EAA 857 Members,

N-Numbers

As my Pitts Special project gets closer to completion it is time for me to think about selecting an N-Number which is part of the process of FAA registration which falls under 14 CFR Part 45.

So whats in an N-Number, let's take a closer look. Different countries may use various letter associations to go with their registration numbers. In the United States, your registration number will start with the letter "N," which is why many people refer to the registration this way. The numbers can vary in how they are, including ending with one or two alphabetic letters. Other regulations go along



with the assignation of the number, including that the number can be anywhere from one to five characters, it cannot start with a zero, and it may not contain the letters "I" or "O" because they are too close in resemblance to the numbers one and zero. The piece to remember is that this number is used as the unique registration identifier for your plane.

All civil aircraft in the United States are required to register with the FAA and receive an N number that is displayed prominently on the plane. Planes can have different registration numbers over time, specifically if the airplane has changed ownership. If you purchase your aircraft from another owner or broker, you can get new numeric numbers when you register the plane yourself as the new owner. You will have to fill out the proper paperwork and file it with the FAA so that you can be assigned a new number.

To properly form an N-Number there are a few rules that you must review. First it must begin with the capital N then, one to five numbers (N1234Z) or one to four numbers followed by one letter (N1234Z), or one to three numbers followed by two letters (N123AZ). To avoid confusion with the numbers one and zero, the letters I and O are not to be used.

Here are some more rules with N-Numbers. An N-Number may not begin with zero. You must precede the first zero in an N-Number with any number 1 through 9 for example N01Z is not valid.

Registration numbers N1 through N99 are strictly reserved for FAA internal use. The FAA no longer issues numbers beginning with NC, NX, NR, or NL. On some older aircraft, these numbers may be displayed in accordance with FAR Part 45.22.


Size means everything so now we will look at what that means with displaying N-Numbers. Fixed wing aircraft minimum height 12 inches on both fuselage sides. There are exceptions on aircraft displaying 2-inch marks before November 1, 1981, and on aircraft manufactured between November 2, 1981, and January 1, 1983, you may display those marks until the aircraft is repainted or the marks are repainted, restored, or changed. Once the aircraft is repainted or the marks are repainted, restored, or changed, the N-Number is required to be 12 inches.



Displaying the N-Numbers on amateur-built with a maximum cruising speed of 180 knots or less you may use 3 inch markings.

Sorry if I made that sound confusing but it came out of Advisory Circular number 45-2

Knowing the rules you can reserve your N-Number by contacting the FAA website do a search of available N-Numbers. Many numbers are reserved for other aircraft and you may notice that the reserved N-Number has no particular aircraft assignment. The owner of that number may be waiting to change to a different aircraft. Unfortunately some "cool N-Numbers" are held with no aircraft because there are people making big bucks by selling these numbers to someone who really wants to pay (movie stars, large corporations) it appears to be a ransom cottage industry over looked by the FAA.



Once you have decided on an N-Number you can hold that number for \$10 for up to one year. The FAA will send you by mail notification of your reserved number. If you still have not used the number within the year just fill out the paper work and reserve for another year for \$10.


I have my N-Number reserved N24RS and I will have it painted on the Pitts fuselage sides in the near future. Keep working on your airplane projects and get them flying!





The New EAA Builders Log

While working on setting up our new website (presented in the April Newsletter) I came across an EAA sponsored resource that should be of particular interest to the current builders and any who are thinking of pursuing a build project in the future. This is a website for documenting all aspects of your build, in essence your electronic 3 ring binder of tasks completed, photos for the record, notes that you may wish to make all for documenting your 51 percent rule process. The site is accessible from the EAA homepage under <u>Aircraft Building</u>, by selecting the <u>EAA Builders Log</u> link, seen in the screen shot below. This website is a new offering from the EAA introduced at AirVenture 2019.





In order to access the <u>EAA Builders Log</u> you create a member login identity if you don't already have one.

The webpage will load and evaluate your location from your IP address and then present multiple project logs that are documented and nearest to you in your area. You can also search via a Zip Code. You can see here that there are projects in Ohio, Pennsylvania, and New York. Hopefully we will have some documented in from our Pittsburgh-Butler chapter in the near future!

You may also search for a specific project type, such as projects related to a Vans RV-12, using the advanced search feature. Additional regional projects may be shown by clicking on the see more button.








In the blue banner at the top of the Builder's Log webpage take a look in particular at the ? Help link button. There you will find links to the Webinar presented last September by Charlie Becker from the EAA Chapters office and member Don White who developed the product that we are discussing. Mr. White also developed the EAA Young Eagles Rally registration website introduced about 2 years ago. The webinar presentation is available in both the original video and as a pdf document of the presentation pages.

Notice at the left there are a number of YouTube video tutorials to choose from instructing upon the use of various aspects of the website. Some of this information is also summarized in the referenced Webinar.

The screenshot that follows depicts the content on a particular project such as the Vans RV-14 in Canfield, OH. The basic information regarding project ownership is at the top, with a list of project categories at the




left, as you can see. This is an editable list that can document the project as the owner sees fit, and additions or deletions to the default list may be made <u>only</u> by the project owner. Below and to the right of these fields are the project notes for the category *empennage* on the most recent date of activity. The date and time spent as well as photos uploaded by the owner depict the detail of the tasks that were involved. Earlier project work performed follows in this log.





One of the page templates that is available to chapters to use on their new EAA sponsored websites presents a page that will show a grid of thumbnail links to the Builders Log website for those chapter members who are documenting their build using the tool and have noted their affiliation to their chapter. As an example of this display, here is the Chapter 252 Builders log page from Charlie Becker's chapter in Oshkosh. You will note the link thumbnails to the individual builds associated with Chapter 252. We need some EAA Chapter 857 members to give this a try, so please go check out this new *EAA Builders Log* tool supporting your build process from the EAA!
