## **Loss of Insurance on a Technicality**

You're flying your Bonanza, the visibility is perfect, and the air is smooth. On approach, you point out to your passenger the stunning view. But as you flare for the landing, you hear the awful sounds of the prop hitting the runway, and the scraping of metal on asphalt. The plane screeches to a halt. No one is injured. You look. The gear handle is in the "Up" position.

You made the most human of errors; you forgot to put the gear down. The plane has extensive and expensive damage. At least you have insurance coverage. Well, maybe you do. Your annual inspection expired at midnight. You check your insurance policy, and it requires that your plane be airworthy. But since the cause of the accident had nothing to do with the annual inspection--and nothing to do with airworthiness-the insurance coverage should be good. Right?

The legal question is: "May an insurer deny coverage under an aviation insurance policy for failure to comply with an unambiguous exclusion, if there is no causal connection between the exclusion and the loss?" In layman's terms: "Can an insurance company get out of paying on a technicality which has nothing to do with the cause of the accident?" The answer depends on which state's law applies.

This question was addressed in two cases arising from one airplane accident in Nevada. In September, 2001 a man standing in his own back-yard ("Bystander") sustained severe personal injuries when a plane owned and operated by Pilot-Owner ("P/O") fell on him. P/O had insurance through Old Republic Insurance Company. Old Republic's policy excluded coverage when "the Airworthiness Certificate of the aircraft is not in full force and effect" or when "the aircraft has not been subjected to the appropriate airworthiness inspection(s) as required under current applicable [FARs] for the operations involved."

FAR section 21.181 provides that: "standard airorthiness certificates are effective as long as the maintenance [is] performed in accordance with Parts 43 and 91.." FAR section 91.409 says: ".no person may operate an aircraft unless, within the preceding 12 calendar months, it has <a href="https://hatchar.com/hatchar.

Bystander filed suit in Nevada state court against P/O seeking compensation for his injuries. Old Republic filed suit against Bystander and P/O in Nevada federal court seeking a determination that it had no obligation to pay Bystander or P/O because the insurance policy expressly excluded coverage for an aircraft without a

valid airworthiness certificate; and because P/O's aircraft was out of annual at the time of the accident, it didn't have a valid airworthiness certificate. Bystander and P/O argued that Old Republic was trying to use a technical policy violation to avoid payment, and that in order to avoid paying, the violation must be a cause of the accident.

In Old Republic Insurance Company v. Griffin (2005) 402 F.3d 876, the federal Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals considered whether or not the coverage exclusion must have a causal relationship to the accident. In analyzing this question, it reviewed the laws of different states:

Illinois, Montana and Texas, in one form or another, required a connection between the accident and the coverage exclusion

Colorado took a middle ground: if a regulation is safety related-as in the case of an airworthiness requirement-- the coverage exclusion should apply unless the insured showed that the violation was not the cause of the accident.

Arizona and California, with certain limitations, found no causal connection to be required.

Florida, in different fact situations, went both ways.

At the time, Nevada law was unsettled. The federal Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals concluded that: ".the case law on this issue is so divergent to leave open the question of whether Nevada would or would not adopt." a causal requirement between a coverage exclusion and the cause of the accident. Ultimately, that court "certified" the matter to the Nevada Supreme Court. The question certified was: "Under Nevada law, may an insurer deny coverage under an aviation insurance policy for failure to comply with an unambiguous requirement of the policy, or is a causal connection between the insured's non-compliance and the accident required?"

The Nevada Supreme Court answered this question holding that under Nevada law "insurers need not establish a causal connection between a safety-related aviation policy exclusion and the loss in order to exclude coverage so long as the exclusion is unambiguous, narrowly tailored, and essential to the risk undertaken by the insurer." So whether there must be a causal connection between the coverage exclusion and the cause of the accident depends upon what states law applies. And what states law applies is not so easy. Suppose you are a resident of State A, flying your airplane which is registered in State B, from State C over State D to State E, and you have an acci-

dent in State D. The first legal argument is going to be which states law applies; and this is a matter which will probably not be determined until long after the accident. The bigger the loss, the more likely the insurance company will try to find a way out of paying. This doesn't make insurance companies bad guys; it is simply the nature of things. So it is the big damage claims that are most dangerous for you. The best defenses gainst loss of insurance coverage on a"technicality" are to assure that:

- 1. You read your policy and comply with its terms.
- 2. Your plane is in annual.
- 3. All ADs have been complied with, because if an AD has not been complied with, your plane is not airworthy.

While this article deals with loss of insurance coverage due to your plane being un-airworthy, a similar situation exists where the policy requires the pilot to be properly certificated, have an unexpired Flight Review, and be otherwise current. In an accident, the real legal threat is not the FAA; it is your insurance company determining that you have not complied with the terms of its policy. Your policy is a contract and both you and your insurance company.

## Runway 3/21 Reconstruction at the Davenport Municipal Airport

A BIT OF HISTORY: In 1948, the City of Davenport initiated a bold new airport project. They believed that the best way to service the expanding city was to create the greatest economic engine possible. A site was located, funding was secured, and approval was received from the Civil



Aeronautics Administration, the forerunner to the FAA. The City's efforts now stand as the Davenport Municipal Airport.

Over the years, the Airport has gone through its share of good times and bad. But through it all stood its concrete runways. For more than 60 years, the City of Davenport maintained the runways through a program of panel replacement and concrete patching. This program gave the Airport the ability to serve the City of Davenport as well as the aviation community for decades. But this was not enough...

WHY RECONSTRUCTION: In 2011, it was decided that a thorough analysis of the 65 year old concrete was needed to help determine the future of the airport. Remember, the original concrete was only intended to last 20 years before being replaced. Numerous core samples were taken which showed that not only did the concrete have signs of serious deterioration, but so did the subsoil. With the lack of adequate drainage, water was undermining the subsoil as well as the integrity of the concrete. So a plan was devised, and runway reconstruction became the Airport's number one priority.



THE PLAN: During the analysis of the data, numerous construction options were discussed to find the best construction method for the money. Our engineers, along with the FAA, discussed methods like Crack-And-Seat and Whitetopping in both asphalt and concrete, yet none of these could provide the required 25 year longevity like full reconstruction.

Now that the analysis is complete, and the decision on which construction method to use is under our belt, it is time to move forward to the construction process. This reconstruction entails a complete removal of the original concrete, stabilization of the sub soil, and installation of an improved drainage system, all topped by a new runway surface. When complete, the new runway will also be as much as 18" higher than the old to allow for better water runoff. Finally, the installation of new LED lighting will light the Airport's way into the future.

WHAT WE INTEND: The long awaited news has finally arrived. On Thursday, I met with our contractors and consultants to discuss this year's runway construction schedule. Weather permitting, Runway 3/21 will be closed to all air and ground traffic beginning May 5, 2014. It will remain closed until September 26, 2014 so concrete removal and replacement can take place. In this time, the shoulders of the runway will also be regraded to the new slope conditions.

The Airport will be closed beginning June 2, 2014, and will reopen on July 1, 2014, weather permitting.

While Runway 15/33 will remain open for most of the project, its closure is absolutely necessary for the reconstruction of the runway intersection. On June 2, 2014, the runway intersection removal will begin and run through July 1, 2014. This means that both runways as well as the Airport will be closed to all fixed wing aircraft. Rotary wing and blimps are welcome to come and go as they please, with a few area restrictions (please check the NOTAMS).
