From the Desk of the President



We had a nice potluck hosted by EAA Chapter 75, EAA Chapter 410 and the Gen-Air Inc. Dion Carr, Mary Carr and Mark Bauer helped with parking airplanes and guest accommodations. Many guys I am sure helped Dion set up his hangar with required spacing of tables and chairs for the COVID-19 requirements. By the way there was good entertainment while we were there as the Quad City Skydiving Center made a couple of jumps while we were waiting for lunch to be set up. We're also entertained by watching some good old-fashioned flying when a Stearman shows up. The Stearman was flown by Daniel Wolford. Other aircraft that appeared were a Waco VKS-7F flown by Jim Smith, a Piper PA-22-160 Tri-Pacer flown by Ed & Mindy Leahy and a Van's RV-8 flown by Charlie Hammes. Hammes' RV-8 has an inverted oil, fuel and smoke system which he puts to good use to wow the spectators. These types of airplanes handle the grass simply fine. In particular, the Wacos & Stearmans were designed to land on a grass strips because that was all there was even though there was a strong 90° crosswind out of the west. The pilots handled it with skill and of course the corn field on the south side of the strip helps a little bit. It was fun to watch. Note: the strip

runs 9/27 degrees, the winds were out of the south and a little gusty.

Dion and Mary had some good demo and safety items setup for display. One display on hand was a hand crankable aircraft mag that has an impulse coupler. It demonstrates even when cranking, turning the mag at a terribly slow rate, speed, simulating hand cranking the aircraft engine. The spark is generated because the coupler wines up a spring then releases at the right time to spin the armature which then generates the spark. The spark is then sent out through the distributor part of the mag down the spark plug wire to a spark plug that he has set up. Now if you look closely you can see the spark jump to the spark plug from the electrode to the case of the plug. This year he added LED lights near the spark plugs that illuminate when the spark is generated for that plug. That is an exceptionally good addition. The LED lights help people see that the spark is being generated at each of the four spark plugs.

On another subject, a couple of the guys were sitting around talking and discussing spark plugs. It was discovered that if you take an ohmmeter during your next annual and measure the resistance from the top of the plug to the electrode inside the plug you will find that many of your plugs might show open? Or around 40Meg ohm resistance! WOW? However, they should show resistance of between 1000, 1200 and maybe 2000 ohms. These are resistive plugs and they're designed that way. I guess there was a big discussion about Champion spark plugs/all aircraft plugs and one of the guys said, "No that's not right?" Anyway when he checked his plugs it ended up costing him \$250, he laughed. Because many of his spark plugs were measuring in the mega ohm category and realizing that his plugs were not probably firing/ working correctly all the time, so we bought new spark plugs. That is the bottom line.

The background data on this discussion started from Ron Ehreche, our chapter Treasure. Speaking of board

Oh by, the way, use a good meter, fluke, or another quality brand not a cheap, Harbor Freight freebie meter. I know sometimes it will take a little scratching around to get a good connection on the electrode inside the plug to get a good reading.

Hope all take care and see you, if you are comfortable attending one of our normally scheduled events.

Deere-Wiman Carriage House COVID-19 Guidelines & Procedures

Following are the guidelines we have for meetings, including the limitations to allow for social distancing:

- The maximum number of people we are able to accommodate in the Deere-Wiman Carriage House is 33 people with a panel style setup (this is rows of chairs with a panel table up front). If you would like tables, the classroom setup is able to accommodate 26 people. The setups are all socially distanced.
- NEW: We will have a staff member on site for the Carriage House. A member of your group will need to check in at the office in the Deere-Wiman House (off the south porch entrance there will be a sign). The staff member will then unlock the door to the Carriage House and provide a clipboard with sheets for all attending to sign-in (this will be used if we have a need for contact tracing).
- We ask that everyone wear face coverings when moving through buildings and when social distancing is not possible. This includes when you arrive and leave.
- We ask that everyone wash hands frequently or use hand sanitizer.
- We ask that everyone self-screen and not come on site if experiencing COVID symptoms.
- Food is allowed. You will need to bring disposable dishes etc. And we ask that we avoid buffets and that 1 or 2 people serve the food and beverages to limit the amount of touching of serving pieces.
- A member of our staff will call Jim two weeks prior to each reservation to confirm.

TREASURERS REPORT: The treasurer's report will be delivered to the BOD/Membership during the regular meeting slated to be held September 12th, 2020.

APPROVAL OF MEETING MINUTES: A motion to approve the minutes as published in the last newsletter was made by Marty Santic and was seconded by Ron Ehrecke. Approval of the board was unanimous.

OLD BUSINESS: Ray Aviation Scholarship Update: Addison Slavish has approximately 50 hours of instruction as she nears the day of her checkride. Unfortunately the trainer aircraft is currently down for repairs but is expected to return to flying status shortly. Funds remaining in our training account will be applied toward our next flight training candidate, once selected.

The Board agreed unanimously to accept Nick Anagnos' bid of \$100.00 for the Snap-On borescope that was taken out of service from the tool room.

President Jim Skadal reported that the August Coffee and Donut gathering at Dan Wolford's hangar went well and was well attended with best practices observed concerning the Covid-19 pandemic restrictions.

NEW BUSINESS: After a short discussion the board voted on and agreed unanimously to resume our customary monthly meetings at the Deere-Wiman Carriage House. Current limitations call for a maximum indoor attendance of thirty three (33) persons. A sign-in sheet, face masks, social distancing and hand washing where required are to be adhered to. The next regular meeting will be held September 12th, 2020. Next Board meeting will be via ZOOM.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Nick Anagnos and was seconded by Carl Brown. Voting was unanimous to adjourn at 7:30 pm.

Rest & Recuperation (Richard Lowe)

When I was in Vietnam from Sep 67 to Sept 68, the military had a program that allowed members to travel out of the country for a week of Rest and Recuperation. It was referred to as the R & R Program. It was started early in the war when Pan Am used an old DC-6 to fly some folks from Saigon to Bangkok. The program was taken over and run by the Navy and when I was there, they were operating R & R centers in seven locations: Honolulu, Manila, Sydney, Kauala Lumpur, Bangkok, Hong Kong, and Taipei. You had to stand the cost of your hotel and meals, but the plane ride out and back was by a MAC Charter. Service members could request one R&R during a twelve-month tour. You listed three choices and then you were awarded your choices using a system of who had been in country the longest. I waited until my ninth month and applied for Sydney as a first choice. I got it. I wanted to return to the west for at least a little while and did not want to take a seat to Hawaii that could be used by a married person. A lot of them met their wives in Hawaii. I heard stories about women who came to Hawaii only to learn their husbands had been killed just before they were due to leave for their R&R. I figured I would get to Hawaii eventually, but I probably would never get a chance to go down under.

I flew up to Da Nang and reported to the R & R center. We all (officers and enlisted) had to undergo a check for VD. We exchanged our military payment certificates for green dollars. We assembled and went by bus to the flight line at the airbase where we boarded a World Airways B-707. We had to wear our summer short sleeved khaki uniforms for the trip. The load consisted of all services, officer, and enlisted members. Sailors were in white. We took off

about 1730 and flew until about midnight in the worst thunderstorms I have ever seen from an airplane. Turbulence was bad. We landed in Darwin about midnight and deplaned. There, they opened the bar and changed our money to Australian dollars. At 0200 we took off and landed in Sydney at exactly 0600 when the airport opened to traffic. We went through a strict customs search. They did not want us to bring in any marijuana which was prevalent in RVN but not in Australia at the time. It was midwinter in Sydney, about 40 degrees F and we shivered in our short sleeve shirts and thin blood. We were then taking city buses to the Chevron Hotel which was the R & R center. There we had coffee and rolls and were given a detailed briefing. We were not to wear a uniform in Sydney. They had vendors who rented us a suit, two shirts and a tie. We also had a chance to buy some clothing. I still have a real nice wool sweater I bought that morning. We selected our hotels (I think I paid \$60) for the week at the Chevron Hotel) and we were released until the same time a week later. We were told that if the police arrested us we would be sent back to RVN on a commercial flight at our expense. Same if we failed to report for the return flight in a week.

The bad news was that the New South Wales fuel hauler union was on strike and there were no cabs running, no heat in the hotels, no hot water. They settled the strike about the third day, and we were able to soak RVN out of our pours with a hot bath. But the food was good, the people were friendly, and I was able to take a couple day tours by bus and see the city. I met a couple who were friends of a Marine I knew in Chu Lai and we had dinner and then saw "The Graduate" which was just released in the movie theaters that summer.

New Wittman Regional Terminal Construction Begins

Supervisors of the Winnebago County Board approved three resolutions to move forward with the construction of a new General Aviation (GA) terminal facility at Wittman Regional Airport during Dec. 17, 2020's County Board meeting.

The terminal project has been in the works for several years as operating costs of the existing terminal have risen. Two existing structures located on 20th Avenue will be replaced by a single, more efficient and right-sized facility to appropriately serve the airport, community, and flying public.

The current GA terminal facility, built in 1958, occupies 6,254 square feet and is operated by Basler Flight Service. The adjacent 33,000 square foot terminal was constructed in 1971 to serve commercial airline operations. Commercial airline service concluded in 2003.

Jim Schell, the Director of Wittman Regional Airport, expects to have plans finalized and submitted to the Bureau of Aeronautics and the City of Oshkosh in early 2020 with a bid opening in late April. Construction of the new GA terminal is planned to commence as early as May 2020 with completion expected approximately 13 months later. The new facility will be a single-story, 12,500 square foot building. In addition to serving general aviation air traffic, the new building will also provide space for Basler Flight Service, airport administrative offices, space for a rental car operation and meeting rooms available to the public.

Total construction cost on the project is currently estimated at \$6.8 million. Grant assistance from the Wisconsin Bureau of Aeronautics will be received in the amount of \$1.8 million with the remaining balance being funded by the county. The total investment includes demolition of both existing facilities, site work and paving for a new parking lot, constructing the new GA terminal and an improved access road from 20th Avenue.

On July 16, 2020, Wittman Regional Airport held a groundbreaking ceremony for the new terminal, with that structure being built to serve the general aviation community, including during EAA AirVenture. That facility will replace the current terminal and is expected to be in operation by next June.




