Speaking of grass parking and takeoffs, there is a new organization called (RAF) Recreational Aviation Foundation. They have worked with EAA and other aircraft organizations all the way up through the FAA promoting the approval of grass strips at as many airports as can accommodate. The FAA has approved this process, but it is up to each local airstrip to allocate the necessary measures to accommodate that capability. We need to press our local municipal representative to accommodate all of the Stearman, taildraggers, ultralights, and any other aircraft that operators really love and prefer grass runways. Let's face it, now that the Davenport Municipal Airport is almost a landlocked airport the only other new activities we're going to get are tundra tire and taildragger aircraft that prefer a grass runway.

We want to increase the aircraft activity at our Airport, RIGHT? This is one venue that would increase those numbers. NOTE: at our 1st Saturday Coffee and Donuts on May 7th, we will discuss and preview that capability of this feature at Davenport.

Once the chapter selects our nominee, we collectively will fully support and mentor them towards success.

While we're still busy procuring all those items, here is what we have so far.

# **Rolling Tool Cart Additions**



Clockwise from top: Full set of 1/2" drive SAE sockets; metric and SAE 1/4-inch U-joint socket sets for close-quarters work; three 1/4" combination wrenches (to augment other sets that don't go smaller than 5/16"); pinking shears; a set of combination wrenches in 1/16" increments from 1" to 1-1/4"), and a better 40-watt, soldering iron. Still to come: Another metric socket set, replacements for the missing Snap-On tools, & a blade wrench for the die grinder. Finally, the Oxy-Acetylene regulator (not shown) has been rebuilt for continued long service.

# **Norman Surplus Passes Away**

On Tuesday, April 19, 2022, Norman Surplus passed away in his home at the age of 59. He was a Northern Irish pilot, who circumnavigated the globe in an autogyro, nicknamed *Roxy*. His trip began in 2010 and ended on June 28, 2019. *Roxy*, a RotorSport UK MT-03 (G-YROX) is currently on display at the EAA Aviation Museum in Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

Before his passing, he wrote a book titled <u>First Gyro</u>. This book is a remarkable true story of one man's nine-year courageous journey to live 'beyond cancer' and achieve the first circumnavigation of the world in a gyroplane. The book will be available worldwide in paperback and can now be pre-ordered here, ahead of its 2022 release.

At EAA AirVenture Oshkosh in 2019, he was interviewed by Steve Buss for <u>EAA Radio</u> about his trip in a gyroplane. He was also featured in that year's <u>EAA AirVenture Today</u>, a daily newspaper distributed for eight days at the annual convention.

# **EAA Chapter 75 Receives Gold Level Status**

Congratulations to your chapter in successfully reaching the GOLD level status recognition level for the combined 2020 and 2021 years. EAA is happy to present you with a chapter recognition banner to proudly display where your chapter meets. Your level also will be displayed online at <a href="EAA.org/FindAChapter">EAA.org/FindAChapter</a> with a specially designed emblem. You are encouraged to use your emblem on your website, newsletter, and other promotional materials; your chapter emblem is attached in this email.



To review the chapters overall scoring, please see the numbered list below.

This program was developed and measured in partnership with EAA's Chapter Advisory Council, and is based on 10 criteria that are consistently found in active and highly engaged chapters. Due to 2020 and 2021 being, challenging years for chapters to maintain a high level of engagement, these years have been combined into a single recognition period. This was done to help chapters have a longer period of time to engage in the 10 criteria. An additional 11<sup>th</sup> criteria point was included this year to help offset the unique challenges associated with limited social engagement, and to observe unique chapter approved activities. Each is worth a point, and there are three levels of recognition: bronze (7 out of 11), silver (8 out of 11), and gold (at least 9 out of 11).

- 1. Attends a chapter leadership training sessions
- 2. Growing or steady membership
- 3. Offers IMC or VMC Club programs
- 4. Participates in Young Eagle or Flying Start programs
- 5. Has EAA-approved Flight Advisor or Technical Counselor
- 6. Participates in EAA's Annual Chapter Member survey
- 7. Participates in Young Eagles Build and Fly, Young Eagles Workshops, Ray Aviation Scholarship program, or sends a youth to EAA's Air Academy
- 8. Requests an EAA ChapterBlast email
- 9. Hosts at least two public events each year
- 10. Owns/leases a facility
- 11. Extra credit activity, such as a chapter build project, youth build project, chapter scholarship, a chapter tool crib, IAC competition, etc.

Up for sale is a 1989 Viking Dragonfly Mk II project. This experimental canard has a 133.2 TTAF. The original Subaru EA-71 engine was replaced by the builder with a Subaru EA-81 engine at 20.1 hours. The Subaru EA-81 has a Dave Johnson 1.64:1 propeller speed reduction unit with a total of 113.1 hours on it. The propeller that is currently used is a ground adjustable, HPRPM warp drive prop (SER.No.R2800) which has 113.1 hours on it. There are no electrical systems or radios installed. The airplane was last inspected on January 2, 1998 by the builder. The work that needs to be done includes elevators that need to be repaired or replaced and the cooling system which needs to be upgraded and engine tested. This could be a great candidate for electric propulsion. More pictures and questions are quickly available upon request. This aircraft currently has the canard and wings removed for ease of storage. 
