Approval of Board of Directors Meeting Minutes: A motion to approve the February minutes as published in the March newsletter was made by Mary-Ellen Pfeiffer, and seconded by Chris Welvaert. The motion passed unanimously.

#### **OLD BUSINESS:**

- 1. 2023 Ray Scholarship Selection Process: The Board of Directors reviewed the previous month's motion for establishing a Ray Scholarship Selection Committee. Bob Thomas will contact the committee and convene an initial meeting. Greg Stopyra will send a working draft application and scoring worksheet documents to Bob Thomas. The selection committee will finalize the application forms and evaluation criteria. Applications will be distributed via Young Eagles events, local CFIs, Revv Aviation and Elliott Aviation FBOs, and the chapter newsletter.
- **2. Young Eagles:** Bob Thomas informed the board that the Chapter 75's seasons kickoff EAA Young Eagles event will be May 13, 2023 at Davenport Municipal Airport.
- **3. Membership Renewal Update:** Liz Richards reports 67 unpaid members for 2023. Liz will send an email to unpaid members encouraging them to renew.

#### **Chicago VFR Flyaway**


We all have those things we want to do with our airplanes that we never quite get around to doing or me, one of those items is the VFR flyway along the lake front in Chicago, IL. Truth be told, the prospect intimidated me for some time. I few into DuPage Airport (DPA/KDPA) and Chicago Executive Airport (PWK/KPWK) frequency, but one can get to both of those while still staying on the outskirts of Class B airspace.

Also, the lakefront flyway, is a somewhat confined area, and I anticipated a good deal of traffic on a nice day; which is the only time one would make this trip as sightseeing is the object.

A few months ago, on Friday, October 21st, I had flown into Greater Kankakee Airport (IKK/KIKK) in a 1979 Piper PA-28-181 (N8114F) myself with extra time before I needed to head back. It was a nice clear day, so I figured now or never. After departing Greater Kankakee Airport, I called Chicago Air Route Traffic Control Center (Chicago ARTCC) and told them what I wanted to do and asked if they could assist, or was I on my own. They were very accommodating and provided flight following the entire time. I entered the lakefront from the southwest; sliding in between the Gary/Chicago International Airport (GYY/KGYY) airspace and Midway International Airport (MDW/KDW) airspace (approximately on the 25 degree radial of the Peotone VOR). Also, upon entering the Class B airspace, I had to stay under 3600 feet to remain clear of Class B airspace.

I then turned north and followed the lakefront for a mile or two north of Navy Pier, then turned around and went back the way I came. You can stay quite close to the shoreline also. The view of the city is spectacular and the entire time there was only one other airplane along the lakefront. ATC assigned me below 2000' and the other plane above 2500', and there were no problems at all. If this is something you have wanted to do, I would encourage it. It was very easy, and with an iPad, the class B airspace is easy to navigate. Chicago has one of the best skylines of any city in America and it is a real treat to view it from your airplane.

#### **NEW HEATED T-HANGARS COMING TO WITTMAN REGIONAL AIRPORT**



We are thrilled to announce that Wittman Regional Airport (OSH/KOSH) will be constructing 20 new T-Hangar units, with construction beginning in Spring 2023. Like many GA airports, available hangar space is extremely limited here with a waiting list of 50+ aircraft owners and pilots. These T-hangars will be the first airport-owned hangars built at OSH/KOSH in more than 20 years. Two 10-unit buildings will be constructed on the east ramp directly south of the intersection of Taxiway J and Taxiway E. The project will entail earthwork, taxi-lane construction, utility and stormwater features, provided by a combination of County, State and Federal grant funding.

Each hangar unit will be 42' wide at the door opening, 33' deep, with a 12' high clear door opening, sized to fit up to a light piston twin. They will have automatic bifold doors, concrete floors, insulated, and heated with individual gas heaters in each unit. One of the buildings will have a public use restroom for all tenants in the east GA area. As part of the project's civil work, we will also be creating six shovel-ready hangar pad sites for up to 60'x60' private-built hangars, with electric and gas nearby. Those lots will be available for land lease in summer 2023.

Our event has generated hundreds of millions of dollars for the local economy, while instilling a love for flying in the community and becoming a valued partner to many charities and non-profits. We have always been so thrilled to show off the beautiful Reno Tahoe area to the tens of thousands that flew in just for our event and we're looking forward to doing that again this year. The support from both our community and visitors has been overwhelming, and the impact they helped us make in Reno is immeasurable.

The last National Championship Air Races will take place from September 13-17. The 2023 event is set to return with more than 150 planes and pilots as well as several 'hands-on' displays and experiences including the GRADD-NVBAA STEM Education Discovery Zone, heritage displays, military demonstrations and static displays and more. The event will also mark the third year of competition for the STOL (Short Take-Off & Landing) Drag which has become a phenomenon in the skies. As we are registered as an educational non-profit, to truly meet this mission, we are increasing our fundraising efforts. We have applied for a capacity building grant to expand our technological capabilities—giving us the opportunity to offer greater technological support to existing pilots, digitizing many of our processes, and to promote existing and new programs that we plan to offer.

You, however, are important in this process, too. We need both your financial and physical support. In future months, through meetings, emails, and newsletters, you will have opportunities to hear, speak, and vote on issues relevant to our chapter. Please make every effort to have your voice heard. Remember, that to make this happen takes more than words. We need people who are willing to help. We are in desperate need of hospitality people to help with everything from fly-ins to bereavement, we need communications people to help us communicate more effectively to our members, we need development people to market us in the community and help us fundraise, program leaders to continue the programs that are so loved in our chapter. ### **Grassy Guess & Anti-Authority**

If you are operating an aircraft in and out of beautiful Gen-Airpark (3G8), you know that it takes a little more distance to get airborne and over the infamous 50-foot obstacle off of a grass runway than off of the hard surface runways found at Quad Cities International Airport (MLI/KMLI or Whiteside Municipal Airport (SQI/KSQI). How much more distance? Well, that's kind of a gray area—What time of year is it, spongy spring or firm fall? How much rain have we had in the past few days? A lot—see spongy spring, or a little in the past few hours? See a slippery surface and expect a longer landing perhaps.

Also, at 3G8 we find that not everyone uses a radio all the time to announce intentions and with calm to light wind conditions, we sometimes use one runway for departures and another for arrivals. Nothing illegal here, but what do we do when we encounter these scenarios when we are approaching the airport for arrival or taxiing to a runway for departure? What practices should we employ to keep ourselves and others safe? How about at an airport like the Davenport Municipal Airport (DVN/KDVN) or Kewanee Municipal Airport (EZI/KEZI) where there are crossing runways that aren't necessarily visible from all points on the airport surface? We will view and discuss two scenarios from the EAA library and perhaps look at a pilot's operating handbook or two to see what the "book" says for grass runway aircraft performance.

#### Our questions of the month for this meeting are:

- What is the difference between Common Traffic Advisory Frequency (CTAF) and UNICOM (universal conversions) in terms of how we use these frequencies?
- How do we find the CTAF at an airport?
- Looking at a Chicago Sectional Chart, find the MLI airport. What does the letter "C" positioned in a blue circle following a control tower frequency mean?

We will discuss the answer to these and other world problems at this gathering! See you then!
