celebrated flight from Paris to Chicago in 1958. Hours and hours have been spent reading letters, logbooks, and notes of Harold's, trying to put together the stories of his life with the memorabilia we collected. We want this museum exhibit to be educational as well as informative."

Ribbon cutting at the Geneseo Historical Museum will be by invitation only due to COVID recommendations; however, the exhibit will be open to the public from then on, adhering to the museums schedule. The public is invited to the Gen-Air Airport fly-in for Harold at 1:00pm. Mr. Mulligan will fly over and can be seen at the Gen-Air Airport along with Mike & Ike.




