For the first time since the pandemic, chapter 770 hosted the Ford Trimotor for tours and rides May 19-22. The Ford 5AT arrived Monday the 16th and was the guest of honor, at our chapter meeting and potluck on Thursday. The meeting included a very interesting historical and operational presentation by the Ford's pilot Ashley. Thanks to Stellar Aviation and Springfield Airport Authority for use of their facilities.

The aircraft this year was NC9645, "City of Wichita", which was the 2nd aircraft to depart Columbus Air Terminal as part of TAT's transcontinental railroad and air service between New York and Los Angeles.

Flights began Thursday with a media flight and 2 passenger flights. Between fair an weather systems. Friday very strong winds near 30kts at times kept the Ford on the ground. Saturday another system moved in bringing low overcast, thunderstorms and rain, however throughout the day we managed by all! to get 4 flights in when more favorable conditions were present.

Sunday proved to be a much better day in terms of weather. The system had moved off to the east and under blue skies, the Ford launched (a record for SPI Ford visits) 12 times throughout the day made possible by the work of the flight crew, Ford traveling ground crew, and the 770 chapter members who volunteered throughout the weekend.
