Business: The following items were discussed:

- Young Eagles Event (Saturday June 12th, 10:00 A.M.-02:00 P.M.): Needed volunteers in departments are as follows:
 - <u>Pilots:</u> minimum of 3; all must be YPP (Youth Protection Program) current
 - <u>Chief pilot:</u> pilot briefing on route and procedures
 - <u>Registration desk:</u> Minimum of 2 should be YPP current and compatible to printer and PC or paper forms and certificates depending on method chosen.
 - <u>Ground school:</u> no longer required possibly omitting
 - <u>Aircraft marshal:</u> with radio for monitoring
 - Young Eagles Marshalls: escort for Young Eagles and parents
 - <u>Kitchen Staff:</u> Grill needs to be cleaned if being used and preparations made for operation
 - <u>Food Server:</u> Food safety recommendations
 - <u>Groceries:</u> purchase supplies after we inventory, condiment packets and no self-serve
 - <u>Cash Box:</u> safe handling
 - <u>Set up and Cleaning</u>: Disinfect all chairs and tables, periodic wipe down, must start 07:30 A.M.
 - <u>Tear Down and Cleaning</u>: Disinfect all chairs, tables and equipment prior to storage
 - If you are able and willing to help, please reach out to Phil Kriley or Ted Merklin

Closing: The meeting was adjourned at 08:15 P.M. after motion to do so was put forth by Bob Tedesco and seconded by Chris McGeary.



<u>CHARLES POTTS</u> <u>THE CHARLES TAYLOR MASTER MECHANIC AWARD</u>

Last fall Bob Santolla proposed that we submit a nomination for Chuck Potts to receive the Charles Taylor "Master Mechanic "Award presented by the FAAST Team for a in lifetime career of accomplishment as a senior mechanic.

Charles E Taylor was the Wright Brothers bicycle machine shop mechanic instrumental in executing the Wright Brothers concepts and producing the their experimental gear, gliders and the 1903 Wright Flyer. As the brothers pursued their aviation experiments in North Carolina, Charles worked from the bicycle shop in Dayton Ohio and was instrumental in the design and build of the 1903 Wright Flyer Engine, the first to power an aircraft in controlled flight. This aluminum-copper, water-cooled, aircraft engine was produced in only six weeks, based in part on design concepts of the Wright Brothers. The Wrights wanted an engine with at least 8 horsepower. The engine that Charles Taylor built produced 12 horsepower. Several years later he also helped Orville Wright produce the 1908 Military Flyer for demonstration to the US Army.



According to the FAAST awards website, "The Charles Taylor "Master Mechanic" Award recognizes the lifetime accomplishments of senior mechanics." The site states that to be eligible a candidate must:

- Hold a U.S. Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) or Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) mechanic or repairman certificate.
- Have 50 or more years of civil and military maintenance experience.
 - Up to 20 years of the required 50 years may be U.S. military experience; or worked as an uncertified person in a U.S. aviation maintenance facility that maintained U.S. registered aircraft, either domestic or overseas; or worked as an uncertified person in the aircraft manufacturing industry in the United States, producing U.S. type-certificated or U.S. military aircraft.
 - The 50 years may be computed consecutively or non-consecutively.
- Be a U.S. citizen.
- Have NOT had any airman certificate revoked. Revocation of any airman certificate will disqualify a nominee for this award.





Chuck Potts is a charter member of EAA Chapter 857 established in October 2000 and serves the chapter as a Technical Advisor. Many of our members who have been active in building or restoring light general aviation aircraft have consulted with Chuck for his understanding of best practices in both airframe and engine builds and maintenance. He has also been a dedicated Young Eagles Pilot, volunteering to provide introductory rides in his WWII Taylorcraft L-2 Grasshopper seen above.

Chuck has spent much of his life in aviation in the USAF, the FAA, and other aviation entities. He has been a member of accident investigation teams and consults internationally on aviation maintenance depot quality control procedures and systems. In general aviation Chuck has restored and maintained multiple aircraft including several of the classic Army Air Force Liasion-Birds collectively known as Grasshoppers. These include the Aeronca L-3 and L-16, the Piper L-4 and his own Taylorcraft L-2. He is always ready to tell a story of some experience he has had in his long career as an aviation mechanic and enthusiast.
